Federal Executive Orders & Other Actions

Since January 20th, there have been over **75 Executive Orders** (EO) issued and signed

Office of Management and Budget Memoranda:


- OMB Memo (M-25-11) paused funding related to IRA / IIJA
- OMB Memo (M-23-13) paused all federal funding and CFDA numbers under consideration
- OMB rescinds M-25-13

Reported recoupment of already issued federal grant award on February 12th

Substantial Reduction in Federal Workforce

Continuing Resolution expiration March 14th

Senate / House proposed budget bills



Fiscal Impact of Funding Pause

Currently our largest federal portals are available for reimbursement submittals (and received dollars from submittals – some not reimbursed yet) – the County is closely reviewing its obligated and awarded grant funds.





Pima County Grant Portfolio Overview

Of the approximate \$150M in FY2024 grant expenditures 63% (~\$94M) are from:

- American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) awarded and ramping down
- Emergency Rental Assistance Program (ERAP) awarded and ramping down
- Emergency Food and Shelter Program (EFSP) awarded and closing out
- FEMA Shelter Services Program (SSP) awarded and ramping down (reimbursement)

The remaining grant expenditures ~\$56M in FY2024 are representative of discretionary grants and reoccurring grants

*(PCHD / CWD most impacted, but distributed over 20 departments)

IIJA and IRA grants represent 16 grants across the portfolio – which are either **currently active**, or if not started potentially **paused**




House Budget Bill and March 14th Impact

House Budget Proposal – passed, includes proposals on border security, energy, and notably, proposed cuts to Medicaid

Impact to Counties of <u>potential</u> Medicaid cuts include:

- Substantial impact to residents, and Counties County obligation for indigent care.
- Per Arizona's Medicaid enrollment data approximately 300,000 (30%) of Pima County's population are enrolled in the state's Medicaid coverage – the majority are children 0-17 and adults 22-64
- Would have impact to hospital / health systems, health provider plans, and access to care for residents

Ongoing review of budget proposals in light of March 14th Continuing Resolution (CR; HR 10545) deadline for any County impact



Pima County is continuing to closely review impacts to / of:

- Significant reductions / modifications / closures of federal departments, programs and services
- Considerable hiring freezes / staffing adjustments to federal agencies (especially agencies by which the County - and its residents - rely on for critical and essential services or funding)
- County impact of any federal funding pause or non-compliance with existing (or new) court orders
- Updates on recoupment of federally issued grant award funding
