*Project Title/Description:

SIM Mapping Workshops to Develop Comprehensive, Community Wide Strategic Plans for Addressing Opioid and Other Substance Use.

*Purpose:

Through this non-cash technical assistance grant, a professionally-led SIM workshop will bring together local partners, cross-system agencies, and multidisciplinary stakeholders to identify existing resources, improvements, and critical gaps within the Pima County criminal justice system. The collaborative process will address local priorities for change, strategic plans, and sustainability.

*Procurement Method:

The grant award did not require PCAO's review or signature.

*Program Goals/Predicted Outcomes:

By accepting this highly competitive grant, Pima County will initiate the third round of SIM mapping. Since the previous mapping workshops in 2016 and 2021, Pima has expanded relationships and programming, resulting in a need to update the nationally recognized resource. Partners have articulated an urgency to update the 2021 SIM to continue appropriately addressing the needs of justice-involved individuals with mental health and substance use disorders, as the need has expedited since the pandemic. The tangible outcomes from previous SIM workshops have proved invaluable to participants in bolstering partnerships, identifying new resources and gaps in services at each intercept of the justice system, and developing local strategies and action plans.

*Public Benefit:

Local justice system agencies will be better informed of available programming and collaborations to address existing community needs more effectively. The pinpointed gaps identified throughout the workshops will inform future programming and ensure proper resource allocation. Additionally, an integrated local strategic action plan will enable participants and the community to grasp how collaborative efforts contribute to long-term, sustainable programming. Through this process, the public will have access to transparent, solution-oriented, and robust services surrounding the justice system.

Participation in planning conference calls with GAINS Center staff and consultants; Local planning activities; Pre-workshop inventory of existing resources, policies, and programs; Pre-workshop community self-assessment of level of collaboration and perceptions of criminal justice and behavioral health issues (repeated at 6- and 12-months post-workshop); Pre-workshop data collection around specific community impact measures and progress indicators (repeated at 6- and 12-months post-workshop); I.S-day in-person workshop.



OVERVIEW

SAMHSA's GAINS Center for Behavioral Health and Justice Transformation, operated by Policy Research Associates, Inc. (PRA), is known internationally for its work regarding individuals with behavioral health needs who are involved in the criminal justice system.


For the past several years the GAINS Center has solicited applications from jurisdictions interested in better identifying and responding to the needs of individuals with behavioral health needs who are involved or at risk for involvement in the criminal justice system, through Sequential Intercept Model (SIM) Mapping Workshops. The workshops are designed bring together a local, cross-system, multidisciplinary group of key stakeholders from a particular jurisdiction to facilitate cross-system collaboration and to identify and discuss ways in which barriers in and between the criminal justice and behavioral health systems can be reduced through the development of integrated local strategic action plans.

This solicitation targets communities that are particularly interested in developing comprehensive, community-wide strategic plans for addressing substance use, and better identifying and responding to the needs of adults with substance use disorders who are involved or at risk for involvement in the criminal justice system. Applications should emphasize resources, gaps and opportunities, as well as commitment among key stakeholders to addressing these issues.

The SIM Mapping Workshops will focus specifically on identifying and treating individuals with substance use disorders across all of the intercepts, including screening and assessment, diverting individuals out of the criminal justice system and into appropriate community-based treatment programs, access to medications for Opioid Use Disorder, and maintaining continuity of care through transitions in and out of custody. SIM Workshop participants are expected to be drawn, in large part, from criminal justice and behavioral health agencies and organizations. 911 dispatch, crisis services, law enforcement and other first responders, hospitals, jails, courts (particularly drug courts and other treatment/problem-solving/specialty courts), reentry services, probation and parole, and community-based behavioral health treatment providers, are all essential participants in these workshops.

PURPOSE & BACKGROUND

SIM Mapping Workshops result in a map that illustrates how adults with behavioral health needs come in contact with and flow through the criminal justice system utilizing the framework of the Sequential Intercept Model. The workshops bring together key stakeholders to create a local "systems map" and establish local priorities for change and strategic plans.



THE SEQUENTIAL INTERCEPT MODEL

During the SIM Mapping Workshop, resources and opportunities are identified at each intercept for identifying individuals with behavioral health needs (particularly substance use disorders) and diverting them out of the criminal justice system and into appropriate community-based treatment programs. As part of the mapping process, critical gaps are also identified and summarized. Based on the identified gaps, opportunities for improvement and systems change are discussed. Participants determine areas where immediate action will result in a more cohesive, integrated approach to service delivery, and a local set of priorities for change is established. The local set of

priorities for change become the focus of strategic action plans. Throughout this process, the GAINS Center staff provide examples of successful systems integration and promising programs from around the country.

<u>As mentioned previously, this solicitation targets communities that are interested in developing</u> <u>comprehensive, community-wide strategic action plans for addressing substance use.</u> SAMHSA's GAINS Center will conduct SIM Mapping Workshops focused on resources, gaps and opportunities for identifying and treating substance use disorders across all the intercepts of the SIM, including screening and assessment, diverting individuals out of the criminal justice system and into appropriate community-based treatment programs, implementing or expanding MAT, and maintaining continuity of care through transitions in and out of custody.

