The Coalition for Sonoran Desert Protection supports the draft update to *Pima Prospers* and staff's work on the plan — in particular, Chapter 3. Natural, Physical, and Cultural Environment.

The Sonoran Desert Conservation Plan remains one of the most forward-thinking local conservation frameworks in the country. We are proud to have played a foundational role in its development and ongoing implementation. With our input on Pima Prospers 2025, we sought to uphold Pima County's strong conservation record.

Specifically, we appreciate staff's integration of language that reinforces the goals of the SDCP, including this addition under Goal 3.A.1., Policy a) 5):

"To encourage the preservation of natural open space in those areas subject to the CLS where development is occurring, the CLS has a holistic, landscape-level target that at least 70% of all lands set aside as mitigation across all designations should occur on-site."

This policy reflects an ongoing commitment to conserving high-value natural undisturbed open spaces within the same areas most affected by development. It continues Pima County's record of achieving roughly 73% on-site mitigation to date.

As the SDCP approaches its 25th anniversary, *Pima Prospers 2025* reaffirms Pima County's leadership in conservation-based planning. Thank you for your support of this draft update and our input into it.
