*Title:

Proposed Revision to Pima County Code, Title 13, Chapter 24, Sanitary Sewer User Fees and Sewer Volume Fees

*Introduction/Background:

The Regional Wastewater Reclamation Department (RWRD) provides service to approximately 328,396 residential, commercial, and industrial accounts in metropolitan Pima County. Title 13, Chapter 24 of the Pima County Code outlines the User Fee calculation for sanitary sewage collection, treatment, and disposal of services provided. The purpose of this code text amendment is to propose a three percent (3%) increase to the Sewer Volume Fee and the Sewer Service Fee for one (1) year, followed by a proposed increase of 1.75% increase for each fee for three (3) additionalconsecutive years beginning in Fiscal Year 2026-2027 through Fiscal Year 2028-2029. The rate increase is necessary to recover the full cost of services provided and will ensure the County generates sufficient revenues to meet all operating and maintenance expenses, debt service payments, and required reserves.

*Discussion:

Each year, the Finance and Risk Management Department (FRMD), in connection with RWRD and the Regional Wastewater Reclamation Advisory Committee (RWRAC) Financial Subcommittee, prepares a financial plan for the utility. The Financial Plan reviews the financial needs of the Enterprise Fund to ensure the County generates sufficient revenues to meet all operating and maintenance expenses, debt service payments, and required reserves for the next four (4) fiscal years. The Financial Plan is then presented to the RWRAC for consideration and expression of support to the Board of Supervisors.

On January 15, 2025, the RWRAC Financial Subcommittee was presented with the initial draft Rate Workbook, which contained proposed increases to the sewer user rates. The FY 2025-2026 draft Rate Workbook presented a proposed 3% sewer volume rate increase beginning in FY 2025-2026, followed by an annual 1.75% annual increase for the next three (3) years. In conjunction to that rate increase, a 3% increase to the service charge would be instituted in FY 2025-2026, followed by an annual increase of 1.75% for the next three (3) years. The wastewater utility fee would be increased by 3% annually for the noted 4-year period (FY 2026 -2029). The information was presented to the full RWRAC at the January 23, 2025, meeting for review and discussion. Based on the timeline requirements for ensuring the rate increase inclusion in the Board of Supervisor FY 2025-2026 budget approval process, the committee members discussed the rate increase proposal, providing support of the rate increase proposal as presented. The motion of support passed with a vote of nine (9) affirmatives, two (2) against, and two (2) members absent.

*Conclusion:

Pima County has not raised sewer rates since June 1, 2017, even though operation and maintenance (O&M) costs have been increasing. A significant portion of the increased departmental costs are inflationary driven (e.g. chemicals, electricity) as unit prices have been increasing for the past eight (8) years since the last Sewer rate increase and are beyond departmental control - as well as increased salaries and benefits costs as a result of the 2023 Class and Compensation Study. Delay in raising rates will put the Enterprise fund in a financially unhealthy position. A rate increase is needed to generate sufficient revenues to meet all operating and maintenance expenses, debt service payments, required reserves, and to maintain an adequate

debt service ratio to obtain favorable bond ratings.

*Recommendation:

Recommend the Board of Supervisors approve the requested three percent (3%) to the Sewer Volume Fee and the Sewer Service Fee for one (1) year, followed by a proposed increase of 1.75% for each fee for three (3) consecutive years beginning in Fiscal Year 2026-2027 through Fiscal Year 2028-2029.

A three percent (3%) to the Sewer Volume Fee and the Sewer Service Fee for one (1) year, followed by a proposed increase of 1.75% for each fee for three (3) consecutive years will generate an additional \$22,133,490 in revenue annually for Fiscal Year 2026-2027 through Fiscal Year 2028-2029, while maintaining the department's debt service ratio above the 1.3 baseline value.

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AN ORDINANCE OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF PIMA COUNTY, ARIZONA, RELATING TO WASTEWATER SANITARY SEWER USER FEES; AMENDING THE PIMA COUNTY CODE, TITLE 13, CHAPTER 24, SANITARY SEWER USER FEES, AMENDING ORDINANCE NO. 2016-29

The Board of Supervisors of Pima County finds that:

- 1. On May 3, 2016, the Pima County Board of Supervisors adopted Ordinance No. 2016-29.
- 2. Pima County is authorized by A.R.S. § 11-264(A) to operate a sewage system. A.R.S. § 11-264(A) provides Pima County with authority to set sewer system usage fees relating to operating the sewage system through Chapter 13.24 of the Pima County Code.
- 3. It is in the best interest of the County to amend certain provisions of the Pima County Code previously adopted in Ordinance No. 2016-29 to allow for the following:
 - a. <u>SEWER USER FEES</u>. Proposed increase of three percent (3%) to the sewer volume fee and the sewer service fee for one (1) year, followed by a proposed increase of 1.75% on each fee for three (3) consecutive years.
 - b. Refinement of code language, update of code definitions and acronyms.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF PIMA COUNTY, ARIZONA:

Section 1. Pima County Code Chapter 13.24 (Sanitary Sewer User Fees), Sections 13.24.100 (General Provisions), 13.24.200 (Account Management), 13.24.300 (Septage Authorization, Receiving, and Billing), 13.24.400 (Special Facilities), 13.24.500 (Large Agency), and 13.24.600 (Tables of Service Fees, Rates, and Administrative Fees) are amended as follows:

Chapter 13.24

SANITARY SEWER USER FEES

13.24.100 General Provisions

A. Purpose

This chapter defines how the County will recover Department operating and maintenance costs associated with the management of Sanitary Sewage within the Public Sanitary Sewerage System Public Sewer System owned and operated by Pima County.

B. Authority

Pima County is authorized by Arizona Revised Statute (A.R.S.) § 11-264(A) to "purchase, construct or operate a sewage system, including the collection, transportation, pumping, treatment and disposal of sewage, and charge fees and levy taxes". A.R.S. § 11-264(C) provides Pima County with authority to file liens on property for nonpayment of the Public Sanitary Sewage system Public Sewer System User Fees.

C. Definitions

The following definitions apply throughout this chapter:

- 1. "Agency" means a unit of federal government or state government or a federally recognized Indian tribe. The term "Agency" does not include school districts.
- 2.1. "CCF" means a volume unit of measurement for water of one hundred cubic feet, which is equivalent to 748 gallons.
- 3. 2. "Chemical Oxygen Demand" or "COD" means the amount of chemically oxidizable material in Sanitary Sewage as measured using the most recent U.S. Environmental Protection Agencyapproved procedures specified in Title 40 of the Code of Federal Regulations.
- 4. 3. "Commercial or Industrial User" means a Person discharging Sanitary Sewage into the Public Sanitary Sewerage Sewer System from a property zoned or used for recognized commercial or industrial uses. Commercial and/or Industrial Users include, but are not limited to: restaurants; bars; laundromats; hotels; motels; offices; in-home businesses with restroom facilities provided primarily for customer use; service stations; barber shops; beauty salons; hospitals; nursing homes; schools; dormitories; churches; penal institutions; utilities; car washes; commercial, medical, and dental laboratories; pet clinics; bakeries; food processing facilities; industrial facilities; manufacturing facilities; machinery fabrication and rehabilitation facilities; and meat packing.
- 5.4. "County" means Pima County, a political subdivision of the State of Arizona governing Pima County, Arizona.
 - 6. 5. "Day" means calendar day unless otherwise specified.
- 7. 6. "Department" means the Pima County Regional Wastewater Reclamation Department or any successor County department Department.
- 8. 7. "Director" means the Director of the Pima County Regional Wastewater Reclamation Department or any successor County department, or the Director's designated representative including delegates and any Person who is by operation of law authorized to carry out the Director's functions.
- 9. 8. "Fiscal Year" means the Fiscal Year of the County, initiating annually on July 1 and ending on June 30.
- 10.9. "Hazardous Waste" means any solid waste or combination of solid wastes meeting the definition of "Hazardous Waste" found in Title 40 of the Code of Federal Regulations.
- 11. 10. "House Connection Sewer" means the private sewer Private Sewer connecting between a free-standing Residential Unit, including appurtenant buildings, and the public or private collection sewer a residential building and the Public Sewer.
- 12. 11. "Inspector" means a County staff member authorized by the Director to inspect Sanitary Sewage generation, conveyance, treatment, and disposal facilities.
- 13. 12. "Industrial Wastewater" means Wastewater generated in a commercial or industrial process.
- 14. 13. "Irrigation Meter" means the Water Meter used to measure potable water flow to uses that do not directly or indirectly result in discharges to the Public Sanitary Sewerage Sewer System.
- 14. "Large Agency" or "Agency" means a unit of federal government or a federally recognized Indian tribe that has contracted or wishes to contract with the County for management or

ownership of all or a portion of a Sanitary Sewer system located within the boundaries of property owned by the Agency.

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16. "Multi-Family User" means a Person managing or controlling a Multi-Family Facility discharging into the Public Sanitary Sewerage Sewer System.

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- 18. "Person" means an individual, firm, company, association, partnership, corporation, joint stock company, trust, estate, municipality, state, interstate body, commission, political subdivision of the state, or the United States Government individual, association, company, commission, corporation, estate, firm, governmental body, interstate body, joint stock company, municipality, partnership, political subdivision of the state, state, trust, or the United States Government.
- 19. "Private Sanitary Sewer System" means a privately-owned sanitary sewer or sanitary sewer system and related facilities designed to convey Sanitary Sewage from one or more residences or other buildings (including commercial and industrial use structures) to the Public Sanitary Sewerage Sewer System. The term includes, but is not limited to, House Connection Sewers and privately-owned pump stations.

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- 22. "Public Sanitary Sewerage Sewer System" means the full Wastewater system owned by Pima County, including all gravity sanitary sewer mains; pumping systems; treatment and disposal facilities; and all appurtenances required to collect, transport, treat, monitor, measure, control, store, reclaim, discharge, or recharge the liquid, gaseous, and solid phases of Sanitary Sewage.
- 23. "Rate" or "R" means the charge in dollars, per one hundred cubic feet (CCF) of potable water usage, adopted by the Pima County Board of Supervisors for the discharge of Sanitary Sewage to the Public Sanitary Sewerage Sewer System.
- 24. "Residential Strength Sanitary Sewage" means Sanitary Sewage produced by a typical Residential Unit without a commercial or industrial operation or discharge.

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- 26. "Residential User" means a Person discharging Sanitary Sewage from a Residential Unit. Each Residential Users will have an individual, single lot Water Meter, serviced by a Water Company, or will receive potable water from a Private Well. Residential Users are presumed to discharge Residential Strength Sanitary Sewage.
- 27. "Sanitary Sewage" or "Wastewater" means the wastes from toilets, baths, sinks, lavatories, laundries, drains, and other plumbing fixtures in residences, institutions, public and business buildings, mobile homes, and other places of human habitation, employment, or recreation. Sanitary Sewage includes non-prohibited Industrial Wastewater.
- 28. "Sanitary Sewer" means a system of pipes for conveyance of Sanitary Sewage into which there is no intentional admission of storm water, surface water, groundwater, or materials toxic to Wastewater treatment processes, unless authorized by the Department.
- 28. 29. "Septage" has the same meaning as the Septage definition found at subsection 13.36.040(SS) of the Pima County Code.
- <u>29.</u> 30. "Septage Discharge Permit" means an individual license, control mechanism, authorization letter, or contract issued by the Director, which allows Septage discharge into the publically publicly owned treatment works.

