I am emailing in support of David Miller who I understand is a candidate for Justice of the Peace, Precinct 6.

I was barred as an attorney in 2017, and David and I clerked together for judicial officers at the Pima County Juvenile Court for a number of months before we both became employed with the Pima County Office of Children's Counsel. David and I worked together for a number of years, during which time I came to know him as a colleague and friend. He has always demonstrated utmost professionalism, even in dealing with the situations that the Juvenile Court naturally encounters in its day to day operations. As a coworker, I am confident in saying that he always ready to lead the charge whether it came to giving advice in staffing or stating an opinion on a new or newly developing area within our collective practices.

After a few years, I moved on to become an assistant attorney general for the State of Arizona, also dealing with dependencies at the Juvenile Court. Because of this move, I have been able to also see David in an alternative context – as opposing counsel. He has not disappointed in that he has treated complex cases with ability, and he has treated those situations in which some parties allow their decorum to drop with dignity and grace. Ultimately, I have had the opportunity to see him in two contexts in which I would state that I trust that the dependent children of Pima County have had wonderful, effective representation.

Now, David has moved on to become a prosecutor at the Pima County Attorney's Office. I am able to see him on a consistent basis at the courthouse. Though I no longer have cases that I am opposite him on, I can tell based on his demeanor and how he holds himself that he has not missed in a beat. He is always willing to chat, talk about current issues in juvenile law in general, or about our families and upcoming Disney trips.

I would recommend David to become a Justice of the Peace, as I believe he has been above and beyond as a representative of the bar, the legal community of which he is a part, and ultimately, the vulnerable people that are in need of representation and appropriate opposition.
