Re: Additional Information on Pima County Wastewater Rate Increase for the June 17, 2025, Board of Supervisors Meeting

The June 17, 2025, Board of Supervisors Meeting includes proposed increases to the County wastewater rates. I provided a memorandum on this topic on <u>February 14, 2025</u>. Since this time, the Regional Wastewater Reclamation Department (RWRD), along with the Finance Department, held three public meetings on the proposed increase in advance of the Board's June 17, 2025, public hearing. An online comment website was also launched to receive additional input. Summary details and copies of public comments are included with the attached memorandum from RWRD Director Jackson Jenkins.

Proposed Rate Increases

The proposed fee increases are the first in more than 8 years and are needed to address inflationary cost increases in operation and maintenance of the regional wastewater system and to maintain the necessary 1.3 debt service ratio to ensure favorable bond ratings. The proposed increases include the following effective for Fiscal Year (FY) 2025/26:

- A three percent (3%) increase in the wastewater utility fee annually for four (4) years (FY 2025/26 2028/29); and
- A three percent (3%) increase to the service charge in FY 2025/26, followed by an annual increase of 1.75% for the next three (3) years; and
- A three percent (3%) increase to sewer volume rate in FY 2025/26, followed by an annual 1.75% annual increase for the next three (3) years.

The wastewater utility fee is charged to connect to the sewer, typically done at the time of construction. The sewer service charge is a fixed base fee for discharging sewage into the sewer system. The fixed base service charge is added to the sewer volume rate to calculate the total monthly sewer bill.

The Regional Wastewater Reclamation Advisory Committee reviewed the proposed increases, which are based on the FY 2024-25 Financial Plan prepared by RWRD and the Finance Department, and voted to support them with 9 members in favor, 2 members opposed, and 2 members absent.

The current annual average residential sewer fees (service charge + volume charge) in Pima County are \$417.29. If approved, the 3% increase proposed for FY 2025/26 will result in the annual amount of \$429.81, which is an average residential increase of \$1.04 / month.

The current annual residential sewer fees nationally are \$588.00. The Town of Marana and Town of Sahuarita currently average \$518.31 and \$679.49 respectively for their annual residential sewer fees.

The current residential house utility fee (connection fee) is \$4,188. If the increases of 3% are approved, the fee will be as follows:

Proposed Discontinuation of Utility Fee (Connection Fee) Discount Program

The rate proposal also includes discontinuation of the utility fee Discount Program that has been available to the development community for when a developer constructs sewer line improvements with unused capacity across property owned by another party. Projects have used the program 28 times over the past 13 years.

Details on usage and the rational for discontinuing the program, as well as available options to achieve similar outcomes, are included in the attached memorandum. The Southern Arizona Homebuilders Association (SAHBA) has noted their opposition to discontinuing the Discount Program.

Sewer Outreach Subsidy (SOS) Enhancement

Understanding the impact on individuals paying residential sewer fees, Pima County has offered a sewer subsidy for low-income residents since 2007. The program is structured based on Federal Poverty Guidelines, and depending on income and household size, customers may qualify for a 25%, 50%, or 75% discount on their monthly sewer fees.

With the proposed rate increases, RWRD is working with Tucson Water to reevaluate the existing tier structure of the SOS Program to expand the program from 3 to 4 tiers and increase the subsidy available to residents with household income up to 200% of the federal poverty level. Additional details are included in the attached memorandum. An amendment to the program will be presented to the Board of Supervisors for consideration in the upcoming few months.

SUBJECT:	Consideration of Proposed Pima County Sewer Rate Increase

The Pima County Finance and Risk Management Department, along with the Regional Wastewater Reclamation Department (RWRD), annually prepare a financial plan addressing the financial needs of RWRD based on projected expenses and capital improvements for the current fiscal year and the following four fiscal years.

The focus of the financial plan is to determine the optimal sewer rates needed to ensure that there is sufficient revenue to meet all operating and maintenance expenses, debt service payments, required reserves, and to maintain an adequate debt service ratio to maintain favorable bond ratings.

Annual Financial Evaluation

The Fiscal Year (FY) 2024/2025 Financial Plan recommended the adoption of a series of rate increases to be implemented at the start of FY 2025/2026 as follows:

- A three percent (3%) increase to the wastewater utility fee; and
- Annual increases for four (4) years of 1.75% the sewer volume fee; and
- Annual increases for four (4) years of 1.75% the service charge.

