

I am sending this email on behalf of my family and neighbors to express my deep concern about the proposed "Bike Hotel" that is currently being considered for approval in our neighborhood. I have been living on Old Spanish Trail, about 1/3 of a mile away from the proposed site for 17 years. The reason we chose to build our home where we did was due to the pristine nature of the area and the lack of commercial development. We are now being faced with the prospect of having a resort built smack in the middle of our little paradise. What a disgrace!

I am certain that if the proponents of this project lived in or neighborhood, they would be appalled with this proposal. Not only will this resort lead to increased car traffic on a scenic and historic road (which is already overburdened with heavy traffic), but it will result on a strain on our already precious resources including water, sewer, and clean and fresh smelling air. Dear Supervisor Miller,

We are communicating with you to express great concern with the proposed "Bicycle Ranch" request for rezoning. We have lived in this area for 37 years (one of the first residents) and have fallen completely in love with the rural ambience and life style which we hope that the zoning would preserve. The addition of a large commercial enterprise will greatly urbanize the area, increase traffic congestion both vehicular and bicycle and be detrimental to the wildlife habitat. The property in question, at the corner of Old Spanish Trail and Escalante Road, is presently rural conforming to SR-4 zoning. This was the zoning when we moved here and when the developer purchased the parcel. I do not believe a zoning change should be approved to accommodate the desires of one individual at the degradation in living ambience of those long term residents.

The area falls under an buffer overlay zoning designed to enhance and preserve the esthetics of the open space represented by Saguaro National Park East. Existing zoning, with no changes or variances, should remain. The applicable Pima Code was crafted to maintain the character of our County.

The developer has sent a publicity letter to several residents pointing out that there are eight grandfathered rental units which they can improve under a "non-conforming" exception to the existing code. My belief is that if they destroy these buildings, the "non-conforming" use ceases. I also note that the parking lot on their Preliminary plot plan/survey appears to be about 40% of the total property indicating plans to host large gatherings as opposed to a few dedicated bicyclists.

This proposal will virtually destroy the neighborhood and a way of life that the County evidently desired to promulgate with the Pima County AZ Buffer Overlay Zone law.

Ms. Miller, we urge you to do all in your power to deny this request for a zoning change/variance. Your support will be greatly appreciated.

Dear Board of Supervisors,

I am writing to you as the owner of the historic Saguaro Corners Restaurant and the closest neighbor to the proposed Bike Ranch on Old Spanish Trail. I am also writing as a developer/builder in Tucson and a neighbor/friend of Saguaro National Park.

Both myself and Saguaro National Park are against the current proposed plan. We both could be supportive with the proper adjustments but the owners have chosen to go against every suggestion. In fact the current plan is denser, higher and with less considerations to its neighbors than the plan presented to Jim Portner at the Conditional Use Hearing.

Specifically I would ask that you consider the following:

No conditions exist for approval.

The owners of the proposed Bike Ranch, Ms Mathews and Mr Lasher, have not only chosen to work against its neighbors, they have chosen to steamroll Pima County staff as well. Hence the plan being brought forward to BOS has no recommended conditions to go along with the plan. If somehow the BOS decides to move forward the minimum conditions should be 1) single story, 2) no structure within 200' of their property line, 3) no open sewer pond (only septic), 4) natural desert colors , 5) no commercial restaurant and 6) and 75% natural undisturbed open space.

The neighbors including the Park are not supportive.

While the owners of the proposed development may generate many support letters from other parts of Tucson the true question is how many are within the notification area for this variance. As their closest neighbor I have told the owners I would support them with subtle tweaks. As a developer myself I can say nothing proposed by myself or the Park is onerous but the owners have decided to take a confrontational approach. They are creating ill will that is not necessary in a good development process.

The current proposal harms the Saguaro National Park.

Saguaro National Park is a treasure of Pima County. Darla Sidles, superintendent of SNP, has stated she has "grave concerns" and "our job as one of the units of the National Park System is to protect resources and provide for our visitors, and that's why we have concerns about a proposed development immediately contiguous to the park boundary." These statements were made about the original plan which was less dense and only single story.

The current proposal harms Saguaro Corners Restaurant.

Saguaro Corners has been a restaurant on the far east side since 1959. It is quite famous for its scenic view outside its picture windows with a natural wild life corridor behind it. The current bike ranch proposal builds 3-4 casitas behind the restaurant and places a bike road through the wildlife corridor. The single request I made to the owners at my first meeting with them was about helping enhance rather than destroy our scenic wildlife view. They have chosen to ignore my one single request.

The Bike Ranch owners have mislead during the public process.

As a developer I am well aware of the right and wrong way to work with neighbors and the County. In my first meeting with the owners they told me that the west half of the project would remain open space and the project was single story. I told them I was supportive. It wasn't until I went to an informational meeting that I heard their consultant state that the west side now had seven estate homes, the project now had two story structures and they planned an open sewer pond next to the historic restaurant. Needless to say I was shocked at the new direction. (I have since heard they are going septic but there are no conditions to that effect.)

The Bike Ranch owners are now bullying their way to approval.

In the last 30 days the Bike Ranch has taken the approach that they are a grandfathered guest ranch. They are presenting an "alternative plan" that shows 30-40 casitas that they could build without approval from the Board of Supervisors. The fact is those homes on the old Calvert property have always been long term rental homes and never daily rentals or anything like a guest ranch. But that doesn't stop the owners from propagating this lie, this threat. The purpose of a public hearing is for the neighbors to be heard and through intimidation as well as drowning out their voices with non-neighbors the Bike Ranch owners are doing everything possible to hijack the process.

Members of the Board, the only fair and logical path forward is to VOTE NO on the current proposal so Ms. Mathews and Mr Lasher will feel compelled to sit down in good faith with Saguaro National

Park myself. The proposal has merits and is one we could support if only for some basic tweaks and collaboration. Thanks for your understanding and if you have any questions I can be reached on my cell at [REDACTED]

Arizona is full of tourist attractions from its restaurants to its breathtaking scenery. Thankfully, the owners of this project are concerned as well and therefore have designed a project with the utmost concern for the wildlife, our skies and our environment....actually they are including solar energy and gray water use to have as light a footprint as possible.

As far as the comment about traffic is concerned, the traffic study clearly states that if this property was subdivided into residential lots, there would be 20% more traffic than the Bike Ranch would generate. There are huge subdivisions all along this road and more to come that may be a concern for traffic but, when the majority of the in-and-out traffic from the Bike Ranch will be on bicycles, the park couldn't ask for a better neighbor!

What a great idea this is for the Tucson community and the Tucson economy.
