COVID-19 Medical Support for Refugee Populations		
*Purpose:		

Provide medical staff for COVID-19 evaluation, assessment and support at designated facilities that are housing refugees who are COVID-19 positive, suspect, or high risk.

Amendment #4 extends the Contract for an additional year and adds \$1,200,000 for the remainder of this contract year and for the extension year. Due to the fluctuation in the number of refugees arriving in Pima County, it is difficult to estimate future expense. At the current census level, we estimate this funding will last until the end of calendar year 2022.

#### \*Procurement Method:

Board of Supervisors Policy D29.7 per RFP for clinical services related to COVID-19 for refugees.

## \*Program Goals/Predicted Outcomes:

- Provide 11 hours/day of in person care to refugees that have tested positive for COVID-19, are suspected of being infected, or are at high risk. Care will be provided 7 days a week. The level of staffing varies with the refugee census and includes two levels of clinical licensure as well as support staff.
- Provide on-call services the remaining 13 hours of the day, 7 days a week.

#### \*Public Benefit:

This care is for refugees that are in the country legally. Many of them arrived from high risk areas. Containing COVID-19 among this population is important to controlling the virus in Pima County.

The average daily census of refugees being provided healthcare under this contract has increased from less than 40 at the beginning of the contract in August 2021 to 199 in January 2022. From the opening of this service at the Red Roof Inn on August 25, 2021 until February 10, 2022, a total of 13,343 refugees have been housed at this location. 7,032 of these were Covid positive and the remainder were at high risk due to relationships with the Covid positive refugees. All of the refugees at the Red Roof Inn are provided healthcare under this Contract.

#### CONTRACT AMENDMENT

The parties agree to amend the above-referenced contract as follows:

## 1. Background and Purpose.

- 1.1. <u>Background</u>. On July 2, 2021, County and Contractor entered into the above referenced agreement to provide COVID-19 medical support for refugee populations.
- 1.2. Purpose. County requires to extend the term for a year and add funds to the Contract.
- 2. Term. The County is exercising the first extension option to renew the contract for one additional year commencing on July 2, 2022 and terminating on July 1, 2023. If the commencement date is before the Effective Date of this amendment, the parties will, for all purposes, deem the amendment to have been in effect as of the commencement date.
- 3. Maximum Payment Amount. The maximum amount the County will spend under this Contract, as set forth in Section 5, is increased by \$1,200,000.00. County's total payments to Contractor under this contract, including any sales taxes, will not exceed \$1,848,750.00. Approximately \$550,000 of this amount is estimated for the remainder of the first year of the contract and the remainder for the second year of the contract.

#### SPECIAL CONTRACT PROVISIONS

# U.S. DEPARTMENT OF THE TREASURY CORONAVIRUS STATE & LOCAL FISCAL RECOVERY FUND PROCUREMENT CONTRACTS

- 1. Publications. Any publications produced with funds from this award must display the following language: "This project [is being] [was] supported, in whole or in part, by federal award number SLFRP0180 awarded to Pima County by the U.S. Department of the Treasury.
- 2. Federal regulations applicable to this award include, without limitation, the following:
  - Universal Identifier and System for Award Management (SAM), 2 C.F.R.
     Part 25, pursuant to which the award term set forth in Appendix A to 2
     C.F.R. Part 25 is hereby incorporated by reference.
  - b. OMG Guidelines to Agencies on Governmentwide Debarment and Suspension (Nonprocurement), 2 C.F.R. Part 180 and Treasury's implementing regulation at 31 C.F.R. Part 19. Contractor certifies that it has not been debarred or suspended and that none of its principals, affiliates or subcontractors are excluded or disgualified.
  - c. New Restrictions on Lobbying, 31 C.F.R. Part 21. Contractor certifies that it will not and has not used federally appropriated funds to pay any person or organization for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a Member of Congress, officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress in connection with obtaining any federal contract, grant, or any other award covered by 31 U.S.C. § 1352. Contractor shall disclose any lobbying with non-federal funds that takes place in connection with obtaining any federal award.
  - d. Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (42 U.S.C. §§ 2000d et seq.) and Treasury's implementing regulations at 31 C.F.R. Part 22, which prohibit discrimination on the basis of race, color, or national origin under programs or activities receiving federal financial assistance. Contractor shall comply with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, which prohibits recipients of federal financial assistance from excluding from a program or activity, denying benefits of, or otherwise discriminating against a person on the basis of race, color, or national Title VI also includes protection to persons with "Limited English Proficiency" in any program or activity receiving federal financial assistance.

- e. Generally applicable federal environmental laws and regulations. For contracts exceeding \$150,000 financed in whole or in part with federal assistance.
  - i. The contractor agrees to comply with all applicable standards, orders or regulations issued pursuant to the Clean Air Act, as amended, 42 U.S.C. § 7401 et seq.
  - ii. The contractor agrees to comply with all applicable standards, orders, or regulations issued pursuant to the federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended, 33 U.S.C. § 1251 et seq.
- f. Prohibition on Contracting for Covered Telecommunications Equipment or Services. As described in Public Law 115-232, section 889, the contractor and its subcontractors may not use grant funds to procure or obtain:
  - Equipment, services, or systems that uses telecommunications equipment produced by Huawei Technologies Company or ZTE Corporation (or any subsidiary or affiliate of such entities) as a substantial or essential component of any system, or as critical technology as part of any system.
  - ii. Video surveillance and telecommunications equipment produced by Hytera Communications Corporation, Hangzhou Hikvision Digital Technology Company, or Dahua Technology Company (or any subsidiary or affiliate of such entities).
  - iii. Telecommunications or video surveillance services provided by such entities or using such equipment.
- Domestic Preference for Procurements. As appropriate, and to the extent consistent with law, the contractor should, to the greatest extent practicable, provide a preference for the purchase, acquisition, or use of goods, products, or materials produced in the United States.
- 4. Increasing Seat Belt Use in the United States. Pursuant to Executive Order 13043, 62 FR 19217 (Apr. 18, 1997), Contractor should encourage its contractors to adopt and enforce on-the-job seat belt policies and programs for their employees when operating company-owned, rented or personally owned vehicles.
- 5. Reducing Text Messaging While Driving. Pursuant to Executive Order 13513, 74 FR 51225 (Oct. 6, 2009), Contractor should encourage its employees and contractors to adopt and enforce policies that ban text messaging while driving, and Contractor should establish workplace safety policies to decrease accidents caused by distracted drivers.