The increases were recommended to ensure sufficient revenues to meet all operating and maintenance expenses, debt service payments, and required reserves. The Regional Wastewater Reclamation Advisory Committee (RWRAC) reviewed the FY 2024/2025 Financial Plan and unanimously supported the plan and the recommendations **(Attachment 1)**.

Reevaluation during the FY 2025/2026 budget planning process determined that the previously proposed rate increases would be insufficient to maintain the needed 1.3 debt service ratio due to inflationary pressure and increased costs to operations and maintenance expenses, resulting in the following updated rate increase recommendations:

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- A three percent (3%) increase in the wastewater utility fee annually for four (4) years (FY 2026 2029); and
- A three percent (3%) increase to sewer volume rate in FY 2025/2026, followed by an annual 1.75% annual increase for the next three (3) years; and
- A three percent (3%) increase to the service charge in FY 2025/2026, followed by an annual increase of 1.75% for the next three (3) years.

The proposed fee increase was presented to the full Regional Wastewater Reclamation Advisory Committee (RWRAC) at the January 23, 2025, meeting for review and discussion. The committee members discussed the revised rate increase proposal and voted to support it as presented with nine (9) in favor, two (2) opposed, and two (2) members absent **(Attachment 2)**.

Public Notice Requirements

State statute establishes public notice and hearing requirements for rate increases, which requires one public hearing. To ensure that residents and customers had an opportunity to review the proposed increase and the supporting documents and provide input, the following public hearings were held. There was very minimal public participation in these meetings and there were no members of the public who spoke out against these proposed rate increases:

Notice of these public hearings occurred in print media, social media and through press releases.

Notification of the revised ordinance has been posted on the Pima County webpage, and the ordinance is available for review leading up to a June 17, 2025, Board of Supervisors public hearing on the recommended rate increases.

The three public meetings and one public hearing exceed the number of meetings required by state statute and ensured the public had ample opportunity to participate in the rate process.

RWRD in conjunction with the Pima County Communications Department also opened up an on-line comment website for the proposed sewer fee increases. There were many responses sent via on-line communication. The summary of these responses along with copies of the public comment forms are included in (Attachment 3).

Along with the public meetings, RWRD also held meetings with development industry stakeholders such as the Southern Arizona Homebuilders Association and Metropolitan Pima Alliance to discuss the proposed rate increases and the proposed sunsetting of the discount program. Please see (Attachment 4) regarding the Sunsetting of the Discount Program as well as (Attachment 5) which is SAHBA's response to our proposed ordinance changes. In spite of SAHBA's request to consider some form/option for discounts, the Department still recommends the sunsetting of the program. In reviewing the recipients of the discounts, we could not find any of those projects over the past 13 years were required to make a development project viable.

The utility fee discounts original purpose seemed to provide developers with a calculated value to the remaining/unused capacity within the required sewer line for the given development only if the installed sewer line crossed a third-party property that could benefit from it.

- 1. Discounts have not been common as developers tend to wait for the parcels leading to their property to develop and then proceed to extend the sewer service to their property.
- 2. Discount tend to promote the development of areas far from existing services, versus letting the natural growth and extension of services outward from the city core.
- 3. In the spirit of development funding their own way, this reimbursement or discount is subsidizing private development that should consider the cost of the sewer line in their feasibility assessment.
- 4. The developer has options to coordinate with adjacent property owners to share in the cost of installing a sewer line that would benefit their respective projects.
- 5. I am not aware of other utilities that provide a similar discount feature, meaning the wastewater discount dollar amount is not a trigger for a go/no-go decision for development of a particular area. Developers are expected to fully fund the other utilities infrastructure as part of their project. The Sunset of the Discounts puts RWRD on par with the industry standard for utilities relationship with development.

Comments on the Considerations Requested

- Systemwide infrastructure improvements are funded by the connection fees, paying for discounts take away funds that could be directed to the sewer system.
- Attached is a spreadsheet with details on the past 13 years (2012 to 2025) of discounts issued broken down by Active, Under Development and Built Out agreements. It includes the respective companies the agreements were made with.
- Sewer Service agreements are available to development to pursue public-private partnerships that will aid in the development of particular areas that will promote development within the County, for example the Twin Peaks Blue Bonnet arranged for County and Developers to team up to install an interceptor to serve an area in the northwest of Pima County. A similar approach is being pursued for the Canoa Ranch interceptor installation to serve and benefit the Canoa Ranch area development.