- <u>30.</u> 31. "Service Fee" or "S" means the fixed monthly charge set by the Pima County Board of Supervisors and levied on all Users to cover a portion of the fixed operating and maintenance costs of the Public Sanitary Sewerage Sewer System.
- <u>31.</u> 28. "Sanitary Sewer" means a system of pipes for conveyance of Sanitary Sewage into which there is no intentional admission of storm water, surface water, groundwater, or materials toxic to Wastewater treatment processes, unless authorized by the Department.
- 32. "Strength" means a measure of the relative impact of Sanitary Sewage on County treatment processes. Strength factors include, but are not limited to, measurements of Chemical Oxygen Demand and Suspended Solids concentrations. Other Wastewater constituent concentrations may be monitored and regulated by the Department as required to comply with state and federal permits and regulations, to protect the Public Sanitary Sewerage Sewer System, and to use in recovery of associated Wastewater conveyance and treatment costs. For purposes of calculating User Fees, Residential Strength Sanitary Sewage is used as the baseline.
- ... 34. "Suspended Solids" or "SS" means solids which float on or are suspended in water, Sanitary Sewage, or industrial wastes, and which are removable by a laboratory filtration device. Suspended Solids concentrations are measured using the most recent U.S. Environmental Protection Agency-approved procedures specified in Title 40 of the Code of Federal Regulations.
- 35. "Unauthorized User" means a Person who connects to, or discharges into the Public Sanitary Sewerage Sewer System without the approval of the Department.
- 36. "User" means a Person who discharges Sanitary Sewage to the Public Sanitary Sewerage Sewer System.

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- 38. "User Class Average" means the total monthly metered water usage volume for a User Class divided by the number of Users in the User Class. User Class Average is calculated by the Department at the beginning of each <u>fiscal year</u> <u>Fiscal Year</u> using the previous <u>fiscal year's</u> <u>Fiscal Year's</u> Winter Quarter Average.
- 39. "User Fee" means the Rate (R) or Strength Adjusted Rate (SAR) times the Volume (V) charge plus the fixed monthly service charge levied on Users of the Public Sanitary Sewerage Sewer System pursuant to this chapter.

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41. "Wastewater" means Sanitary Sewage.

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- D. Use of Funds.
 - 1. Operation and Maintenance Expense Priority.
- a. Revenues from any source will first be applied to meet all expenses for the operation and maintenance of the Public Sanitary Sewerage Systems Public Sewer System, excluding Special Facilities.

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2. Bond Indebtedness. After funding the operation and maintenance expenses of the Public Sanitary Sewerage Systems Public Sewer System, User Fee revenues will be applied Public Sanitary Sewerage Systems Public Sewer System bonded indebtedness and other Public Sanitary Sewerage Systems Public Sewer System funds in accordance with the provisions of revenue bond covenants.

E. User Fee Review.

The Department will annually review User Fee revenues and prepare a Rate and/or Service Fee adjustment request to the Pima County Board of Supervisors if projected revenues will be insufficient to meet the Department's financial requirements. When proposing Rate and Service Fee revisions, the Department will:

- 1. Maintain a distribution of Public Sanitary Sewerage Systems Public Sewer System operation and maintenance costs among Users; and
- 2. Generate sufficient revenue to pay the costs of the Public Sanitary Sewerage Systems Public Sewer System operation and maintenance, and debt service payments.

13.24.200 Account Management.

This section applies to all Users unless the subsection specifically identifies one or more of the User Classes for specific regulation.

A. User Accounts.

Prior to discharging into the Public Sanitary Sewerage Systems Public Sewer System, each User must establish a billing account. Invoices for User Fees will be issued by either the User's Water Company, if that company provides sanitary sewer billing services, or by the County or its billing agent.

- 5. Account Termination.
- a. Termination through a Water Company. Users receiving sanitary sewer bills through a Water Company may terminate sanitary sewer service by providing notice either to the Water Company or the Department. Failure to provide timely notice will result in continued User Fee liability.
- b. Termination through the Department. Users receiving <u>sanitary</u> sewer bills directly from the Department must terminate <u>sanitary</u> sewer service by providing notice to the Department. Failure to provide timely notice will result in continued User Fee liability.
- c. Voided Billing. If the Department confirms that a property is not serviced by the Public Sanitary Sewerage Systems Public Sewer System, the User account will be terminated and all outstanding User Fee bills will be voided.
 - B. User Fee Calculations.

All Users must pay a monthly User Fee for Sanitary Sewage collection, treatment, and disposal services provided through the Public Sanitary Sewerage Systems Public Sewer System.

3. Explanation of User Fee Calculation Factors.

b. Volume. Volume is determined by one of the three following methods:

iii. Non-Residential Users Connected to a Private Well. This provision applies to all Non-Residential Users whose potable water use is not metered by a Water Company.

2025 Pima County Code Amendment - Title 13 (Public Services), Division II (Sewers)

- 1) Metered Flow. Non-Residential Users whose potable water usage or potable water flow is metered using a privately-owned meter must annually report meter data to the Department on forms approved by the Director. At a minimum, data will include:
 - User's full name and service address;
 - Billing address, if different than service address;
 - Phone number;
 - Account number;
 - Water Meter manufacturer and model number:
 - Installation date;
 - Location of meter;
 - Water Meter readings for November, December, January, and February;
 - Water Meter volume units, i.e., gallons or CCF.

- b) Meter Quality. Privately-owned potable water meters Water Meters must be equal in quality and purpose to the meters or metering devices used for similar purposes by the City of Tucson Water Department and be maintained according to the manufacturer's specifications.
- c) Certain industrial dischargers may, subject to the Director's discretion, install and operate a privately-owned wastewater flow measurement device provided the device and <u>sanitary</u> sewer hydraulic characteristics result in continuous and accurate flow measurement and the device is designed for and used in the municipal wastewater industry.

The Department will not purchase, install, maintain, or monitor Sanitary Sewage meters unless fully compensated by the User.

2) Unmetered Flow. For Non-Residential Users without a method to directly measure onsite water use or discharges to the Public Sanitary Sewerage Systems Public Sewer System, the User Class Average will be used to calculate the User Fee unless alternative data acceptable to the Department is provided.

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- c. Rate and Strength Adjusted Rate.
- i. Rate. The Rate is the same for most Residential Users but may be reduced for certain qualifying low_income Users. The Rate is included in 13.24.600, Table 2.
- ii. Strength Adjusted Rate (SAR). The Non-Residential User's SAR is a multiple of the Residential User Rate. It adjusts the Rate to account for the County's additional cost to manage Non-Residential Sanitary Sewage. The SAR is calculated by multiplying the Rate (R) times a Strength factor (HS). Strength factors for Non-Residential User Classes are determined by the Department from industrial averages and from direct monitoring of representative Non_Residential User discharges. SAR values for all Non-Residential User Classes are included in 13.24.600, Table 3. The Department reserves the right to calculate a site-specific SAR at any time based on measured Wastewater Strength.

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C. User Billing.

3. User Fee Changes. The changes in User Fee Rates and charges will be reflected in sanitary sewer User bills beginning with the first billing cycle after the effective date of the Ordinance or as determined by the dates referenced within the code changes.

D. Account Adjustments.

- 1. Income_Based Adjustments Available to Residential Users. Any Residential User whose current household income meets the following requirements may apply for a reduced User Fee. Income eligibility is subject to verification by the Department's agent during the application process.
- a. Class 1A Income Adjustment. Any Residential User whose current household income is at one hundred (100) percent or less of the federal poverty level guidelines may apply for redesignation to User Class 1A.

- d. Disclosure. To qualify for an income-based adjustment, applicants must disclose all reportable income sources, including but not limited to: employment, interest, benefits, investments, rentals, businesses, and other support. False reporting or failure to comply with these reporting requirements may result in immediate termination of the low_income status. Filing false data may also result in penalties under A.R.S. § 39-161.
- e. Status Duration. Residential Users may qualify for an income-based adjustment under a temporary or long-term status.

2. New Move-In. A one-time new move-in adjustment may be made to User Fees based on documentation of the first two full months' of actual metered water usage.

- 3. Winter Quarter Average. The Director may approve use of actual Volume data if the actual Volume data is lower than data used for the Winter Quarter Average WQA calculation and:
- a. All challenges to changes in Winter Quarter Average (the WQA) must be submitted to the Department within sixty (60) Days of the User's receipt of the first invoice showing the billing changes.

- 4. Vacancy. A User may request an adjustment based on monthly vacancy information.
- a. The User must provide thirty (30) Days prior notice of vacation, tenant vacancy, or other verifiable cause of non-occupancy resulting in no discharge to the sewer system Public Sewer.

5. Irrigation Flow

A User's bill may be reduced to reflect the volume of water, as measured by an Irrigation Meter that is consumed in outdoor irrigation or similar outdoor use. Subject only to the following exceptions, all Irrigation Meters must be installed, read, and reported by a Water Company.

a. Grandfathered Status Exception. Only Users operating privately-owned Irrigation Meters who submitted annual irrigation adjustments for the 2015-2016 Fiscal Year are eligible for grandfathered status. Eligibility is also subject to the following:

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- ii. Data Reporting. Grandfathered status Users must:
- 1) Have initially registered the User's name, and property owner's name, Irrigation Meter make and model number, and Irrigation Meter location with the Department.

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- E. Securing User Account Payment.
 - 1. Overdue Accounts.
 - a. Overdue Accounts. For sanitary sewer only accounts:

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- F. Unauthorized Use of Sanitary the Sewer.
- 1. Determination. Unauthorized Users of the Sanitary Sewer may be identified by dye test, physical connection, CCTV, or a preponderance of evidence such as existing connection permits, pretreatment inspections, pretreatment permits, or other reasonable methods.
- 2. Responsibility for Fees. If testing or other evidence indicates a property is connected to the public sewer system Public Sewer System, the Unauthorized User is responsible for any unpaid fees for the connection and discharge into the public sewer system Public Sewer System. For purposes of this subsection (F), the term Unauthorized User means: (i) the person Person(s) identified by a Water Company as a customer for water service to the property; or (ii) if there is no established water account, the person Person(s) discharging to the public sewer Public Sewer from the property. If the Unauthorized User is not the owner of the property and the Unauthorized User does not pay any of the outstanding User Fees and interest, the owner of the property is responsible for the unpaid balance.

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- ii. Waive all or part of the unpaid user fees based on undue hardship such as for those used to qualify for an income_based billing adjustment in Section 13.24.200(D)(1).
- d. Establishment of Connection Date. If evidence, such as a user account for the property, exists, the date of connection is presumed to be the date supported by the evidence. If a connection date cannot be established, the department Department will utilize the Unauthorized User's first date of possession of the property as the connection date.
 - 3. User Fee Recovery.
- a. Fees. If a property is found to be connected to the <u>public sanitary sewerage system Public Sewer System</u>, and there is no user account associated with that property, the Unauthorized User will be billed an account activation fee, an unauthorized use recovery fee, and past due monthly user fees. These administrative fees are provided in Section 13.24.600, Table 4. If the Unauthorized User is not the owner of the property and the Unauthorized User does not pay any of the outstanding User Fees and interest, the owner of the property is responsible for the unpaid balance.

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4. Legal Action Fee and Cost Recovery.

b. Lien and Judicial Action. Pursuant to A.R.S. § 11-264, the County may file a lien on a property for the nonpayment of User Fees. The County may also, pursuant to its general authority, pursue judicial enforcement for nonpayment of User Fees. The County reserves the right to take either action at any time if the payment of the fees are is delinquent for more than ninety (90) Days.

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G. Dye Testing

1. Determining Whether Property is Connected to the Public Sewer System. Where the Department does not have a record of an inspected Sanitary Sewer connection permit for a property, a dye test may be performed at either the Department's or the User's request.

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c. Multiple Dye Tests. In some situations, multiple dye tests may be required. Fees for multiple dye tests are provided in 13.24.600, Table 4 as related to the connection to the Public Sanitary Sewerage Sewer System. The Department will perform multiple dye tests when the testing can be performed with the following constraints:

3. Burden of Proof.

- b. The Department reserves the right to conduct monitoring to verify the User's claim. Monitoring conducted by the Department at the User's request will be at the User's expense.
- c. Protest of unauthorized use for older connections
 - 4. Director's Proceedings.

• • •

b. Findings. The Director, upon finding that a User's protest is justified, will adjust the established User Fee or User Class designation and make equitable reimbursements for overpayments and, consistent with the limitations of this chapter.

. . .