<u>Best practices across the intercepts</u> include cross-systems collaboration and coordination, screening and assessment for substance use disorders, access to treatment and recovery supports, continuity of care (particularly during transitions in and out of custody), data collection and data/information sharing, and cross-system efforts to identify and address racial inequities and disparities.

<u>Intercept 0</u> resources, gaps and opportunities will be examined during the workshops including review of community education efforts around substance use, resources that exist in the community to identify and treat substance use disorders including detox facilities and providers, availability and distribution of overdose reversal tools and other harm reduction initiatives, and access to essential recovery supports.

<u>Intercept 1</u> resources, gaps and opportunities will be examined during the workshops including the role of 911 dispatch/emergency services and law enforcement in responding to substance use crises, co-response, and warm handoffs to treatment providers and/or peers, and various pre-arrest diversion models.

<u>Intercept 2</u> resources, gaps and opportunities are examined during the workshops including review of initial detention and arraignment processes, screening and assessment procedures, pre-trial services, eligibility requirements and referral processes for participation in drug courts and other treatment/problem-solving/specialty courts, and various post-arrest diversion models.

<u>Intercept 3</u> resources, gaps and opportunities are identified during workshops, including a review of drug court and other treatment/problem-solving/specialty court structure, staffing, capacity, treatment planning and case management, linkage to community-based substance use treatment providers, and availability of substance use treatment and recovery supports in jails and prisons.

<u>Intercept 4</u> resources, gaps and opportunities are examined during the workshops, including review of reentry/transition planning by jail staff or community partners, medication and prescription access upon release from jail or prison (including continuity of MAT), warm handoffs to community-based substance use treatment providers, and access to housing, Social Security, Medicaid, and other supports.

<u>Intercept 5</u> resources, gaps and opportunities are examined during the workshops, including review of specialized probation and parole caseloads, the role of probation and parole in assisting individuals with access and continued engagement in substance use treatment, and access to access to housing, Social Security, Medicaid, and other supports.

By facilitating cross-system communication and collaboration, the SIM workshops help communities improve the early identification of individuals with behavioral health needs coming into contact with the criminal justice system, increases effective service linkage, reduces the likelihood of individuals cycling through the criminal justice system, enhances community safety, and improves quality of life for all people in the community.

SAMHSA's GAINS Center for Behavioral Health and Justice Transformation will provide SIM Mapping Workshops free of charge to selected jurisdictions between February and August 2025. There are no fees for registration, tuition, or materials associated with these workshops. The GAINS Center will cover all costs associated with pre- and post-workshop planning and coordination, facilitator time, data collection and analysis, and report development.

To be considered, all applications <u>must</u> be received by October 18, 2024. Selected communities will be notified by November 15, 2024.

TARGET AUDIENCE/WORKSHOP PARTICIPANTS

The target audiences for this workshop are criminal justice and behavioral health system professionals, including 911 dispatch, crisis services, law enforcement and other first responders, hospitals, jail administrators and correctional officers, judges, prosecutors, defense attorneys, court coordinators (particularly for drug courts and other treatment/problem-solving/specialty courts), reentry services, probation and parole officers, behavioral health treatment providers, and persons with lived experience. Since the workshop is highly interactive in nature, to achieve maximum participation for all attendees, each workshop is limited to 60 participants.

- Criminal Justice System Professionals (judges and court personnel, prosecutors, defense attorneys, dispatchers and law enforcement, jail administrators and correctional officers, pre-trial services, re-entry service providers, probation and parole officers)

- Mental Health Professionals (psychologists, psychiatrists, social workers, supervisors, program managers, administrators, etc.)

- Peers and Family Members (persons with lived experience in the local behavioral health and criminal justice system), including local Peer-Run and Family-Run Organizations



- Pre-workshop inventory of existing resources, policies, and programs;
- Pre-workshop community self-assessment of level of collaboration and perceptions of criminal justice and behavioral health issues (repeated at 6- and 12-months post-workshop);
- Pre-workshop data collection around specific community impact measures and progress indicators (repeated at 6- and 12-months post-workshop);
- 1.5 day in-person workshop.

Following the workshop, communities will receive a list of identified priorities for change, copies of draft local strategic action plans, a full comprehensive report, and a detailed systems map. Additionally, communities will be provided with the results of the community self-assessment and quantitative and qualitative data and information regarding the impact of the workshop and progress following it.

Since the SIM Mapping workshop is designed to bring jurisdictions that may be at varying "points of readiness" through a series of exercises that culminate in a comprehensive systems map and a set of local priorities for change with concrete action steps, "readiness for change" is a critical element to determine if the workshop fits the needs of a given jurisdiction. "Readiness for change" is a subjective term requiring the review of how well your mental health, criminal justice, and substance use services are integrated. To determine which applicants would benefit most from the workshop, it is important to evaluate your jurisdiction using a scale that assesses integration on a scale from 'information sharing' through 'full integration' (Konrad, 1996):
