Requested Board Meeting Date: October 18, 2016

Title: Fee Schedule for Educational Workshops on Poverty

Introduction/Background:

Pursuant to 11-251.08, the Pima County Community Services, Employment and Training (CSET) is requesting a public hearing at the October 18, 2016 Pima County Board of Supervisors Meeting for a Fee Schedule for three Educational Workshops on Poverty. The workshop fees will cover the cost of copyright material, supplies, venue, registration, and food.

CSET operates several programs assisting persons in poverty. The ARIZONA@WORK Pima County One-Stop helps people escape from poverty through education and employment skills training opportunities. CSET plans to offer new educational workshops that focus on poverty issues; the workshops are: 1) Understanding Poverty Overview, 2) Getting Ahead in a Just Gettin' By World Facilitator Training, and 3) Getting Ahead while Getting Out Reentry Model. The workshops are for agencies and organizations who work with people in poverty or people returning from incarceration. A summary about these three workshops is attached.

Discussion:

The purpose of these workshops is to provide a deeper understanding of the challenges of poverty, new strategies for building resources for greater stability and choices for people in poverty, and a comprehensive, community- and relationship-based approach to reentry that begins in pre-release and follows through with long-term support. Workshop fees are not revenue and are required for minimal costs not covered by the County. A public notice ad was published in The Daily Territorial for 15 days from September 23, 2016 to October 14, 2016.

Conclusion:

By providing these workshops, which require a fee collection, the community will have a greater understanding of poverty and reentry of incarcerated citizens with a goal to replace poverty with sustainable living standards.

Recommendation:

The Pima County Board of Supervisors approve the Fee Schedule for Educational Workshops on Poverty.

CSET Three-day Workshops - Fees and Descriptions

#1: *Understanding Poverty Overview Workshop*— Cost \$50.00

If your agency or organization works with people from poverty, only a deeper understanding of their challenges— and strengths—will help you partner with them to create opportunities for success. This workshop provides new insights to help you understand the experience of being chronically under-resourced so that you can build greater effectiveness in your work.

Participants will create a mental model of poverty, examine the latest research on stress and scarcity and how it shapes body, brain and behavior, and review tools for systemic change. Ideas and tools are drawn from the Bridges Out of Poverty framework, new research on scarcity, and other resources.

The workshop is led by Bonnie Bazata, the Ending Poverty Now Program Manager for Pima County Community Services, Employment and Training. Previously, Bonnie was the first Executive Director of the St. Joseph County Bridges Out of Poverty Initiative in South Bend, Indiana, whose mission was to “address generational poverty, supporting individuals in their move to self-sufficiency and improving the quality of life for the whole community.” She has presented nationally and internationally on this and other subjects.

#2: *Getting Ahead in a Just Gettin’ By World Facilitator Training* – Cost \$85.00

The purpose of the *Getting Ahead in a Just Gettin’ By World Workshop* is to provide people experiencing poverty and a chronic lack of resources with a comprehensive, community- and relationship-based approach to reentry that begins provides participants (called investigators) with new strategies and thinking to build resources for greater stability, choices, and community participation.

Become a certified *Getting Ahead* facilitator and help under-resourced individuals to:

- Stabilize and take charge of their lives
- Complete a self-assessment of their own resources and make plans to build them
- Develop a series of mental models to examine their own lives and create new future stories
- Investigate the impact that poverty has had on themselves and their community
- Use this information to build resources for a better life and community



Facilitator training includes the following topics: philosophy, theory, motivation and incentives, long-term support, mental models, content, process, and practice sessions. Additionally, you will receive:

- Overview of *Getting Ahead* PowerPoint slides
- Preparation to facilitate *Getting Ahead* groups
- *Getting Ahead* Workbook and accompanying Facilitator's Guide (the set)
- Pima County also provides on-going support for *Getting Ahead* facilitators

Note: Attending a day long workshop on understanding poverty provided by a certified Bridges Out of Poverty trainer is a pre-requisite.

#3: *Getting Ahead While Getting Out* Reentry Model Workshop – Cost \$200.00

The purpose of the *Getting Ahead While Getting Out* Reentry Model is to provide citizens returning from incarceration and their families a comprehensive, community- and relationship-based approach to reentry that begins in pre-release and follows through with long-term support.

The goal is to engage incarcerated individuals, their families, volunteers, community organizations, and people in corrections as problem solvers who work shoulder-to-shoulder to create communities where everyone can live well.

Become a *Getting Ahead While Getting Out* certified facilitator and help under-resourced individuals returning from incarceration to:

- Stabilize and take charge of their lives
- Complete a self-assessment of their own resources and make plans to build them
- Develop a series of mental models to examine their own lives and create new future stories
- Investigate the impact that poverty has had on themselves and their community
- Use this information to build resources for a better life and community

Facilitator training includes the following topics: philosophy, theory, motivation and incentives, long-term support, mental models, content, process, and practice sessions. Additionally, you will receive:
