Members of the Pima County board of supervisors have spent the past 11 months on a "Blue Ribbon" commission to evaluate the condition of the Pima county adult detention center. The finding of this commission is that the facility is in such disrepair that it may actually be more cost effective to build a new one! Even after studying the several hundred page report, somehow the board can come up with nothing more than to suggest empaneling yet another new commission to study the exact same problem. The detention center is falling in on itself. Conditions are reported by this very commission to be unsafe, dirty, and understaffed. The board of supervisors should immediately respond to the findings of this commission's report and allocate funds to repair this center. The need for a safe facility to humanely incarcerate those sentenced to confinement is a fact of life. The years of neglect have taken a toll on our current facility and it calls for much more than another year long study and a new commission.

Oddly enough, in this same budget there seems to be \$7,168,471.00 available to improve the Richard Elias-Mission Library. These funds were approved Feb. 20 2024 at the same meeting where we learned about the 600-900 million dollars needed for the Adult Detention Center. In addition to this there is a plan on the March 5 2024 agenda to increase funding for affordable housing another \$1,484,316. That budget has already been approved, awarded and spent.

Adult detention center: It is absolutely plain that the ADC is a necessity and that it is unsafe and filthy. A blue-ribbon commission has already studied it for 11 months and produced hundreds of pages. Something needs to be done besides appointing yet another commission. The most essential repairs need to be started at once. We cannot leave incarcerated individuals in unsafe conditions while a new facility is thought about and planned and built. There is plenty in the budget allocated for more elective purposes.

Essential infrastructure: We certainly need backup generator capacity for essential utilities, in case of grid failure--an increasingly likely threat as reliable electrical generating capacity is being replaced with unreliable, weather-dependent, non-economical (subsidy-dependent), purportedly "green" facilities.

Mosaic Quarter Development: while it seems that this might be a boon to the county, we should be vigitant that it is not a front for furthering the totalitarian, technocratic goals of a "15-minute city" that would limit mobility (in a spread-out city dependent on automobiles!) to limit CO2 emissions, with the stated but impossible goal of affecting the climate of the whole planet. Please vote no on anything that might relate to the UN's "sustainability" diktats instead of the good of your constituents.
