#### **CLSFRF Facts**

- March 2021: U.S. Department of the Treasury allocated Pima County \$203,421,667.00
- December 21, 2021: Pima County Board of Supervisors approved initial spending plan
- Obligation period spanned from March 2021 December 2024.





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## **CSLFRF** management

- Initial spending plan was comprised of 53 unique projects managed by 12 Pima County Departments.
- Pima County projects focused on:
  - Public health,
  - Negative economic impacts,
  - Public sector capacity,
  - Broadband infrastructure, and
  - Revenue replacement / provision of government services.

- Deputy County Administrators have regularly worked with departments to maintain awareness of:
  - project successes and lessons learned,
  - project spending, including cost savings and contractor inflations, and
  - how community needs shifted along with the complexion of the pandemic.
- The Board of Supervisors approved modifications to their original spending plan twice, once on September 19, 2023, and again on April 16, 2024, to address the community's changing needs.



- Departments submitted final spend-down plans in May 2024, which were reviewed by the DCAs.
- In October and November 2024, spend-down plans were finalized to determine any changes needed to ensure Pima County's full spending of the U.S. Treasury's allocation.
- The final recommendations for modifications to CSLFRF are presented to you today for your review.
- All funds must be obligated by 12/31/2024.

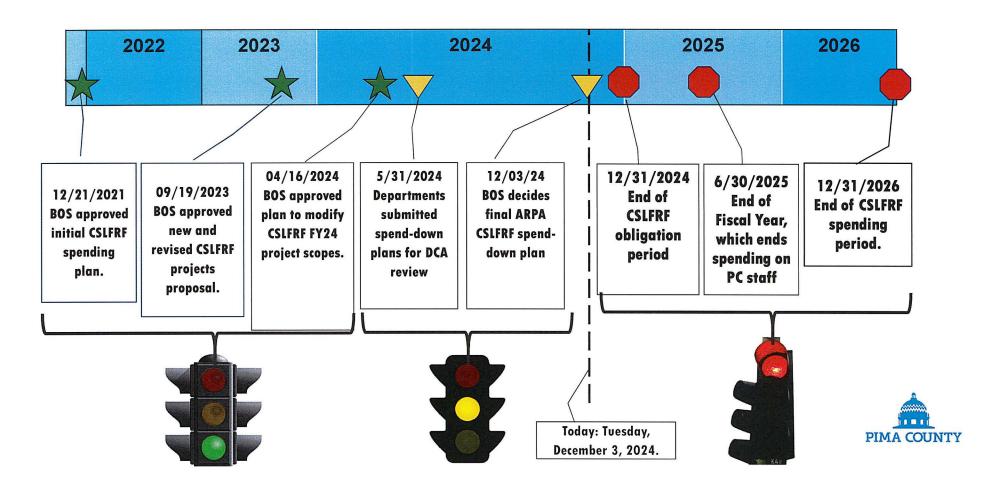

Supportive Housing and Job Training	Additional expenses were needed to close out \$1,312.07 program and terminate employees after funds were redirected.
Parks and Recreation Department	Will allow for completion of the final APRA \$382,000.00 CSLFRF project – replacement of a pool pump at Manzanita Pool.
