Funding Total: \$151,400

The University of Arizona Cooperative Extension provides outreach and education to improve land stewardship and community health through horticulture and agriculture, 4-H youth development, and Family and Consumer Health Sciences. Funding from Pima County enables Pima County Cooperative Extension (PCCE) to better serve the community and to provide practical information that helps people make their lives better. This Scope of Work was developed by PCCE in coordination with Pima County Natural Resources (NRPR), Parks and Recreation staff. Deliverables on these activities will be reported quarterly to the NRPR staff with a summary report on all PCCE accomplishments provided to the Pima County Board of Supervisors annually.

Element 1. Groundskeeping, Office Operations, Administrative Support for Work Elements \$49,900 Operations financial support ensures that PCCE programs and joint efforts can be conducted effectively and efficiently.

- 1.1 Conduct maintenance, trash pick-up, vegetation pruning, and other groundskeeping activities around Pima County building locations used or leased by PCCE: Campbell and River office, Roger Rd. Culinary Education Center, South Tucson Garden Kitchen, and Green Valley office.
- 1.2 Provide general office supplies, field and educational supplies, housekeeping supplies, and shared equipment for shared PCCE programs, and administration.
- 1.3 Support PCCE administrative costs by paying a portion of costs for mailings, shipping, copying, and vehicle/equipment maintenance.
- 1.4 Provide administrative support for work elements listed below.

Element 2. 4-H High Ropes Challenge Course

\$32,200

In line with the Pima County Natural Resources, Parks and Recreation program goals, the PCCE 4-H High Ropes Challenge Course offers classes for Pima County residents, schools, and community groups. High Ropes experiences lead youth to conquer fears, build confidence, gain leadership, and grow problem-solving, collaboration, and communications skills.

- 2.1 Provide high-quality and safe High Ropes Challenge Course classes, managed, and supervised by a certified Challenge Course Facilitator, to youth and young adults, ages 5-18.
- 2.2 Continue to develop curricula and new courses to advance youth development goals such as team building, communication, and leadership.
- 2.3 Train educators and others on non-competitive learning through games and activities. Checking out low-ropes course kits enables educators to hold independent events at their class, park, or center.

Element 3. Ranch and Farm Stewardship Curriculum Development and Outreach

\$41,100

PCCE will apply 4-H expertise to implement a desert-based ranch and large-stock education program in Pima County, augmenting Pima County Natural Resources ranching educational programs. The program focuses on



outreach, engagement, and education with the purpose of bringing more youth to the Bar V Ranch and developing youth-accessible on-ranch activities.

- Plan, coordinate, and run multiple ranch educational events for youth in Pima County both at Pima County's Bar V Ranch and in various off-ranch venues.
- 3.2 Continue to develop 4-H Ranch, Range Management, and related projects for youth in Pima County. The curriculum will address reproduction, low-stress livestock handling, and cow herd health management. If time and resources allow, programs addressing rangeland monitoring and restoration, and grazing planning will be added.
- 3.3 Work with 4-H leaders in Pima County to develop show opportunities for on-ranch raised beef and build youth ranch knowledge and 4-H showmanship skills in preparation for the Pima County Fair and to lay groundwork for creating semi-arid raised and on-ranch-raised beef show categories and judging criteria.

Element 4. Natural Resources Education and Outreach

\$28,200

In tandem with Pima County Natural Resource Parks and Recreation (NRPR) staff, PCCE will develop and deliver programming to promote citizen engagement in select conservation efforts, focusing on invasive species, in or near NRPR-managed properties.

- 4.1 Participate in at least one invasive removal event per month and participate in Cooperative Weed Management activities, meetings, and partner functions, as possible.
- 4.2 Implement and biannually review and revise the Invasives Species Outreach Plan developed in coordination with NRPR staff for grant-funded invasive species treatment projects.
- 4.3 Serve as a public resource on invasive species as follows:
 - Develop and revise educational presentations, event materials, web resources, and social media posts to expand social media engagement and public awareness of outreach opportunities.
 - 2. Work at identified community events and/or other self-crafted outreach opportunities to engage citizens at neighborhood events such as urban clean-ups, invasives removal, and neighborhood stewardship opportunities.
 - 3. As resources allow, work with the NRPR Environmental Education staff as requested.
- 4.4 Meet the administrative functions of the position, including monthly reports to NRPR staff.

Legislative History

Under the Arizona Revised Statutes (ARS Title 3), Cooperative agricultural extension work shall be carried on in such manner as is mutually agreed upon by the board of regents of the universities and state college of Arizona and the county extension board of each county provided for in the statutes. Other institutional frameworks in the state statutes are as follows. The Board of Supervisors for each county shall appoint a seven-person advisory board for the county office. The Cooperative Extension Director shall annually report about extension activities in the county for the preceding fiscal year and a plan of extension work in the county for the ensuing year to the Board of Supervisors. The Board of Supervisors shall provide reasonable office space for the conduct of extension work in that county.
