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Dear Supervisor Ray Carroll,

Many residence, myself included, moved to our San Ignacio Heights neighborhood to escape the clutter and health effects of utility equipment such as sewage plants, water towers, power lines, transformers, and cell towers. Cell towers simply do not belong in residential neighborhoods. There was an aesthetic reason for burying power lines; let us not tarnish the skyline with a tower. None of the proposed artificial structures makes such an eye sore acceptable. Aesthetics aside, locating one in the golf course parking lot would devalue our homes.

Of course the jury is still out on the health effects of the radiation. Based on that alone, it is better to error on the side of safety. We want neither lawsuits nor cancer. This alone should preclude the corner of the golf course parking lot that is nearest residents' homes. Whether health concerns are justified or not, the perception does impact potential home buyers. I am sure I would not have purchased my house so near one.

There simply must be a better location than near housing in SIH. If the golf course insists they require the extra income to survive, perhaps there is either insufficient interest in golf to support the club or the club management is failing. Please don't allow Verizon, or any other profit oriented entity, to ruin the aesthetics of our neighborhood for the convenience of commercial interests. I cannot over-emphasize the negative impact on our neighborhood.