Sewer Outreach Subsidy (SOS)

The Pima County Sewer Outreach Subsidy (SOS) Program was established in July 2007 to assist low-income customers with their sewer user fees. It is a low-income subsidy program authorized by the Pima County Board of Supervisors (BOS) in response to concerns about the ability of low-income residents to pay steadily increasing sewer rates. The SOS Program currently has a three-tiered rate structure based on Federal Poverty Guidelines. Depending on income and household size, customers may qualify for a 25%, 50%, or 75% discount on their monthly sewer fees.

In response to these rate increases, RWRD is working in conjunction with City of Tucson/Tucson Water to reevaluate the existing tier structure of the SOS Program and potentially expand the program from 3 to 4 tiers and updating the breakdown for the subsidy to be available to residents with household income up to 200% of the federal poverty level.

We will continue to develop the proposal of Pima County Sewer Outreach Subsidy (SOS) Program revisions in order to provide an increased number of Pima County residents impacted by utility costs with assistance.

For FY2023/24, there were 5,120 RWRD SOS participants who were subsidized approximately \$1.3 million. The SOS Program modifications are expected to go before the BOS on September 2, 2025. If approved, all current SOS participants will automatically be aligned with the new criteria. Since the new proposed tier 4 level for those who fall between 150% to 200% of the Federal Poverty Level (FPL) are not currently in the system, they will need to go through the SOS approval process with Pima County Community Action Agency in order to receive the subsidy.

The Pima County Communications Department is preparing for a marketing blitz and enhanced outreach effort in an attempt to better reach those not currently in the program but whom likely would qualify for the subsidy. Their current plans are to utilize the County's web page, social media, Pima County Libraires and they will be reaching out to respective

BOS members for additional recommendation on how best to reach constitutes in their Districts.

<u>Summary</u>

- RWRD has not raised sewer user fees or wastewater utility fees (connection fees) in more than 8 years. The last increase to both of these fees was in June 2017, which was a 3% increase for each.
- The current formula used to determine a customer's respective monthly sewer bill is the following:

Service Fee + (Volume Fees x Average Water Usage during the Winter Quarter Average (WQA) months) or the lowest 3 consecutive months in 100's of Cubic Feet (ccf)

\$13.00 Service Fee + \$3.629 Volume Fees x WQA (ccfs)

- Please refer to the Proposed Sewer User Rates (Attachment 6).
- The current annual average residential sewer fees in Pima County are \$417.29. If approved, the 3% increase proposed for next year will result in the annual amount of \$429.81, (average residential increase of \$1.04/month).
- The current residential annual sewer fees nationally are \$588.00.
- The Towns of Marana and Sahuarita, who are the nearest public sewer providers, currently average \$518.31 and \$679.49 respectively for their annual residential sewer fees.
- The most recent cost of capacity calculation in 2017 was \$16.50/gallon and is used to determine current connection fees/wastewater utility fees. The current residential house connection fee is \$4,188. If the increases of 3% are approved, the fee will be as follows:

We are spreading the increase out over a 4-year period to help the development community better plan for this change.

- Developer Discounts should be sunsetted as we cannot find any viable reason to subsidize development.
- The Sewer Outreach Subsidy proposed modification will go before the Board of Supervisors at the September 2, 2025 BOS meeting.

RE: Regional Wastewater Reclamation Department's Fiscal Year 2024/2025 Financial Plan – Regional Wastewater Reclamation Advisory Committee's Letter of Support

Dear Honorable Chair and Members of the Board:

The Regional Wastewater Reclamation Advisory Committee (RWRAC) was established by the Board of Supervisors (Board) to act as the official advisory body on the Capital Improvement Program (CIP) planning and rate structure formulation to County government; annually review the proposed Regional Wastewater Reclamation Department's (RWRD) CIP and recommend to the governing body an annual and five-year Capital Program; and annually review the revenue requirements of the sanitary sewerage system and recommend to the governing body rate adjustments as required.

Each year, the Pima County Finance and Risk Management Department (FRMD) prepares a Financial Plan, which addresses the financial needs of RWRD based on the projected expenses and projected CIP for the current fiscal year and for four subsequent fiscal years.