I. Cost Recovery for Nonstandard Events.

- 1. Residential Misuse of a <u>Sanitary</u> Sewer Connection. The County reserves the right to reclassify a Residential User to Non-Residential User status and assign an applicable Strength Adjusted Rate to the User if monitoring or other reliable and verifiable information exists indicating the User is discharging Wastewater to the Public <u>Sanitary Sewerage</u> <u>Sewer</u> System that is inconsistent with Residential Strength Sanitary Sewage.
- 2. Hazardous Waste and Prohibited Substances. In addition to any User Fees established by this chapter, a User who is detected discharging any Hazardous Waste or any other prohibited substance into the Public Sanitary Sewerage Sewer System in violation of Chapter 13.36 of the Pima County Code will be subject to the increased cost of the treatment of the prohibited discharge. This

provision will not preclude the Director from imposing the additional penalties provided in Chapter 13.36 of the Pima County Code.

3. Sanitary Sewer Overflow Cost Recovery. The County reserves the right to recover the Department's cost of remediating <u>sanitary</u> sewer impacts to public property resulting from Usercaused sanitary overflows.

13.24.300 Septage Authorization, Receiving, and Billing.

A. Account and Permit. No Person will discharge Septage into the Public Sanitary Sewerage Sewer System unless authorized by a Septage Discharge Permit or a temporary special authorization issued as required in Chapter 13.36 of the Pima County Code, in writing, by the Director. Each Septage Discharge Permit will require the permittee to establish and maintain a Septage discharge billing account with the Pima County Finance and Risk Management Department.

. . .

- B. Septage Discharge Fees.
- 1. Fee Requirement. Any Person discharging Septage into the Public Sanitary Sewerage Sewer System must pay Septage discharge fees.
- 2. Discharge Fee. The fee for any Person discharging Septage to any portion of the Public Sanitary Sewerage Sewer System is calculated using the per gallon rate provided in 13.24.600, Table 5.

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13.24.400 Special Facilities.

A. Defined.

1. Special Facilities are defined in Section 13.20.020(51) 13.20.100(B)(48) of the Pima County Code.

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C. Access. Department Inspectors will have access at all reasonable times, to metering devices as well as treatment and conveyance areas maintained by agreement, on all Private Sanitary Sewer Systems.

13.24.500 Large Agency.

- A. Charges. User Fees for Large Agencies may be levied as a separate bill within the County financial management system. The User Volume, Strength, and the actual operational and maintenance costs attributable to the Large Agency may be used as factors in the billing calculation.
- B. Agreement. Large Agencies will enter into a written agreement with the County including but not limited to the following:
- 1. User Fees. Large Agency-specific User Fees will be established based on a review of Department costs to provide service to each Large Agency. Factors involved in developing the User Fees include, but are not limited to:
- a. A fee reimbursing the Department for the increased costs to operate and maintain the non-public portion of the <u>sanitary</u> sewer system within the Agency, as well as cover the impact of the Agency on the Public Sanitary Sewerage Sewer System.

c. The Volume, Strength, or chemical data from the Large Agency discharge.

. . .

- 2. Pretreatment. For Large Agencies where the County does not have direct enforcement authority against the discharger, the Large Agency will be required to develop its own Pretreatment program by:
- a. Adopting a pretreatment <u>sanitary</u> sewer use ordinance that is no less stringent than as those provided in Chapter 13.36 Industrial Wastewater Ordinance of the Pima County Code; and

- 3. Capacity Management, Operations, and Maintenance (CMOM). When appropriate, CMOM, as well as spill prevention, may be specified to:
- a. Ensure that the operation and maintenance of the Agency's Sanitary Sewer System sanitary sewer system is in compliance with the Department's CMOM Permit, inclusive of:

4. Permissions and Assurances. The agreement will also provide the Department with authority to:

. . .

- c. Assure that there is payment of all connections and User Fees for each connection and User within the Large Agency boundaries.
- C. Access. Department Inspectors will have access at all reasonable times to metering devices on the Large Agency's Sanitary Sewers sanitary sewers and other appurtenances specified within the agreement. Department maintenance personnel, equipment, and any other Department staff necessary to complete the agreed support tasks will have access at all reasonable times to manholes, metering devices, and any other appurtenances on the Agency's Sanitary Sewers sanitary sewers as specified within the agreement.

ORDINANCE 2025-	
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AN ORDINANCE OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF PIMA COUNTY, ARIZONA, RELATING TO WASTEWATER SANITARY SEWER USER FEES; AMENDING THE PIMA COUNTY CODE, TITLE 13, CHAPTER 24, SANITARY SEWER USER FEES, AMENDING ORDINANCE NO. 2016-29

The Board of Supervisors of Pima County finds that:

- 1. On May 3, 2016, the Pima County Board of Supervisors adopted Ordinance No. 2016-29.
- 2. Pima County is authorized by A.R.S. § 11-264(A) to operate a sewage system. A.R.S. § 11-264(A) provides Pima County with authority to set sewer system usage fees relating to operating the sewage system through Chapter 13.24 of the Pima County Code.
- 3. It is in the best interest of the County to amend certain provisions of the Pima County Code previously adopted in Ordinance No. 2016-29 to allow for the following:
 - a. <u>SEWER USER FEES</u>. Proposed increase of three percent (3%) to the sewer volume fee and the sewer service fee for one (1) year, followed by a proposed increase of 1.75% on each fee for three (3) consecutive years.
 - b. Refinement of code language, update of code definitions and acronyms.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF PIMA COUNTY, ARIZONA:

Section 1. Pima County Code Chapter 13.24 (Sanitary Sewer User Fees), Sections 13.24.100 (General Provisions), 13.24.200 (Account Management), 13.24.300 (Septage Authorization, Receiving, and Billing), 13.24.400 (Special Facilities), 13.24.500 (Large Agency), and 13.24.600 (Tables of Service Fees, Rates, and Administrative Fees) are amended as follows:

Chapter 13.24

SANITARY SEWER USER FEES

13.24.100 General Provisions

A. Purpose

This chapter defines how the County will recover Department operating and maintenance costs associated with the management of Sewage within the Public Sewer System owned and operated by Pima County.

B. Authority

Pima County is authorized by Arizona Revised Statute (A.R.S.) § 11-264(A) to "purchase, construct or operate a sewage system, including the collection, transportation, pumping, treatment and disposal of sewage, and charge fees and levy taxes". A.R.S. § 11-264(C) provides Pima County with authority to file liens on property for nonpayment of the Public Sewer System User Fees.

C. Definitions

The following definitions apply throughout this chapter:

- 1. "Agency" means a unit of federal government or state government or a federally recognized Indian tribe. The term "Agency" does not include school districts.
- 2. "CCF" means a volume unit of measurement for water of one hundred cubic feet, which is equivalent to 748 gallons.
- 3. "Chemical Oxygen Demand" or "COD" means the amount of chemically oxidizable material in Sewage as measured using the most recent U.S. Environmental Protection Agency-approved procedures specified in Title 40 of the Code of Federal Regulations.
- 4. "Commercial or Industrial User" means a Person discharging Sewage into the Public Sewer System from a property zoned or used for recognized commercial or industrial uses. Commercial and/or Industrial Users include, but are not limited to: restaurants; bars; laundromats; hotels; motels; offices; in-home businesses with restroom facilities provided primarily for customer use; service stations; barber shops; beauty salons; hospitals; nursing homes; schools; dormitories; churches; penal institutions; utilities; car washes; commercial, medical, and dental laboratories; pet clinics; bakeries; food processing facilities; industrial facilities; manufacturing facilities; machinery fabrication and rehabilitation facilities; and meat packing.
- 5. "County" means Pima County, a political subdivision of the State of Arizona governing Pima County, Arizona.
 - 6. "Day" means calendar day unless otherwise specified.
- 7. "Department" means the Pima County Regional Wastewater Reclamation Department or any successor County Department.
- 8. "Director" means the Director of the Department or any successor County department, including delegates and any Person who is by operation of law authorized to carry out the Director's functions.
- 9. "Fiscal Year" means the Fiscal Year of the County, initiating annually on July 1 and ending on June 30.
- 10. "Hazardous Waste" means any solid waste or combination of solid wastes meeting the definition of "Hazardous Waste" found in Title 40 of the Code of Federal Regulations.
- 11. "House Connection Sewer" means the Private Sewer connecting a residential building and the Public Sewer.
- 12. "Inspector" means a County staff member authorized by the Director to inspect Sewage generation, conveyance, treatment, and disposal facilities.
 - 13. "Industrial Wastewater" means Wastewater generated in a commercial or industrial process.
- 14. "Irrigation Meter" means the Water Meter used to measure potable water flow to uses that do not directly or indirectly result in discharges to the Public Sewer System.

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16. "Multi-Family User" means a Person managing or controlling a Multi-Family Facility discharging into the Public Sewer System.

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- 18. "Person" means an individual, association, company, commission, corporation, estate, firm, governmental body, interstate body, joint stock company, municipality, partnership, political subdivision of the state, state, trust, or the United States Government.
- 19. "Private Sewer" means a privately-owned sanitary sewer or sanitary sewer system and related facilities designed to convey Sewage from one or more residences or other buildings (including commercial and industrial use structures) to the Public Sewer System. The term includes, but is not limited to, House Connection Sewers and privately-owned pump stations.

- 22. "Public Sewer System" means the full Wastewater system owned by Pima County, including all gravity sanitary sewer mains; pumping systems; treatment and disposal facilities; and all appurtenances required to collect, transport, treat, monitor, measure, control, store, reclaim, discharge, or recharge the liquid, gaseous, and solid phases of Sewage.
- 23. "Rate" or "R" means the charge in dollars, per one hundred cubic feet (CCF) of potable water usage, adopted by the Pima County Board of Supervisors for the discharge of Sewage to the Public Sewer System.
- 24. "Residential Strength Sanitary Sewage" means Sewage produced by a typical Residential Unit without a commercial or industrial operation or discharge.

. . .

- 26. "Residential User" means a Person discharging Sewage from a Residential Unit. Each Residential Users will have an individual, single lot Water Meter, serviced by a Water Company, or will receive potable water from a Private Well. Residential Users are presumed to discharge Residential Strength Sanitary Sewage.
- 27. "Sewage" or "Wastewater" means the wastes from toilets, baths, sinks, lavatories, laundries, drains, and other plumbing fixtures in residences, institutions, public and business buildings, mobile homes, and other places of human habitation, employment, or recreation. Sewage includes non-prohibited Industrial Wastewater.
- 28. "Septage" has the same meaning as the Septage definition found at subsection 13.36.040(SS) of the Pima County Code.
- 29. "Septage Discharge Permit" means an individual license, control mechanism, authorization letter, or contract issued by the Director, which allows Septage discharge into the publicly owned treatment works.
- 30. "Service Fee" or "S" means the fixed monthly charge set by the Pima County Board of Supervisors and levied on all Users to cover a portion of the fixed operating and maintenance costs of the Public Sewer System.
- 31. "Sewer" means a system of pipes for conveyance of Sewage into which there is no intentional admission of storm water, surface water, groundwater, or materials toxic to Wastewater treatment processes, unless authorized by the Department.
- 32. "Strength" means a measure of the relative impact of Sewage on County treatment processes. Strength factors include, but are not limited to, measurements of Chemical Oxygen Demand and Suspended Solids concentrations. Other Wastewater constituent concentrations may be monitored and regulated by the Department as required to comply with state and federal permits and regulations, to protect the Public Sewer System, and to use in recovery of associated Wastewater conveyance and treatment costs. For purposes of calculating User Fees, Residential Strength Sanitary Sewage is used as the baseline.

- 34. "Suspended Solids" or "SS" means solids which float on or are suspended in water, Sewage, or industrial wastes, and which are removable by a laboratory filtration device. Suspended Solids concentrations are measured using the most recent U.S. Environmental Protection Agencyapproved procedures specified in Title 40 of the Code of Federal Regulations.
- 35. "Unauthorized User" means a Person who connects to, or discharges into the Public Sewer System without the approval of the Department.
 - 36. "User" means a Person who discharges Sewage to the Public Sewer System.

. . .

- 38. "User Class Average" means the total monthly metered water usage volume for a User Class divided by the number of Users in the User Class. User Class Average is calculated by the Department at the beginning of each Fiscal Year using the previous Fiscal Year's Winter Quarter Average.
- 39. "User Fee" means the Rate (R) or Strength Adjusted Rate (SAR) times the Volume (V) charge plus the fixed monthly service charge levied on Users of the Public Sewer System pursuant to this chapter.

