Regional Homeless Metrics:

TPCH Coordinated Entry System for Homeless Individuals / Families The 2024 Tucson Pima Collaboration to End Homelessness (TPCH) Gaps Analysis:

In 2023, 7,689 completed a Coordinated Entry Assessment for housing and homeless services with a participating agency / homeless services provider.

- Of the 7,689, only 1,069 met community established prioritization and were referred to a requesting housing provider.
- Of the 1,069 referred to a requesting housing provider, only
 535 were served in a housing program.

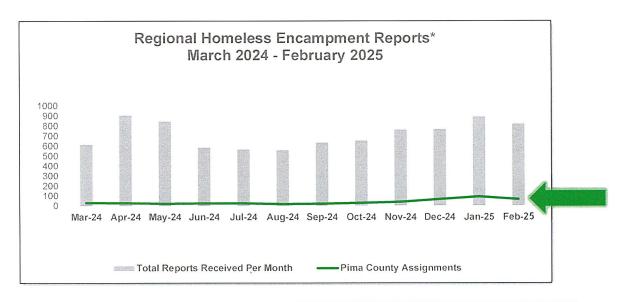

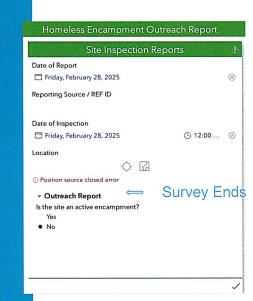

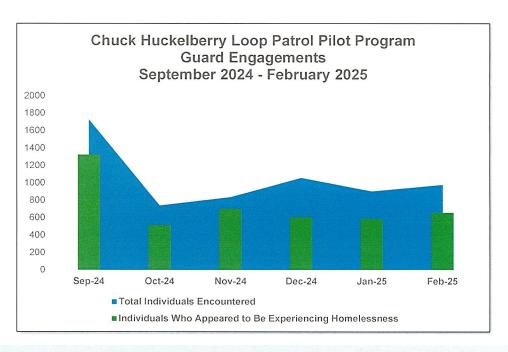

Pima County Chuck Huckelberry Loop Patrol Pilot Program:

Six Month Summary



- 70 percent of the aggregate total of individuals contacted at or after park closure appeared to be experiencing homelessness.
- Most encounters occurring at 6 of the 58 sites patrolled.
- · Guards have observed open drug use, sale of drugs, camp / warming fires
- Called 9-1-1 or a non-emergency lines a total of 30 times.
- Noted repopulation of sites / areas along the Loop 10-14 days following cleaning / remediation by County RFCD and others.