The 2024 Financial Plan recommends the following:

- 1. Issuing \$296 million of new sewer revenue obligations to fund future CIP projects as follows:
 - a. \$54 million in Fiscal Year 2024-25,
 - b. \$67 million in Fiscal Year 2025-26,
 - c. \$82 million in Fiscal Year 2026-27, and
 - d. \$93 million in Fiscal Year 2027-28.
- 2. Using unrestricted cash to prepay debt as follows:
 - a. \$18.2 million in Fiscal Year 2024-25,
 - b. \$22.4 million in Fiscal Year 2025-26
 - c. \$22.3 million in Fiscal Year 2026-27, and
 - d. \$19.1 million in Fiscal Year 2027-28.
- 3. Maintain the current sewer revenue rates for Fiscal Year 2024-25. Beginning in Fiscal Year 2025-26, request an annual increase of 3% per year to the Sewer Utility Fee and an annual increase for four (4) years of 1.75% each to the Sewer Volume Fee and the Service Charge.

In August 2023, both Fitch Ratings and Standard and Poor's reaffirmed the County's current sewer debt rating of AA for the Sewer Revenue Obligations. The issued reports explained the analysis of the County's financial condition for its sewer debt. The bond ratings reflect the rating agencies' evaluation of the financial stability of the County and its ability to repay debt. As ratings increase, the interest rates offered by lenders decrease, reducing the overall debt cost to the County.

The RWRAC Financial Subcommittee discussed the FY 2024/2025 Financial Plan key assumptions, inflationary pressure on increased cost, and the impact of increased salaries and benefits due to implementation of the Pima County class and compensation study. These items were discussed to inform discussions about the potential need for increased user fee rates at the January 26, 2024, and February 15, 2024, meetings.

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The full RWRAC committee reviewed the Rate Workbook at their February 22, 2024, meeting, where committee members were presented with two (2) scenarios for consideration which implemented user fee rate increases and discussed CIP projections through Fiscal Year 2027/2028. During the meeting, committee members voted to recommend to FRMD that the financial plan be based on the scenario with a gradual 1.75% sewer volume rate increase, beginning in FY2025/2026 and continuing for 4 consecutive years. In conjunction to that rate increase, an increase of 1.75% to the service charge would be instituted during the same time period. The sewer utility fee (previously known as connection fees) would also be increased by 3% annually. The motion passed nine (9) to two (2).

The draft FY 2024/2025 Financial Plan was reviewed and discussed during the March 28, 2024, RWRAC meeting. The RWRAC Financial Subcommittee met on April 9, 2024, to discuss and resolve any remaining questions regarding the financial plan. The meeting resulted in a unanimous vote by the subcommittee members to accept the financial plan as presented and recommend that the RWRAC support the plan.

During the April 25, 2024, RWRAC meeting, the RWRAC Financial Subcommittee Chair recommended to the full committee that the RWRAC support the FY 2024/2025 Financial Plan. After discussion amongst the committee and staff, the committee passed a motion unanimously, in support of the Financial Plan recommendations.

Therefore, the RWRAC recommends to the Pima County Board of Supervisors the approval of the RWRD FY2024/2025 Financial Plan.

The RWRAC appreciates the opportunity to provide our recommendation to the Board of Supervisors and we are available at your convenience for any questions or further discussion.

Dear Honorable Chair and Members of the Board:

The Regional Wastewater Reclamation Advisory Committee (RWRAC) was established by the Board of Supervisors (BOS) to act as the official advisory body on the Regional Wastewater Reclamation Department (RWRD) Financial Plan and to annually review the proposed Financial Plan and recommend to the governing body an annual, five-year, and ten-year financial program. The RWRAC also has the responsibility of reviewing proposed Wastewater fee adjustments and ordinance changes.

The RWRAC began its review of the Department's proposal to modify the sewer volume rate, service charge, and the wastewater utility fee (previously known as connection fees) at the RWRAC Financial Subcommittee in January 2024. The full RWRAC committee reviewed the Rate Workbook on February 22, 2024, and after considering two scenarios voted to recommend to the Finance and Risk Management Department (FRMD) that the financial plan be based on the scenario with a gradual 1.75% sewer volume rate increase, beginning in FY 2025-2026 and continuing for 4 consecutive years. In conjunction with that rate increase, an increase of 1.75% to the service charge would be instituted during the same time period. The wastewater utility fee would also be increased by 3% annually during that timeframe. In a vote of nine (9) to two (2), the RWRAC passed the motion to recommend to the Pima County Board of Supervisors the proposed rate increases as presented in the FY 2024-2025 Rate Workbook and Financial Plan. A Letter of Support was forwarded to the Board on April 25, 2024 (see attached).