. . .

41. "Wastewater" means Sewage.

. . .

- D. Use of Funds.
- 1. Operation and Maintenance Expense Priority.
- a. Revenues from any source will first be applied to meet all expenses for the operation and maintenance of the Public Sewer System, excluding Special Facilities.

. . .

- 2. Bond Indebtedness. After funding the operation and maintenance expenses of the Public Sewer System, User Fee revenues will be applied Public Sewer System bonded indebtedness and other Public Sewer System funds in accordance with the provisions of revenue bond covenants.
 - E. User Fee Review.

The Department will annually review User Fee revenues and prepare a Rate and/or Service Fee adjustment request to the Pima County Board of Supervisors if projected revenues will be insufficient to meet the Department's financial requirements. When proposing Rate and Service Fee revisions, the Department will:

- 1. Maintain a distribution of Public Sewer System operation and maintenance costs among Users; and
- 2. Generate sufficient revenue to pay the costs of the Public Sewer System operation and maintenance, and debt service payments.

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13.24.200 Account Management.

This section applies to all Users unless the subsection specifically identifies one or more of the User Classes for specific regulation.

2025 Pima County Code Amendment – Title 13 (Public Services), Division II (Sewers)

A. User Accounts.

Prior to discharging into the Public Sewer System, each User must establish a billing account. Invoices for User Fees will be issued by either the User's Water Company, if that company provides sanitary sewer billing services, or by the County or its billing agent.

5. Account Termination.

- a. Termination through a Water Company. Users receiving sanitary sewer bills through a Water Company may terminate sanitary sewer service by providing notice either to the Water Company or the Department. Failure to provide timely notice will result in continued User Fee liability.
- b. Termination through the Department. Users receiving sanitary sewer bills directly from the Department must terminate sanitary sewer service by providing notice to the Department. Failure to provide timely notice will result in continued User Fee liability.
- c. Voided Billing. If the Department confirms that a property is not serviced by the Public Sewer System, the User account will be terminated and all outstanding User Fee bills will be voided.
 - B. User Fee Calculations.

All Users must pay a monthly User Fee for Sewage collection, treatment, and disposal services provided through the Public Sewer System.

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3. Explanation of User Fee Calculation Factors.

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b. Volume. Volume is determined by one of the three following methods:

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- iii. Non-Residential Users Connected to a Private Well. This provision applies to all Non-Residential Users whose potable water use is not metered by a Water Company.
- 1) Metered Flow. Non-Residential Users whose potable water usage or potable water flow is metered using a privately-owned meter must annually report meter data to the Department on forms approved by the Director. At a minimum, data will include:
 - User's full name and service address:
 - Billing address, if different than service address;
 - Phone number;
 - Account number;
 - Water Meter manufacturer and model number;
 - Installation date;
 - Location of meter;
 - Water Meter readings for November, December, January, and February;
 - Water Meter volume units, i.e., gallons or CCF.

. . .

- b) Meter Quality. Privately-owned potable Water Meters must be equal in quality and purpose to the meters or metering devices used for similar purposes by the City of Tucson Water Department and be maintained according to the manufacturer's specifications.
- c) Certain industrial dischargers may, subject to the Director's discretion, install and operate a privately-owned wastewater flow measurement device provided the device and sanitary sewer hydraulic characteristics result in continuous and accurate flow measurement and the device is designed for and used in the municipal wastewater industry.

The Department will not purchase, install, maintain, or monitor Sewage meters unless fully compensated by the User.

2) Unmetered Flow. For Non-Residential Users without a method to directly measure onsite water use or discharges to the Public Sewer System, the User Class Average will be used to calculate the User Fee unless alternative data acceptable to the Department is provided.

...

- c. Rate and Strength Adjusted Rate.
- i. Rate. The Rate is the same for most Residential Users but may be reduced for certain qualifying low-income Users. The Rate is included in 13.24.600, Table 2.
- ii. Strength Adjusted Rate (SAR). The Non-Residential User's SAR is a multiple of the Residential User Rate. It adjusts the Rate to account for the County's additional cost to manage Non-Residential Sanitary Sewage. The SAR is calculated by multiplying the Rate (R) times a Strength factor (HS). Strength factors for Non-Residential User Classes are determined by the Department from industrial averages and from direct monitoring of representative Non-Residential User discharges. SAR values for all Non-Residential User Classes are included in 13.24.600, Table 3. The Department reserves the right to calculate a site-specific SAR at any time based on measured Wastewater Strength.

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C. User Billing.

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3. User Fee Changes. The changes in User Fee Rates and charges will be reflected in sanitary sewer User bills beginning with the first billing cycle after the effective date of the Ordinance or as determined by the dates referenced within the code changes.

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D. Account Adjustments.

- 1. Income-Based Adjustments Available to Residential Users. Any Residential User whose current household income meets the following requirements may apply for a reduced User Fee. Income eligibility is subject to verification by the Department's agent during the application process.
- a. Class 1A Income Adjustment. Any Residential User whose current household income is one hundred (100) percent or less of the federal poverty level guidelines may apply for re-designation to User Class 1A.

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 $d. \ \ Disclosure. To qualify for an income-based adjustment, applicants must disclose all reportable income sources, including but not limited to employment, interest, benefits,$

investments, rentals, businesses, and other support. False reporting or failure to comply with these reporting requirements may result in immediate termination of the low-income status. Filing false data may also result in penalties under A.R.S. § 39-161.

e. Status Duration. Residential Users may qualify for an income-based adjustment under a temporary or long-term status.

2. New Move-In. A one-time new move-in adjustment may be made to User Fees based on documentation of the first two full months of actual metered water usage.

. . .

- 3. Winter Quarter Average. The Director may approve use of actual Volume data if the actual Volume data is lower than data used for the WQA calculation and:
- a. All challenges to changes in WQA must be submitted to the Department within sixty (60) Days of the User's receipt of the first invoice showing the billing changes.

. . .

- 4. Vacancy. A User may request an adjustment based on monthly vacancy information.
- a. The User must provide thirty (30) Days prior notice of vacation, tenant vacancy, or other verifiable cause of non-occupancy resulting in no discharge to the Public Sewer.

5. Irrigation Flow

A User's bill may be reduced to reflect the volume of water, as measured by an Irrigation Meter that is consumed in outdoor irrigation or similar outdoor use. Subject only to the following exceptions, all Irrigation Meters must be installed, read, and reported by a Water Company.

a. Grandfathered Status Exception. Only Users operating privately-owned Irrigation Meters who submitted annual irrigation adjustments for the 2015-2016 Fiscal Year are eligible for grandfathered status. Eligibility is also subject to the following:

- ii. Data Reporting. Grandfathered status Users must:
- 1) Have initially registered the User's name, property owner's name, Irrigation Meter make and model number, and Irrigation Meter location with the Department.

- F. Unauthorized Use of the Sewer.
- 1. Determination. Unauthorized Users of the Sewer may be identified by dye test, physical connection, CCTV, or a preponderance of evidence such as existing connection permits, pretreatment inspections, pretreatment permits, or other reasonable methods.

2. Responsibility for Fees. If testing or other evidence indicates a property is connected to the Public Sewer System, the Unauthorized User is responsible for any unpaid fees for the connection and discharge into the Public Sewer System. For purposes of this subsection (F), the term Unauthorized User means: (i) the Person(s) identified by a Water Company as a customer for water service to the property; or (ii) if there is no established water account, the Person(s) discharging to the Public Sewer from the property. If the Unauthorized User is not the owner of the property and the Unauthorized User does not pay any of the outstanding User Fees and interest, the owner of the property is responsible for the unpaid balance.

. . .

- ii. Waive all or part of the unpaid user fees based on undue hardship such as for those used to qualify for an income-based billing adjustment in Section 13.24.200(D)(1).
- d. Establishment of Connection Date. If evidence, such as a user account for the property, exists, the date of connection is presumed to be the date supported by the evidence. If a connection date cannot be established, the Department will utilize the Unauthorized User's first date of possession of the property as the connection date.
 - 3. User Fee Recovery.
- a. Fees. If a property is found to be connected to the Public Sewer System, and there is no user account associated with that property, the Unauthorized User will be billed an account activation fee, an unauthorized use recovery fee, and past due monthly user fees. These administrative fees are provided in Section 13.24.600, Table 4. If the Unauthorized User is not the owner of the property and the Unauthorized User does not pay any of the outstanding User Fees and interest, the owner of the property is responsible for the unpaid balance.

...

4. Legal Action Fee and Cost Recovery.

b. Lien and Judicial Action. Pursuant to A.R.S. § 11-264, the County may file a lien on a property for the nonpayment of User Fees. The County may also, pursuant to its general authority, pursue judicial enforcement for nonpayment of User Fees. The County reserves the right to take either action at any time if the payment of the fees is delinquent for more than ninety (90) Days.

G. Dye Testing

1. Determining Whether Property is Connected to the Public Sewer System. Where the Department does not have a record of an inspected Sewer connection permit for a property, a dye test may be performed at either the Department's or the User's request.

b. Findings. The Director, upon finding that a User's protest is justified, will adjust the established User Fee or User Class designation and make equitable reimbursements for overpayments consistent with the limitations of this chapter.

- I. Cost Recovery for Nonstandard Events.
- 1. Residential Misuse of a Sanitary Sewer Connection. The County reserves the right to reclassify a Residential User to Non-Residential User status and assign an applicable Strength Adjusted Rate to the User if monitoring or other reliable and verifiable information exists indicating the User is discharging Wastewater to the Public Sewer System that is inconsistent with Residential Strength Sanitary Sewage.
- 2. Hazardous Waste and Prohibited Substances. In addition to any User Fees established by this chapter, a User who is detected discharging any Hazardous Waste or any other prohibited substance into the Public Sewer System in violation of Chapter 13.36 of the Pima County Code will be subject to the increased cost of the treatment of the prohibited discharge. This provision will not preclude the Director from imposing the additional penalties provided in Chapter 13.36 of the Pima County Code.
- 3. Sanitary Sewer Overflow Cost Recovery. The County reserves the right to recover the Department's cost of remediating sanitary sewer impacts to public property resulting from Usercaused sanitary overflows.

13.24.300 Septage Authorization, Receiving, and Billing.

A. Account and Permit. No Person will discharge Septage into the Public Sewer System unless authorized by a Septage Discharge Permit or a temporary special authorization issued as required in Chapter 13.36 of the Pima County Code, in writing, by the Director. Each Septage Discharge Permit will require the permittee to establish and maintain a Septage discharge billing account with the Pima County Finance and Risk Management Department.

- B. Septage Discharge Fees.
- 1. Fee Requirement. Any Person discharging Septage into the Public Sewer System must pay Septage discharge fees.
- 2. Discharge Fee. The fee for any Person discharging Septage to any portion of the Public Sewer System is calculated using the per gallon rate provided in 13.24.600, Table 5.

- 1. User Fees. Agency-specific User Fees will be established based on a review of Department costs to provide service to each Agency. Factors involved in developing the User Fees include, but are not limited to:
- a. A fee reimbursing the Department for the increased costs to operate and maintain the non-public portion of the sanitary sewer system within the Agency, as well as cover the impact of the Agency on the Public Sewer System.

c. The Volume, Strength, or chemical data from the Agency discharge.

- 2. Pretreatment. For Agencies where the County does not have direct enforcement authority against the discharger, the Agency will be required to develop its own Pretreatment program by:
- a. Adopting a pretreatment sanitary sewer use ordinance that is no less stringent than as those provided in Chapter 13.36 Industrial Wastewater Ordinance of the Pima County Code; and

- 3. Capacity Management, Operations, and Maintenance (CMOM). When appropriate, CMOM, as well as spill prevention, may be specified to:
- a. Ensure that the operation and maintenance of the Agency's sanitary sewer system is in compliance with the Department's CMOM Permit, inclusive of:

4. Permissions and Assurances. The agreement will also provide the Department with authority to:

- c. Assure that there is payment of all connections and User Fees for each connection and User within the Agency boundaries.
- C. Access. Department Inspectors will have access at all reasonable times to metering devices on the Agency's sanitary sewers and other appurtenances specified within the agreement. Department maintenance personnel, equipment, and any other Department staff necessary to complete the agreed support tasks will have access at all reasonable times to manholes, metering devices, and any other appurtenances on the Agency's sanitary sewers as specified within the agreement.

