Re: Short-Term Crisis and Emergency Resources Grants

Based on Board of Supervisors direction on November 18, Community & Workforce Development (CWD), through its Outside Agency staff, conducted a competitive application process for \$838,390 in Short-Term Crisis and Emergency Resources (STCER) funding. CWD notified all agencies that have either received or expressed interest in Outside Agency funding in the past, and the application was publicly posted November 19. The application closed December 3, 2025 at 5:00 p.m.

CWD received 57 applications for a total of over \$3.3 million in requested funding across five program categories: Food Assistance, Housing & Utility Support, Transportation, Medical Expenses and Related Needs, and Legal Services. Staff vetted the applications for minimum qualifications and forwarded 38 eligible applications to the Outside Agency Citizen Review Committee (OACRC) for review, scoring, and award recommendations. Evaluation criteria prioritized urgency, readiness, impact, capacity, and alignment with County priorities. It also included a "Bonus" category to allow OACRC members some discretion to award points based on collaboration and leveraging of other resources. OACRC members were asked to utilize a 105-point scale, broken down as follows:

- 25 points Urgency and Readiness
- 20 points Alignment with County Priorities
- 20 points Capacity and Track Record
- 15 points Budget
- 20 points Impact and Outcomes
- 5 points Bonus

OACRC members scored applications, submitted their scores to staff, and met on December 11, 2025 to finalize recommendations for the Board's consideration at the December 16, 2025 meeting. Although not binding the OACRC to any specific award formula, the instructions to the OACRC stated that proposals with an average score of 80 or more would be subject to award. Based on this instruction, and in light of the fact that over four times the amount of available funding was requested, staff prepared an initial recommendation that every program scoring 80 or above be funded, but all at less than the full amount requested.

At the December 11, 2025 meeting, OACRC members expressed concern that, based on average scores, there was no recommendation of funding for International Rescue Committee

(IRC). IRC serves the refugee community, and OACRC members expressed a desire to provide some funding to serve that community, particularly its most urgent needs. Based on that discussion, the OACRC decided to fund the IRC's Food Assistance proposal at \$25,000. To fund this within the total amount allotted, the OACRC reduced the funding recommendations for 11 other projects by amounts varying from \$1,000 to \$7,000.

Attachment 1 details the applications that were considered by the OACRC and the initial and revised recommendations. The revised recommendations are those being presented to the Board for approval on December 16, 2025