On January 15, 2025, the RWRAC Financial Subcommittee was presented with the initial draft Rate Workbook, which contained revisions to the previously proposed rate increase values. FRMD revised the rate increase, determining that the initial values were insufficient to maintain RWRD's debt service ratio above the 1.3 level in response to inflationary pressure and increased costs to operations and maintenance expenses. The FY 2025-2026 draft Rate Workbook presented a proposed 3% sewer volume rate increase beginning in FY 2025-2026, followed by an annual 1.75% annual increase for the next three (3) years. In conjunction to that rate increase, a 3% increase to the service charge would be instituted in FY 2025-2026, followed by an annual increase of 1.75% for the next three (3) years. The wastewater utility fee would be increased by 3% annually for the noted 4-year period (FY 2026 -2029). Extensive review by the Financial Subcommittee resulted in forwarding this scenario to the full RWAC committee for consideration. The information was presented to the full RWRAC at their January 23, 2025, meeting, for review and discussion. Based on the timeline requirements for ensuring the rate increase inclusion in the Board of Supervisor FY 2025-2026 budget approval process, the committee members discussed the revised rate increase proposal, providing continued support of the rate increase proposal as presented. The motion of support passed with a vote of nine (9) affirmatives, two (2) against, and two (2) members absent.

Therefore, the RWRAC recommends to the Pima County Board of Supervisors the approval of the RWRD FY 2025-2026 proposed 3% sewer volume rate increase, followed by an annual 1.75% annual increase for the next three (3) years. In conjunction with that rate increase, a 3% increase to the service charge would be instituted in FY 2025-2026, followed by an annual increase of 1.75% for the next three (3) years. The wastewater utility fee would also be increased by 3% annually for the noted 4-year period (FY 2026 - 2029).

The RWRAC appreciates the opportunity to provide our recommendation to the Board of Supervisors and we are available at your convenience for any questions or further discussion.

Public Comment Responses – Summary

The Public Comment Form regarding the Pima County Regional Wastewater Reclamation Department (RWRD) proposed ordinance revisions to the Pima County Code, Title 13, Chapter 24 Sanitary Sewer User Fees and Chapter 20 Sanitary Sewer Construction, Connection, and Fees (Code) was made publicly available on April 18, 2025. A summary of the responses received is noted below:

- Respondents noted that the majority of their water usage was for irrigation rather than sewage. One response indicated that the proposed sewer user fee increases, the method used to calculate residential sewer bills is inaccurate and inequitable because it does not take into account non-sewage water usage.
- Respondents indicated that their water bill is high and continued sewer user fee increases were excessive and unnecessary. Some responses pertained directly to the City of Tucson/Tucson Water differential water rates, water quality, or sale of water, indicating that some residents believed the proposed increases are directly related to City of Tucson/Tucson Water.
- Respondents questioned the need for the proposed sewer user fee increases, suggesting that wages and profits within the County or department are excessive and need to be reevaluated. Some responses suggested that state, county, and city funds be used to offset costs, and budgets should be reviewed. Several respondents suggested that funds obtained through the implementation of the proposed increase would be appropriated for other, non-department usage or as profit. Other responses questioned services provided by other county departments (e.g. Department of Transportation) and suggested the County re-evaluate expenditures.
- Respondents indicated that the increases are necessary in order to address the lack of a
 rate increase in 8 years, rising costs, and the need to maintain the sewer system. One
 response suggested annual Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA) be applied to the sewer
 user fees, while another suggested differential sewer rates be applied similar to City of
 Tucson/Tucson Water proposed rates. Respondents requested that the proposed
 increases be efficient, effective, equitable, and modest.
- Respondents indicated that they are already experiencing financial hardship due to inflation and life events (e.g. retirement, health problems, loss of family members) and increased sewer user fees would be harmful.

SUBJECT: Recommendation to sunset Sewer Connection Fee Discount Ordinance

After reviewing the Sewer Connection Fees Discount account balance sheet with staff, the discussion turned as to the background history of the discounts. After some research and further discussion, we are questioning the need to continue with the discount process and propose the Department sunset the ordinance section dealing with the Sewer Connection Fee Discounts. Some background and details follow.

The current Ordinance 2019-20, section 13.20.250.C.3 allows for 'Credits' to be issued as a reimbursement to a Developer when the **Department requires** an upsize or deepening of the proposed developer funded line for a given development. The request by the Department to augment will benefit the public and future Development.