Dear Honorable Chair and Members of the Board:

The Regional Wastewater Reclamation Advisory Committee (RWRAC) was established by the Board of Supervisors (Board) to act as the official advisory body on the Capital Improvement Program (CIP) planning and rate structure formulation to County government; annually review the proposed Regional Wastewater Reclamation Department's (RWRD) CIP and recommend to the governing body an annual and five-year Capital Program; and annually review the revenue requirements of the sanitary sewerage system and recommend to the governing body rate adjustments as required.

Each year, the Pima County Finance and Risk Management Department (FRMD) prepares a Financial Plan, which addresses the financial needs of RWRD based on the projected expenses and projected CIP for the current fiscal year and for four subsequent fiscal years.

The 2024 Financial Plan recommends the following:

- 1. Issuing \$296 million of new sewer revenue obligations to fund future CIP projects as follows:
 - a. \$54 million in Fiscal Year 2024-25,
 - b. \$67 million in Fiscal Year 2025-26,
 - c. \$82 million in Fiscal Year 2026-27, and
 - d. \$93 million in Fiscal Year 2027-28.
- 2. Using unrestricted cash to prepay debt as follows:
 - a. \$18.2 million in Fiscal Year 2024-25,
 - b. \$22.4 million in Fiscal Year 2025-26
 - c. \$22.3 million in Fiscal Year 2026-27, and
 - d. \$19.1 million in Fiscal Year 2027-28.
- 3. Maintain the current sewer revenue rates for Fiscal Year 2024-25. Beginning in Fiscal Year 2025-26, request an annual increase of 3% per year to the Sewer Utility Fee and an annual increase for four (4) years of 1.75% each to the Sewer Volume Fee and the Service Charge.

In August 2023, both Fitch Ratings and Standard and Poor's reaffirmed the County's current sewer debt rating of AA for the Sewer Revenue Obligations. The issued reports explained the analysis of the County's financial condition for its sewer debt. The bond ratings reflect the rating agencies' evaluation of the financial stability of the County and its ability to repay debt. As ratings increase, the interest rates offered by lenders decrease, reducing the overall debt cost to the County.

The RWRAC Financial Subcommittee discussed the FY 2024/2025 Financial Plan key assumptions, inflationary pressure on increased cost, and the impact of increased salaries and benefits due to implementation of the Pima County class and compensation study. These items were discussed to inform discussions about the potential need for increased user fee rates at the January 26, 2024, and February 15, 2024, meetings.

The full RWRAC committee reviewed the Rate Workbook at their February 22, 2024, meeting, where committee members were presented with two (2) scenarios for consideration which implemented user fee rate increases and discussed CIP projections through Fiscal Year 2027/2028. During the meeting, committee members voted to recommend to FRMD that the financial plan be based on the scenario with a gradual 1.75% sewer volume rate increase, beginning in FY2025/2026 and continuing for 4 consecutive years. In conjunction to that rate increase, an increase of 1.75% to the service charge would be instituted during the same time period. The sewer utility fee (previously known as connection fees) would also be increased by 3% annually. The motion passed nine (9) to two (2).

The draft FY 2024/2025 Financial Plan was reviewed and discussed during the March 28, 2024, RWRAC meeting. The RWRAC Financial Subcommittee met on April 9, 2024, to discuss and resolve any remaining questions regarding the financial plan. The meeting resulted in a unanimous vote by the subcommittee members to accept the financial plan as presented and recommend that the RWRAC support the plan.

During the April 25, 2024, RWRAC meeting, the RWRAC Financial Subcommittee Chair recommended to the full committee that the RWRAC support the FY 2024/2025 Financial Plan. After discussion amongst the committee and staff, the committee passed a motion unanimously, in support of the Financial Plan recommendations.

Therefore, the RWRAC recommends to the Pima County Board of Supervisors the approval of the RWRD FY2024/2025 Financial Plan.

The RWRAC appreciates the opportunity to provide our recommendation to the Board of Supervisors and we are available at your convenience for any questions or further discussion.

Re: Consideration of Proposed Pima County Sewer Rate Increase

The Pima County Finance and Risk Management Department, along with the Regional Wastewater Reclamation Department (RWRD), annually prepares a financial plan addressing the financial needs of RWRD based on projected expenses and capital improvements for the current fiscal year and the following four fiscal years.

The focus of the financial plan is to determine the optimal sewer rates needed to ensure that there is sufficient revenue to meet all operating and maintenance expenses, debt service payments, required reserves, and to maintain an adequate debt service ratio to maintain favorable bond ratings.

Annual Financial Evaluation

The Fiscal Year (FY) 2024/2025 Financial Plan recommended the adoption of a series of rate increases to be implemented at the start of FY 2025/2026 as follows:

- A three percent (3%) increase to the wastewater utility fee; and
- Annual increases for four (4) years of 1.75% the sewer volume fee; and
- Annual increases for four (4) years of 1.75% the service charge.

The increases were recommended to ensure sufficient revenues to meet all operating and maintenance expenses, debt service payments, and required reserves. The Regional Wastewater Reclamation Advisory Committee (RWRAC) reviewed the FY 2024/2025 Financial Plan and unanimously supported the plan and the recommendations (Attachment 1).

Reevaluation during the FY 2025/2026 budget planning process determined that the previously proposed rate increases would be insufficient to maintain the needed 1.3 debt service ratio due to inflationary pressure and increased costs to operations and maintenance expenses, resulting in the following updated rate increase recommendation:

- A three percent (3%) increase in the wastewater utility fee annually for four (4) years (FY 2026 - 2029); and
- A three percent (3%) increase to sewer volume rate in FY 2025/2026, followed by an annual 1.75% annual increase for the next three (3) years; and
- A three percent (3%) increase to the service charge in FY 2025/2026, followed by an annual increase of 1.75% for the next three (3) years.

The proposed fee increase was presented to the full Regional Wastewater Reclamation Advisory Committee (RWRAC) at the January 23, 2025, meeting for review and discussion. The committee members discussed the revised rate increase proposal and voted to support it as presented with nine (9) in favor, two (2) opposed, and two (2) members absent.

Next Steps and Public Notice Requirements

State statute establishes public notice and hearing requirements for rate increases, which requires one public hearing. To ensure that residents and customers have an opportunity to review the proposed increase and the supporting documents and provide input, the following public hearings have been scheduled:

Dear Honorable Chair and Members of the Board:

The Regional Wastewater Reclamation Advisory Committee (RWRAC) was established by the Board of Supervisors (Board) to act as the official advisory body on the Capital Improvement Program (CIP) planning and rate structure formulation to County government; annually review the proposed Regional Wastewater Reclamation Department's (RWRD) CIP and recommend to the governing body an annual and five-year Capital Program; and annually review the revenue requirements of the sanitary sewerage system and recommend to the governing body rate adjustments as required.

Each year, the Pima County Finance and Risk Management Department (FRMD) prepares a Financial Plan, which addresses the financial needs of RWRD based on the projected expenses and projected CIP for the current fiscal year and for four subsequent fiscal years.

The 2024 Financial Plan recommends the following:

- 1. Issuing \$296 million of new sewer revenue obligations to fund future CIP projects as follows:
 - a. \$54 million in Fiscal Year 2024-25,
 - b. \$67 million in Fiscal Year 2025-26,
 - c. \$82 million in Fiscal Year 2026-27, and
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 - a. \$18.2 million in Fiscal Year 2024-25,
 - b. \$22.4 million in Fiscal Year 2025-26
 - c. \$22.3 million in Fiscal Year 2026-27, and
 - d. \$19.1 million in Fiscal Year 2027-28.
- 3. Maintain the current sewer revenue rates for Fiscal Year 2024-25. Beginning in Fiscal Year 2025-26, request an annual increase of 3% per year to the Sewer Utility Fee and an annual increase for four (4) years of 1.75% each to the Sewer Volume Fee and the Service Charge.

In August 2023, both Fitch Ratings and Standard and Poor's reaffirmed the County's current sewer debt rating of AA for the Sewer Revenue Obligations. The issued reports explained the analysis of the County's financial condition for its sewer debt. The bond ratings reflect the rating agencies' evaluation of the financial stability of the County and its ability to repay debt. As ratings increase, the interest rates offered by lenders decrease, reducing the overall debt cost to the County.

The RWRAC Financial Subcommittee discussed the FY 2024/2025 Financial Plan key assumptions, inflationary pressure on increased cost, and the impact of increased salaries and benefits due to implementation of the Pima County class and compensation study. These items were discussed to inform discussions about the potential need for increased user fee rates at the January 26, 2024, and February 15, 2024, meetings.

The full RWRAC committee reviewed the Rate Workbook at their February 22, 2024, meeting, where committee members were presented with two (2) scenarios for consideration which implemented user fee rate increases and discussed CIP projections through Fiscal Year 2027/2028. During the meeting, committee members voted to recommend to FRMD that the financial plan be based on the scenario with a gradual 1.75% sewer volume rate increase, beginning in FY2025/2026 and continuing for 4 consecutive years. In conjunction to that rate increase, an increase of 1.75% to the service charge would be instituted during the same time period. The sewer utility fee (previously known as connection fees) would also be increased by 3% annually. The motion passed nine (9) to two (2).

The draft FY 2024/2025 Financial Plan was reviewed and discussed during the March 28, 2024, RWRAC meeting. The RWRAC Financial Subcommittee met on April 9, 2024, to discuss and resolve any remaining questions regarding the financial plan. The meeting resulted in a unanimous vote by the subcommittee members to accept the financial plan as presented and recommend that the RWRAC support the plan.

During the April 25, 2024, RWRAC meeting, the RWRAC Financial Subcommittee Chair recommended to the full committee that the RWRAC support the FY 2024/2025 Financial Plan. After discussion amongst the committee and staff, the committee passed a motion unanimously, in support of the Financial Plan recommendations.

Therefore, the RWRAC recommends to the Pima County Board of Supervisors the approval of the RWRD FY2024/2025 Financial Plan.

The RWRAC appreciates the opportunity to provide our recommendation to the Board of Supervisors and we are available at your convenience for any questions or further discussion.

Dear Honorable Chair and Members of the Board:

The Regional Wastewater Reclamation Advisory Committee (RWRAC) was established by the Board of Supervisors (BOS) to act as the official advisory body on the Regional Wastewater Reclamation Department (RWRD) Financial Plan and to annually review the proposed Financial Plan and recommend to the governing body an annual, five-year, and ten-year financial program. The RWRAC also has the responsibility of reviewing proposed Wastewater fee adjustments and ordinance changes.

The RWRAC began its review of the Department's proposal to modify the sewer volume rate, service charge, and the wastewater utility fee (previously known as connection fees) at the RWRAC Financial Subcommittee in January 2024. The full RWRAC committee reviewed the Rate Workbook on February 22, 2024, and after considering two scenarios voted to recommend to the Finance and Risk Management Department (FRMD) that the financial plan be based on the scenario with a gradual 1.75% sewer volume rate increase, beginning in FY 2025-2026 and continuing for 4 consecutive years. In conjunction with that rate increase, an increase of 1.75% to the service charge would be instituted during the same time period. The wastewater utility fee would also be increased by 3% annually during that timeframe. In a vote of nine (9) to two (2), the RWRAC passed the motion to recommend to the Pima County Board of Supervisors the proposed rate increases as presented in the FY 2024-2025 Rate Workbook and Financial Plan. A Letter of Support was forwarded to the Board on April 25, 2024 (see attached).

