Re: Additional Information for the December 3, 2024 Board of Supervisors Meeting-Revised American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Fund (CSLFRF) Budget

On April 16, 2024, the Board of Supervisors (BOS) approved my recommendations for revising our American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA), Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Fund (CSLFRF) project budgets to coincide with our County's updated needs related to the COVID-19 pandemic. Now, as the obligation deadline for all ARPA CSLFRF fast approaches on December 31, 2024, I am providing you, once again, with a status of spending update along with recommendations for adjustments to the final spending plan. My Deputy County Administrators (DCAs) have reviewed current and anticipated spending with departments and community collaborators, and considered what final budget modifications are necessary to guarantee the complete spend-down of these important federal dollars in line with the Federal spending deadlines.

As of the most recent fully reconciled month (September 2024), Pima County has spent \$140.2 million of these funds (69%) on BOS-approved projects. County departments and community collaborators will either complete their projects by the end of the 2024-2025 fiscal year (where staff is being funded) or will obligate their funds to achieve specific project objectives no later than December 31, 2026.

While the management of these funds has been arduous, it has ultimately been satisfying to see the multiple ways these monies have contributed to our county's physical and economic health. Examples of these benefits include:

- Directly and indirectly responding to our community's public health needs, increasing public health access, and responsibly preparing for future public health emergencies
- Enhancing our court systems' accessibility and efficiency
- Augmenting the county's ability to respond to the housing crisis
- Jump starting economic drivers in the local hospitality and travel industries
- Creating educational pathways for long-term prosperity at the pre-school and postsecondary academic levels
- Supporting re-entry for court-involved adults

In collaboration with departments and community partners, the DCAs have determined that there is approximately \$1.33 million of the \$203 million left to redirect as a result of projects that did not need or could not spend their entire BOS allocation by the required deadline.

Unencumbered Funds

Six BOS-approved projects did not fully expend their allocations, either because they achieved cost savings or because of contract end dates. The total of these funds is \$1,326,213.94 See Table I, below.

Expenses Reconciliation

DCAs are requesting the budget adjustments listed in Table II, below, to fully spend Pima County's allocation of \$203,421,667.00. These adjustments accommodate four projects that experienced slight spending overages including: \$16,927.28 and \$1,312.07 due to staffing costs related to projects that were closed, one Communications project where \$379,999.19 in expenses was inadvertently tied to another fund, and one Parks and Recreation project where bids outpaced budget projections resulting in an additional \$382,000 needed to complete its final project - Manzanita Park Pool Pump replacement project. Additionally, staff are recommending adding monies to four projects where the funds will purposefully be used to augment the counties effectiveness. These include adding a water pump system at Tucson Mountain Park to electronically monitor water levels for \$128,000, adding a billing module and maintenance support to the TMC/Epic contract for \$180,000, and adding \$237,975.40 to the Drexel Project in support of property maintenance. Each impacted department director has contributed to and supports these decisions.