The current Ordinance 2019-20, section 13.20.250.C.4, allows for 'Discounts' for qualifying system improvements. The historical reason for the Discounts is to reimburse a Developer for the excess capacity that may remain in the sewer line installed to serve the area under development that could potentially be utilized by other parcels. These sewer lines are required to provide sanitary sewer service for new development, their installation will take place regardless of Discounts being provided. **County did not request the installation** of such sewer lines. These lines are installed strictly for the benefit of the Development project seeking access to sanitary sewer service as opposed to the department's required augmentations that may trigger a Credit.

When Discounts are applied, the current Discount administrative process includes.

- 1. RWRD Engineering group calculates the number of Discounts for a given development project.
- 2. A Wastewater Service Agreement (WSA) between the applicant and the County is signed and executed, allocating conveyance and treatment capacity for the Applicant. Subsequent development can request allocation, on a first come first served basis, of the remaining system capacity. Discount amounts are recorded as part of the WSA.
- 3. Once the sewer line serving the Development is constructed and accepted by the County, the Discounts are applied and the Wastewater Utility Fees (WUF) within the development area is discounted by DSD following the WSA terms.
- 4. An accounting of the Discounts issued versus the Discounts utilized to offset WUFs is maintained by DSD.

Since 2018 approximately \$1.1M in discounts have been issued to Developers. The discounts for treatment and for downstream conveyance capacity are calculated by providing \$1,100 for each 25 feet of sewer line fronting parcels not related to the development project and are applied against each WUF issued. This reduction in revenue could be equated to an equal increase in profit to a Developer or a subsidy to Development.

We are requesting to pursue a sunset of the Discount process under 13.20.250.C.4 based on:

• The Department is currently looking at increasing customer rates to fund the rising cost of operation and maintenance. This increase in operational costs has been driven up by economic inflationary pressures.

- Eliminating the Discount subsidy will increase the annual revenue of the Department and reduce the amount of future rate increases.
- Because Discounts are a reduction in the full Wastewater Utility Fees paid by development, it can be argued that current rate payers are subsidizing development through their user fees.
- A sunset of the Discount process will allow for development to carry the full cost of its construction as part of their calculation of the return on investment for the development without County providing subsidies. Development will fully pay its own way.
- Both RWRD and DSD have personnel in charge of calculating, recording, and managing the balance of available discounts. These personnel can be better utilized by reallocating their time and efforts to other areas of responsibility that add value to each Department.

The sunset clause would allow current development in the system with existing and pending Wastewater Service Agreements to proceed under the existing Discount process while future/new development would not qualify to make use of the discounts. It may take several years to retire the use of the discount process while the ongoing developments are approved, constructed, and connected.

A sunset of the Discount process can be quantified and presented along with a future rate increase request to show the Department actions to minimize the impact of a rate increase on the rate payers.

Let me know what you think and if it is worth pursuing further.

The Southern Arizona Home Builders Association (SAHBA) appreciates the opportunity to provide feedback on the proposed changes to the County's sewer connection fees and the sunset of Section 13.20.250.C.4 of the Pima County Code.

We understand the importance of long-term infrastructure planning and recognize that the proposed increase in sewer connection fees—from \$4,188 to \$4,701 with annual 3% adjustments—is rooted in cost-of-service calculations. While modest on paper, this increase adds to the cumulative costs already impacting residential development and housing affordability.

More concerning is the proposed sunset of the utility fee discount for qualifying infrastructure improvements. We understand this provision has historically provided a useful mechanism to support infrastructure investment in areas where system capacity is limited or non-existent. As Pima County continues to grow, especially in outlying areas like the southwest, removing this tool may inhibit development where it is most needed.

We appreciate that credits for upsizing or deepening sewer lines will remain available when requested by RWRD. However, this narrow scope may not account for other critical improvements, such as treatment plant enhancements or offsite extensions, that make projects feasible.

To that end, we respectfully request that the County consider:

- Retaining or revising the current discount program to allow flexibility for systemwide infrastructure improvements;
- Providing a clear summary of past projects that utilized this provision;
- Exploring alternative mechanisms to support cost-sharing in areas of constrained infrastructure.

We welcome the opportunity to work with RWRD to ensure policies reflect both the County's infrastructure priorities and our shared commitment to expanding housing access.






Proposed Sewer User Rates




FY 2025 Budget



Budgeted Positions




Electricity Usage vs. Expense