On January 15, 2025, the RWRAC Financial Subcommittee was presented with the initial draft Rate Workbook, which contained revisions to the previously proposed rate increase values. FRMD revised the rate increase, determining that the initial values were insufficient to maintain RWRD's debt service ratio above the 1.3 level in response to inflationary pressure and increased costs to operations and maintenance expenses. The FY 2025-2026 draft Rate Workbook presented a proposed 3% sewer volume rate increase beginning in FY 2025-2026, followed by an annual 1.75% annual increase for the next three (3) years. In conjunction to that rate increase, a 3% increase to the service charge would be instituted in FY 2025-2026, followed by an annual increase of 1.75% for the next three (3) years. The wastewater utility fee would be increased by 3% annually for the noted 4-year period (FY 2026 -2029). Extensive review by the Financial Subcommittee resulted in forwarding this scenario to the full RWAC committee for consideration. The information was presented to the full RWRAC at their January 23, 2025, meeting, for review and discussion. Based on the timeline requirements for ensuring the rate increase inclusion in the Board of Supervisor FY 2025-2026 budget approval process, the committee members discussed the revised rate increase proposal, providing continued support of the rate increase proposal as presented. The motion of support passed with a vote of nine (9) affirmatives, two (2) against, and two (2) members absent.

Therefore, the RWRAC recommends to the Pima County Board of Supervisors the approval of the RWRD FY 2025-2026 proposed 3% sewer volume rate increase, followed by an annual 1.75% annual increase for the next three (3) years. In conjunction with that rate increase, a 3% increase to the service charge would be instituted in FY 2025-2026, followed by an annual increase of 1.75% for the next three (3) years. The wastewater utility fee would also be increased by 3% annually for the noted 4-year period (FY 2026 - 2029).

The RWRAC appreciates the opportunity to provide our recommendation to the Board of Supervisors and we are available at your convenience for any questions or further discussion.






O&M Target Budget History











Electricity Usage vs. Expense









Proposed Sewer User Rates




Comparison of Pima County Sewer Fees



Sewer Outreach Subsidy (SOS)

- The Department has a subsidy program for lowincome customers.
- The program is a tiered rate structure based on federal poverty guidelines.
- Depending on income, customers may qualify for a 25%, 50% or 75% discount on their monthly sewer fees, including the monthly service fee.
 - With the proposed rate increase, in the first year, a customer with a 75% discount would pay \$8.79 per month on an average residential bill or \$105.52 annually.
- The Department is reviewing the SOS program and will work with Tucson Water and Community Services to see if the program can be expanded to include more low income residents.

Over the past 7 years, the number of residents participating in the lowincome assistance program has remained steady. The majority of the participants qualify at the 75% discount level. In Fiscal Year 2023-2024, the average monthly number of participants was 5,120. Sewer revenue not billed from the program was over \$1.2 million

Fee Increase for Wastewater Utility Fees (Connection Fees)

- The proposed fee increase to the Wastewater Utility Fees is 3% in Fiscal Year 2026 and 3% over the next three fiscal years through FY 2029.
- The fee is based on the water meter size that is installed as this has a direct impact on sewer system capacity.

Calculating The Cost of Capacity

- Wastewater Utility Fees are based on the cost to provide capacity.
- The cost of capacity formula is determined by adding the value of the current system assets available to serve new customers divided by the available system capacity for new customers.
- In 2017 the cost of capacity was calculated to be \$16.50 per gallon.
- Today, using the same formula, the cost of capacity is \$21.34 per gallon
- This is a 29.3% increase in cost to provide capacity to new connections.

Calculating The Cost of Capacity

- Using the Cost of Capacity formula to arrive at the connection fee per water meter size:
 - 75 gallons of water per person per day (80 gallons/person/day is ADEQ regulatory requirement)
 - Average number of persons per household = 2.5 (2023 census data)
 - Infiltration rate at 17.5%
 - 75 x 2.5 x 1.175 = 220.3 gallons per day
 - \$21.34 x 220.3 = **\$4,701** for standard residential meter size cost to connect





Average Monthly Cost of Utilities in the U.S.








Capital Improvement Program

Each year, the Pima County Finance and Risk Management Department (FRMD) prepares a Financial Plan, which addresses the financial needs of RWRD based on the projected expenses and projected CIP for the current fiscal year and for four subsequent fiscal years.

The 2025 Financial Plan recommends the following:

- 1. Issuing \$287 million of new sewer revenue obligations to fund future CIP projects as follows:
 - a. \$60 million in FY 2025-26,
 - b. \$55 million in FY 2026-27,
 - c. \$86 million in FY 2027-28, and
 - d. \$86 million in FY 2028-29.
- 2. Using unrestricted cash to prepay debt as follows:
 - a. \$21.2 million in FY 2025-26,
 - b. \$15.8 million in FY 2026-27
 - c. \$13.9 million in FY 2027-28, and
 - d. \$14.2 million in FY 2028-29.
- 3. Beginning in Fiscal Year 2025-26 request annual increases of 3% per year to the Wastewater Utility Fee through Fiscal Year 2028-29 and an increase of 3% to the Sewer Volume Fee and the Service Charge in fiscal year 2025-26 followed by annual increases of 1.75% through Fiscal Year 2028-29.

In September 2024, both Fitch Ratings and Standard and Poor's (S&P) reaffirmed the County's current sewer debt rating of AA for the Sewer Revenue Obligations. The issued reports explained the analysis of the County's financial condition for its sewer debt. The bond ratings reflect the rating agencies evaluation of the financial stability of the County and its ability to repay debt. As ratings increase, the interest rates offered by lenders decrease reducing the overall debt cost to the County.

The RWRAC Financial Subcommittee held multiple discussions regarding the County-established key financial metrics which FRMD utilized to manage the RWRD Enterprise Fund and develop RWRD's Financial plan. During the discussions beginning on September 12, 2024, the subcommittee was informed that the key goals of the financial requirement are established by the rating agencies in order to maintain Pima County's AA rating for issuing debt.

FRMD informed the subcommittee that S&P has already noted that RWRD's 1.3 ratio is below what is normally expected for AA rated debt. It was confirmed that the rating agencies are looking at RWRD's whole financial portfolio including cash reserves, county pay-as-you-go policies and the fact that RWRD debt is limited to a shorter life span than other utilities, to determine RWRD's AA rating. During the November 5, 2024, subcommittee meeting, FRMD was charged with the creation of a proposed Board of Supervisors policy for the maintenance and use of reserves for the Wastewater Reclamation Enterprise Fund, outlining the process for reaching and maintaining the targeted cash reserves and their specific uses. The point of the RWRD reserves is to secure and maintain the credit rating to provide sufficient working capital to meet departmental cash flow needs, to ensure stable and predictable rate structure and to provide one-time funds for unforeseen expenditures related to emergencies.

The full RWRAC committee reviewed the Rate Workbook at their February 22, 2024, meeting, where committee members voted to recommend to FRMD that the financial plan be based on the scenario with a gradual 1.75% sewer volume rate increase, beginning in FY2025/2026 and continuing for 4 consecutive years. In conjunction to that rate increase, an increase of 1.75% to the service charge would be instituted during the same time period. The sewer utility fee (previously known as connection fees) would also be increased by 3% annually. The motion passed nine (9) to two (2). The rate increases were utilized in the FY 2025-2026 Financial Plan presented to the RWRAC Financial Subcommittee on February 19, 2025, where the subcommittee discussed and resolved any remaining questions regarding the financial plan. The meeting resulted in a unanimous vote by the subcommittee members to accept the financial plan as presented and recommend that the RWRAC support the plan.

During the May 22, 2025, RWRAC meeting, the committee performed a final review of the 2025 Financial Plan. In a vote of 7 in support of the plan and 1 abstention, the RWRAC passed the motion in support of the Financial Plan recommendations.

Therefore, the RWRAC recommends to the Pima County Board of Supervisors the approval of the RWRD FY 2025-2026 Financial Plan.

Executive Summary

BACKGROUND

On an annual basis, Pima County reviews the financial information for the sanitary sewer services provided by its Regional Wastewater Reclamation Department. The focus of the review is to determine the optimal sewer rates needed to ensure that the County has sufficient revenues to meet all operating and maintenance expenses, debt service payments, required reserves, and to maintain an adequate debt service ratio to obtain favorable bond ratings. This enables the County to continue to issue debt for the anticipated improvements in the Capital Improvement Program.

RECOMMENDATIONS

Based on this review, the Finance and Risk Management Department is recommending:

- 1. Issuing \$287 million of new sewer revenue obligations to fund future capital improvement projects as follows:
 - a. \$60 million in Fiscal Year 2025-26,
 - b. \$55 million in Fiscal Year 2026-27,
 - c. \$86 million in Fiscal Year 2027-28, and
 - d. \$86 million in Fiscal Year 2028-29.
- 2. Using unrestricted cash to prepay debt as follows:
 - a. \$21.2 million in Fiscal Year 2025-26,
 - b. \$15.8 million in Fiscal Year 2026-27
 - c. \$13.9 million in Fiscal Year 2027-28, and
 - d. \$14.2 million in Fiscal Year 2028-29.
- 3. Beginning in Fiscal Year 2025-26 request annual increases of 3% per year to the Wastewater Utility Fee through Fiscal Year 2028-29 and an increase of 3% to the Sewer Volume Fee and the Service Charge in fiscal year 2025-26 followed by annual increases of 1.75% through Fiscal Year 2028-29.

INTRODUCTION

This report addresses the financial needs for the Regional Wastewater Reclamation Department based on the projected revenues, projected expenses, and projected capital improvement program expenses for Fiscal Year 2024-25 through Fiscal Year 2028-29.

KEY ASSUMPTIONS

The Finance and Risk Management Department (Finance) worked with the Regional Wastewater Reclamation Department (Department), County Administration and the Regional Wastewater Reclamation Advisory Committee to develop these assumptions. The major assumptions include:

- relatively slow growth in the customer base,
- an increase in user fees at the rate of population growth with annual rate increases beginning in September 2025,
- an increase in utility fees of 3% annually beginning in September 2025,
- a capital improvement program of approximately \$408 million,
- additional sewer revenue debt of \$287 million with 10–15-year maturities assuming additional funding is identified for the Sahuarita Reclamation Facility, and
- using unrestricted cash for the prepayment of debt.

Appendix A further describes the assumptions used in this report.

METHODOLOGY

Finance used the following methods to determine optimal sewer rates.

- 1. Analyzed the revenue generating potential of the Department's existing sewer rates.
- Identified the projected cash needs of the Department for upcoming capital projects, anticipated operating and maintenance costs, debt service payments for existing debt, anticipated debt service payments for planned debt, and planned prepayment of future debt.
- 3. Compared the revenue generating potential of the existing rates to the Department's identified cash needs to determine whether rate changes may be necessary. Finance used an industry standard debt service ratio comparing revenues less operating and maintenance costs to debt service requirements for this analysis.
- 4. Analyzed the Department's cash balances, the effects of Arizona's local expenditure limitation on the Department, and the Department's debt ratings.

The estimates used for this analysis are as of February 2025 for Operations and March 2025 for Capital. Projected amounts change throughout the year as plans are refined and actual costs are determined.

REVENUES

Fees:

The County's wastewater system generates revenues from two major sources, sewer user fees and wastewater utility fees.

User fees are the combination of: (1) the standard service fee and (2) the volume rate fee. Rate increases or decreases depend upon future growth in the number of new users and volume usage rate. The Department will not collect user fee revenues above the current level without a rate increase, or growth in these two factors. The last rate increase took effect in June 2017.


Utility fees are charged when new construction connects to the sewer system for the first time or when renovation of existing structures requires additional or larger water meters. Utility fees are based primarily on water meter size, with fees increasing as water meter size increases. The principal factor that will affect revenues from future utility fees will be the volume of new construction within the County.

For this financial analysis, future user fees are projected to increase based on annual rate increases beginning in Fiscal Year 2026 along with the estimated rate of population growth issued by the University of Arizona Economic & Business Research Center. These estimates project population growth rates to be between 0.595 percent and 0.675 percent between Fiscal Year 2024-25 and Fiscal Year 2028-29, as indicated in Appendix A.

Total Revenues:

From Fiscal Year 2024-25 through Fiscal Year 2028-29, total revenues are expected to increase \$14.8 million or 7.7 percent. Figure 1 shows Total Revenues by Type, for Fiscal Year 2023-24, including projections through Fiscal Year 2028-29, with a portion of those revenues attributable to utility fees.

Figure 1: Total Revenues by Type



As detailed in Table 1, Annual Utility Fees are expected to increase to \$17.2 million over the next four years.



CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM

As shown in Figure 2, capital expenditures are estimated to be \$408 million through the end of Fiscal Year 2028-29 assuming additional funding is identified for Sahuarita Wastewater Reclamation Facility.

Figure 2: Capital Project Costs



Projected future capital expenditures may change throughout the year as plans are refined and actual construction costs are determined. This analysis uses the Department's estimate of capital projects as of March 2025. A summary of the capital projects for Fiscal Year 2024-25 through Fiscal Year 2028-29 can be found in Appendix C, Summary of Planned Capital Improvement Projects as of March 2025. As discussed on page 11, in the Expenditure Limitation section, to comply with the expenditure limitation, the County must continue to borrow funds for the majority of the \$408 million planned capital improvements program, even though the County has cash available in the fund.

OPERATING AND MAINTENANCE EXPENSES





Figure 3: Operating and Maintenance Expenses

The Department is expecting to complete the Fiscal Year 2024-25 with Operating and Maintenance (O&M) expenses of \$103.8 million. The budget for Fiscal Year 2025-26 has not yet been approved by the Board of Supervisors. For analysis purposes, the Department's Requested Budget of \$108.7 million was used for Fiscal Year 2025-26. The Department's Requested Budget represents an increase of approximately \$4.9 million over the Fiscal Year 2024-25 forecasted amount. This is primarily due to increases in employee compensation and the rising cost of operating supplies. Employee compensation is expected to be \$36.9 million in Fiscal Year 2025-26, representing 34 percent of total operating expenses. The plan also assumes operating and maintenance expenses increase 3.0 percent in Fiscal Year 2026-27 and in each year thereafter. At this rate of increase, O&M costs are expected to increase by approximately \$8.5 million between Fiscal Year 2025-26 and Fiscal Year 2028-29. Figure 3 shows the increase in O&M expenses from Fiscal Year 2023-24 to Fiscal Year 2028-29.

SEWER REVENUE DEBT FINANCING

As of June 30, 2024, Pima County had \$343.8 million of sewer revenue debt outstanding. The County issued \$45.5 million in sewer revenue obligations in October 2024 that provided \$50 million for capital projects. The County plans to issue an additional \$287 million over the next four years. Figure 4 shows the amounts and timing of the future debt issues.





DEBT SERVICE PAYMENTS

Total debt service payments are expected to remain constant over the next few years. The County anticipates issuing additional debt as shown in Figure 4 with 10-15-year maturity dates and utilizing unrestricted cash to prepay debt. Debt service for Fiscal Year 2024-25 will be \$63.5 million, with the use of \$18 million in unrestricted cash to prepay a portion of the 2016 Sewer Obligations.




Figure 5: Debt Service Payments

Figure 5 shows the debt service payments from Fiscal Year 2024-25 and the projected payments through Fiscal Year 2028-29.

As shown in Table 2, when planned new debt is issued, the debt service payments without prepayments would have been \$90.8 million in Fiscal Year 2024-25, with an average debt service payment of \$81.8 million between now and Fiscal Year 2028-29. However, if the Department continues to use unrestricted cash to prepay debt, the Department's highest future debt service payment will occur in fiscal year 2026-27 at \$64.7 million, with an average payment of \$64.1 million through fiscal year 2028-29.

CASH RESERVES AND CASH BALANCES

The Pima County Regional Wastewater Reclamation Enterprise Fund has unrestricted cash and several types of restricted and designated cash accounts to meet the various debt covenants and to maintain an emergency fund that enables the County to handle unexpected events. Appendix D, Cash Position Assuming the Prepayment of \$83.2 Million of Debt between 2024-25 and 2028-29, shows the balances and projected balances of the cash accounts. As of Finance and Risk Management's February 2025, Cash Flow report, the Fund will have an estimated \$167.3 million in cash at the end of Fiscal Year 2024-25, of which \$64.5 million is currently estimated to be unrestricted. The restricted and designated cash accounts described below include the remaining \$102.8 million balances:

1. **Emergency Reserve Fund** (Unrestricted) – In Fiscal Year 2009-2010, the Board of Supervisors established a \$20 million Emergency Reserve Fund. The fund is for unexpected events affecting the ongoing operations of the sewer system.

- 2. **Operating Reserve Fund** (Partially Restricted) Various debt instruments require the County to maintain a 30-day balance of anticipated operating expenses. The County maintains 90 days of anticipated operating expenses in this fund, the remaining 60 days of reserve of cash is designated by management for operating expenses. By the end of Fiscal Year 2024-25, these reserves are projected to be \$25.9 million.
- 3. Debt Service Reserve Fund (Restricted) This restricted fund is used to set aside cash for sewer debt service payments. This is comprised of one-half of the maximum annual debt service which is retained in an outside bank account and will be applied to the final debt service payments for the respective debt. In addition, the County makes monthly transfers of one-twelfth of budgeted annual debt service to ensure cash is available for the annual debt service payments. By the end of Fiscal Year 2024-25, these debt reserves are projected to be \$41.5 million.
- 4. **Debt Proceeds** (Restricted) This restricted fund is used to restrict the debt proceeds received until the funds are spent for the various capital projects. By the end of Fiscal Year 2024-25, this reserve is projected to be \$15.4 million.

RATING AGENCY DEBT SERVICE RATIO

Net Operating Revenue to Debt Service:

Net operating revenues are the regular, recurring revenues generated by operating the sewer system that remain after paying for sewer system operating expenses. Net operating revenues must be sufficient to do two things: (1) cover the required debt service payments and required reserves and (2) generate a sufficient margin that enables the County to pay non-operating costs and maintain additional reserves for unforeseen events.

Bond rating agencies use a basic ratio of net operating revenues to debt service to evaluate the financial health of governmental sewer operations. A ratio of 1 indicates that net operating revenues match debt service payments meaning net operating revenues are 100 percent of debt service payments. A ratio of less than 1, for example, 0.9, indicates that net revenues are less than, or in this example 90 percent of, debt service payments. A ratio of greater than 1, for example, 1.3, indicates that net revenues are larger than, or in this example 130 percent of, debt service payments.

Bond rating agencies have historically expected to see governmental sewer operators set rates that maintain a rating agency debt service ratio of 1.3 or greater. This enables governments to cover debt service payments and cash reserves, while making interest rates attractive to investors.

Since the beginning of the Regional Optimization Master Plan, Pima County Administration has committed to setting rates that maintain a rating agency debt service ratio of 1.3 or greater. The Regional Wastewater Reclamation Advisory Committee formally stated this goal in a letter to Pima County's Board of Supervisors. Pima County's sewer revenue debt is highly rated, and the County can sell debt for its Capital Improvement Program at low interest rates.

In recent years, the County has not needed to use its unrestricted financial reserves to pay for unforeseen events and the Fund has accumulated a significant balance (see Cash Balances section). Therefore, the County's Finance and Risk Management Department continues to recommend the prepayment of sewer revenue debt discussed in the Debt Service Payments section while carefully monitoring unrestricted cash balances to ensure they stay at reasonable levels.

Appendix B provides more detail of the projected revenues, expenses, net operating revenues, and debt service ratios of the system.

EXPENDITURE LIMITATION

Impact to Wastewater Projects:

Due to the expenditure limitation restrictions in Article IX, Section 20, of the Arizona Constitution, the County is limited on its use of available cash to fund capital improvements. The expenditure limitation restricts the use of local revenues, which consist of primary property taxes, impact fees, utility fees, including all fees charged for sewer services, and any other fees charged for County services. The County may not exceed the expenditure limit even if the County has cash available to spend.

To comply with the expenditure limitation restrictions, the County must fund sewer capital projects with borrowed funds and use available unrestricted cash to pay the debt service.

BOND RATING AGENCIES

In September 2024, both Fitch Ratings and Standard and Poor's reaffirmed the County's current sewer debt rating of AA for the Sewer Revenue Obligations. The issued reports explained the analysis of the County's financial condition for its sewer debt. The bond ratings reflect the rating agencies evaluation of the financial stability of the County and its ability to repay debt. As ratings increase, the interest rates offered by lenders decrease reducing the overall debt cost to the County.

RECOMMENDATIONS

The Regional Wastewater Reclamation Advisory Committee Recommendation:

During Fiscal Year 2024-25 the Finance and Risk Management Department met with the Regional Wastewater Reclamation Advisory Committee to discuss the Department's financial activity and condition. The Finance and Risk Management Department presented the 2025 Financial Plan at the May 22, 2025, Regional Wastewater Reclamation Advisory Committee (RWRAC) meeting. At that meeting the committee voted in support of the 2025 Financial Plan and Finance's recommendations outlined in the plan.

Appendix E

Debt Service Ratio Calculations

The County has historically maintained the goals of a rating agency debt service ratio of 1.3 or greater as discussed in the Debt Service Ratio section. This ratio is used by the rating agencies and serves as a good financial planning tool.

In addition to the rating agency debt service ratio, Pima County's sewer revenue debt has an additional ratio that is mandated by the debt covenants. This debt covenant ratio is used by external parties to determine Pima County's compliance with contractual obligations related to its debt. While this debt covenant ratio should be considered when setting rates, it should not be used as a financial planning tool in the same way that the rating agency debt service ratio is used. By setting rates to maintain a rating agency debt service ratio at 1.3 or greater, the County will comply with the required debt covenant ratio.

The two debt service ratio calculations are as follows:

1) Rating Agency Debt Service - The Bond Rating Agencies calculate the debt service ratio using the excess of net revenues over the required debt service. The rating agencies require a 1.3x debt ratio be maintained. A debt service ratio lower than 1.3 could cause rating agencies to downgrade future sewer debt from its current rating. The impact of a downgrade would be additional interest costs for future debt. This is the most conservative of the two calculations.

2) **Sewer Obligation Debt Service Ratio** – The Sewer Obligation Debt Service Ratio is calculated by taking the net operating revenues plus unrestricted cash balance from the beginning of the fiscal year, over the amount of Debt. The County is required to maintain a 1.2x Debt Service Ratio. Failure to maintain a 1.2x triggers a default and provides a mechanism to force the County to increase rates.

Pima County Wastewater seeks input on first proposed rate hikes in eight years

It's a big job, but someone has to do it.

Every day, the <u>Pima County Regional Wastewater</u> Reclamation Department (RWRD) handles the task of making sure the County's sanitary sewer system continues to function properly.

That means overseeing the two large water reclamation facilities that serve the metro Tucson area along with five smaller ones that provide service from Green Valley to Mt. Lemmon. It also means managing more than 3,500 miles of sewer conveyance lines that stretch across the entire

County, along with essential infrastructure such as the pump stations that keep sewage flowing smoothly from one point to the next.

It's a role that requires vigilance around the clock. The department maintains a 24-hour emergency line and they pride themselves on swift responses to everything from odor complaints to damaged manhole covers.

Despite the vastness of the department's job, the sewer rates that provide all funding for RWRD have remained steady for the last eight years. This year, the department is proposing a series of rate increases, the first since 2017.

The fees are part of an annual financial plan prepared by RWRD along with the <u>Pima County Finance</u> and <u>Risk Management Department</u>, designed to address the department's financial needs for the current fiscal year and the following four fiscal years.

"Going eight years without the need for a rate increase is a remarkable achievement," said RWRD Director Jackson Jenkins. "Our department is committed to providing exceptional service for our customers, and allocating all available funds and resources efficiently is part of that."

In keeping with its commitment to public transparency, RWRD has held two public hearings on the proposed increases. They will hold a third meeting Thursday, March 27, from 8-9 a.m., at Abrams Public Health Center, 3950 S. Country Club Road. The public can attend either <u>virtually</u> or in-person.

"We want to ensure that the public has a chance to review these new rates and get a better understanding of what the changes would mean," Jenkins said.

The fees will be considered by the Pima County Board of Supervisors at their June 17, 2025, meeting. The final versions of the proposed increases will be available to the public for review on Pima County's website prior to the meeting.

Sewer fees are RWRD's only source of revenue – both the monthly sewer user fees paid by individuals in their monthly water bill and the one-time sewer connection fees required for connecting new buildings to the public sewer system. Customers will see the sewer fees included on their monthly water bill.

"It's based on how much water you use," Jenkins said. "We use a household's average usage in the winter months to estimate what to charge them for sewer usage, because you can't measure the flow of sewage going through a little four-inch line leaving your house."

The department has more than one program designed to ensure that sewer fees do not become burdensome, including a <u>subsidy program</u> that allows low-income customers to qualify for discounts of up to 75%. Individuals who are out of town for a month or longer can also <u>apply</u> to have their regular sewer fees suspended during that time.

Jenkins said the department is working to see if the subsidy program can be expanded to include more low-income residents. During the previous fiscal year, more than 5,000 individuals qualified for the program every month.

RWRD has taken other steps to benefit the community in recent years, including making some significant technological advances. More than a decade ago, the department modernized its central water reclamation facilities, making significant upgrades at the Tres Ríos facility and replacing the old Roger Road plant with the state-of-the-art <u>Agua Nueva facility</u>.

These changes have considerably improved the efficiency of the wastewater treatment process. They have also helped to ensure that the department meets high standards for the water it processes; reclaimed water is used to recharge the aquifer, for field irrigation, and to replenish the Santa Cruz River.

That's not the only green-friendly accomplishment RWRD can boast of. In 2021, the department began operating a <u>facility at the Tres Ríos plant</u> that converts waste gas generated during the sewage treatment process into clean-burning natural gas.

This renewable gas is sold to Southwest Gas at market rates, thus creating an additional revenue stream for the department, repurposing a waste product, and providing a green-friendly alternative to fossil-fuel natural gas.

"We work to keep our daily operations as environmentally friendly as possible," Jenkins said. "That's part of our commitment to protecting the community, making smart use of our resources, and serving as a responsible steward of the environment."



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Pima County Wastewater Department seeks public's input on future of former Roger Road plant site

PIMA COUNTY, March 19, 2025 – The <u>Pima County Regional Wastewater Reclamation</u> <u>Department</u> (RWRD) is seeking the public's input for the reuse of the site of a former wastewater facility.

The Roger Road Wastewater Reclamation Facility closed in December 2013, when it was replaced by the new, state-of-the-art Agua Nueva Water Reclamation Facility.

Since then, the site of the former plant – located at 2600 W. Sweetwater Drive — has stood vacant. Now, the County hopes to revitalize the site, which includes almost 50 acres adjacent to the Santa Cruz River, the Chuck Huckelberry Loop, and the City of Tucson's Sweetwater Wetlands Park.

Got ideas? RWRD is inviting the public to share its thoughts on how the site should be utilized by taking a short survey. It will run through March 28, and can be accessed here.

"This property has so much potential," said Kimberly Baeza, permit and regulatory compliance officer with RWRD. "We are so excited to explore the possibilities of transforming this unique site into a beautiful and functional space that will benefit the entire community."

Baeza said the survey's results will inform future development of the property and help it benefit the community for years to come.

RWRD and its consultant on the Roger Road project, the <u>Center for Creative Land</u> <u>Recycling</u>, are also holding community workshops where the public can share their ideas more directly. The next workshop will be held Thursday, April 24, from 6 to 8 p.m., at the <u>Ellie Towne Flowing Wells Community Center</u>, 1660 W. Ruthrauff Road.

The site of the former Roger Road facility is currently classified as a brownfields site, which means that remediation must take place before it can be reused. Cleanup of the site is currently underway and is expected to be completed this summer.

The County received a \$492,681 Brownfields Cleanup Grant from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency in 2024 to remove lead-based paint and asbestos from the site. The EPA and the Arizona Department of Environmental Quality have also invested around \$280,000 in environmental and reuse assessments of the property.

The <u>Pima County Regional Wastewater Reclamation Department</u> provides management, operations and maintenance, and design services of the sanitary sewer system, including the conveyance and treatment infrastructure, which includes more than 3,400 miles of sewer conveyance piping, 29 pump stations, two metropolitan water reclamation facilities and seven sub-regional facilities.

Effect of conservation

The district charges a user \$3.63 per 100 cubic feet of estimated sewage. That works out to \$3.63 for every 748 gallons, Jenkins said.

For eight years, the "average residential customer" in Pima County generated 700 cubic feet of sewage per month — 5,236 gallons — based on that winter quarter average water consumption, Jenkins said. That customer paid the district a monthly volume charge of \$25.41.

Then, last year, the average residential usage dropped to 600 cubic feet per month, "the lowest winter quarter average ever," Jenkins said. The decline is indicative of a "very conservation-minded" community, he said, and is consistent with a trend. A quarter-century ago, that average was 1,100 cubic feet per month.

Reduced volume results from both conscious and involuntary decisions. Beyond water conservation practices, "almost every new house" has low-flow toilets, shower heads and fixtures, Jenkins said. "Especially on newer houses, there is a lot of pressure to become conservation oriented."

The 600-cubic-feet-per-month volume is "a great number," Jenkins said. "But we lost some revenue last year going forward." Some of that revenue loss is offset by growth, which is approximately 1% per year, he added.

Proposal goes through review

"Every year, the department, in conjunction with the finance department for the county," performs a financial analysis and an annual report, Jenkins said. "It looks at our projected costs and revenues to determine if any rate increases are required."

The annual financial plan, with proposed increases, was reviewed by the Regional Wastewater Reclamation Advisory Committee. It voted to support the plan and its recommendations at a Jan. 23 meeting.

The district held three public meetings in March to discuss the proposed increases.

Pima County Supervisors are holding a public hearing on the rate increase proposal at a June 17 meeting. Final versions of the proposed increases will be available to the public for review on Pima County's website prior to that meeting, the department said.

If approved, the increases would be effective July 1 and show up on August bills. Jenkins said the increases would raise an additional \$2.5 million next year.

Pima County Wastewater seeks input on first proposed rate hikes in eight years

It's a big job, but someone has to do it.

Every day, the Pima County Regional Wastewater Reclamation Department (RWRD) handles the task of making sure the County's sanitary sewer system continues to function properly.

That means overseeing the two large water reclamation facilities that serve the metro Tucson area along with five smaller ones that provide service from Green Valley to Mount Lemmon. It also means managing more than 3,500 miles of sewer conveyance lines that stretch across the entire County,

along with essential infrastructure such as the pump stations that keep sewage flowing smoothly from one point to the next.

It's a role that requires vigilance around the clock. The department maintains a 24-hour emergency line and they pride themselves on swift responses to everything from odor complaints to damaged manhole covers.

Despite the vastness of the department's job, the sewer rates that provide all funding for RWRD have remained steady for the last eight years. This year, the department is proposing a series of rate increases, the first since 2017.

The fees are part of an annual financial plan prepared by RWRD along with the Pima County Finance and Risk Management Department, designed to address the department's financial needs for the current fiscal year and the following four fiscal years.

"Going eight years without the need for a rate increase is a remarkable achievement," said RWRD Director Jackson Jenkins. "Our department is committed to providing exceptional service for our customers, and allocating all available funds and resources efficiently is part of that."

In keeping with its commitment to public transparency, RWRD has held three public hearings on the proposed increases. Public comments on the increases can be submitted here until May 21, 2025.

"We want to ensure that the public has a chance to review these new rates and get a better understanding of what the changes would mean," Jenkins said.

The fees will be considered by the Pima County Board of Supervisors at their June 17, 2025, meeting. The final versions of the proposed increases are available to the public for review at RWRD's official website.

Sewer fees are RWRD's only source of revenue – both the monthly sewer user fees paid by individuals in their monthly water bill and the one-time sewer connection fees required for connecting new buildings to the public sewer system. Customers will see the sewer fees included on their monthly water bill.

"It's based on how much water you use," Jenkins said. "We use a household's average usage in the winter months to estimate what to charge them for sewer usage, because you can't measure the flow of sewage going through a little four-inch line leaving your house."

The department has more than one program designed to ensure that sewer fees do not become burdensome, including a subsidy program that allows low-income customers to qualify for discounts of up to 75%. Individuals who are out of town for a month or longer can also apply to have their regular sewer fees suspended during that time.

Jenkins said the department is working to see if the subsidy program can be expanded to include more low-income residents. During the previous fiscal year, more than 5,000 individuals qualified for the program every month.

RWRD has taken other steps to benefit the community in recent years, including making some significant technological advances. More than a decade ago, the department modernized its central water reclamation facilities, making significant upgrades at the Tres Ríos facility and replacing the old Roger Road plant with the state-of-the-art Agua Nueva facility.

These changes have considerably improved the efficiency of the wastewater treatment process. They have also helped to ensure that the department meets high standards for the water it processes; reclaimed water is used to recharge the aquifer, for field irrigation, and to replenish the Santa Cruz River.

That's not the only green-friendly accomplishment RWRD can boast of. In 2021, the department began operating a facility at the Tres Ríos plant that converts waste gas generated during the sewage treatment process into clean-burning natural gas.

This renewable gas is sold to Southwest Gas at market rates, thus creating an additional revenue stream for the department, repurposing a waste product, and providing a green-friendly alternative to fossil-fuel natural gas.

"We work to keep our daily operations as environmentally friendly as possible," Jenkins said. "That's part of our commitment to protecting the community, making smart use of our resources, and serving as a responsible steward of the environment."

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Public Comment Responses – Summary

The Public Comment Form regarding the Pima County Regional Wastewater Reclamation Department (RWRD) proposed ordinance revisions to the Pima County Code, Title 13, Chapter 24 Sanitary Sewer User Fees and Chapter 20 Sanitary Sewer Construction, Connection, and Fees (Code) was made publicly available on April 18, 2025. A summary of the responses received is noted below:

- Respondents noted that the majority of their water usage was for irrigation rather than sewage. One response indicated that the proposed sewer user fee increases, the method used to calculate residential sewer bills is inaccurate and inequitable because it does not take into account non-sewage water usage.
- Respondents indicated that their water bill is high and continued sewer user fee
 increases were excessive and unnecessary. Some responses pertained directly to the City
 of Tucson/Tucson Water differential water rates, water quality, or sale of water, indicating
 that some residents believed the proposed increases are directly related to City of
 Tucson/Tucson Water.
- Respondents questioned the need for the proposed sewer user fee increases, suggesting that wages and profits within the County or department are excessive and need to be reevaluated. Some responses suggested that state, county, and city funds be used to offset costs, and budgets should be reviewed. Several respondents suggested that funds obtained through the implementation of the proposed increase would be appropriated for other, non-department usage or as profit. Other responses questioned services provided by other county departments (e.g. Department of Transportation) and suggested the County re-evaluate expenditures.
- Respondents indicated that the increases are necessary in order to address the lack of a
 rate increase in 8 years, rising costs, and the need to maintain the sewer system. One
 response suggested annual Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA) be applied to the sewer
 user fees, while another suggested differential sewer rates be applied similar to City of
 Tucson/Tucson Water proposed rates. Respondents requested that the proposed
 increases be efficient, effective, equitable, and modest.
- Respondents indicated that they are already experiencing financial hardship due to inflation and life events (e.g. retirement, health problems, loss of family members) and increased sewer user fees would be harmful.

Comments	I believe the revision should essentially be more futureproof to reduce administrative burdens. Given that the rates haven't changed in 8 years, it would be a great reference to use the COLA applied to each of those years. 2017-2%, 2018-2.8%, 2019-1.6%, 2020-1.3%, 2021-5.9%, 2022-8.7%, 2023-3.2%, 2024-2.5%. The total combined is 28% and average is 3.5%. We should increase all fees as proposed for 2026, and increase per COLA each year thereafter. This would reduce the need to revisit this until 2029 when preparing the 2030 budget. If expenses and fees collected created a surplus of more than 2.5%, it could be a decrease or set to 0% for every 5th year such as 2030, 2035, 2040 to align with half-decade assessments and readjustments. Otherwise the major adjustment would be set based on actual expenses since this adjustment or expected cost increases for 2030, which is keeping the same COLA rate adjustment for the rest of the decade.
