ZONING ENFORCEMENT BOARD OF APPEALS MINUTES

1. APPEAL OF HEARING OFFICER'S DECISION

P13CV00086-1, 4241 S. AVENIDA DON FELIPE

In accordance with the Pima County Zoning Code Section 18.95.030C, Robert T. and Alice B. Otero appeal the decision of the Hearing Officer in Case No. P13CV00086-1 on property located at 4241 S. Avenida Don Felipe, for violations of Pima County Zoning Code, Section 18.09.020B - improper parking of unoccupied trailers, more than one trailer not permitted in CR 1 zone. (District 5)

Rick Bruster, Code Enforcement Supervisor, reported that a complaint had been received, an investigation conducted and a citation issued for violations on the property. A hearing had been conducted and a judgment rendered which found Mr. Otero responsible. He explained that a fine of \$750.00 had been imposed with \$150.00 due and \$600.00 suspended for 60 days pending compliance. He added that the property was almost to the point of compliance. He reported that Mr. Otero's appeal dealt with the amount of the fine, not the substance of the violations and that staff recommended the decision of the Hearing Officer be upheld.

Robert Otero Jr., spoke on behalf of his father, Robert Otero, Sr., appellant. He stated that the fine was not the point but rather the larger issue of continued harassment by one anonymous neighbor. Mr. Otero recounted the circumstances with the neighbor which he believed resulted in the continued complaints. He further explained that the County record showed that the Otero Family had come into compliance with every complaint that had been made. He said the County needed to understand that they were being singled out and until something was done, they would be back in this same position again.

Supervisor Elías questioned the process regarding continued anonymous complaints.

Supervisor Bronson stated that it appeared there were other violations in the neighborhood that were quite similar but that were not being prosecuted by the County and that was a challenge in handling zoning violations and code enforcement.

It was moved by Supervisor Elías, seconded by Supervisor Bronson and unanimously carried by a 5-0 vote, to close the public hearing and to waive the fine pending compliance with the current violation. Staff was also directed to examine the process regarding zoning violations and code enforcement to form a balanced approach so that no one family was singled out.

2. APPEAL OF HEARING OFFICER'S DECISION

P13CV00057-1, 6285 N. PAPAYA PLACE

In accordance with the Pima County Zoning Code Section 18.95.030C, Brad Campbell appeals the decision of the Hearing Officer in Case No. P13CV00057-1 on property located at 6285 N. Papaya Place, for violations of Pima County Zoning Code, Sections 18.07.030C, 18.09.020P and Q - open storage/improper storage of inoperable vehicles and boat. (District 1)

Rick Bruster, Code Enforcement Supervisor, reported that a complaint had been received, an investigation conducted and a citation issued for violations on the property. A hearing had been conducted and a judgment rendered that the property owner was responsible for the violation and a fine of \$750.00, \$375.00 due and \$375.00 suspended, had been imposed. He stated that upon recent inspection, there had been no progress toward compliance on the property and that this property had been the subject of numerous complaints dating back to 1996 for the same issues. He stated that staff recommended the decision of the Hearing Officer be upheld.

The Chairman then called the appellant, no one appeared.

It was moved by Supervisor Miller, seconded by Supervisor Bronson and unanimously carried by a 5-0 vote, to close the public hearing and uphold the decision of the Hearing Officer.

Pursuant to A.R.S. §38-431.03(A) (3) and (4), for legal advice and direction regarding settlement of Marana 670 Holdings, L.L.C., v. Pima County, Arizona Tax Court Case No. TX2012-000133, Tax Parcel Nos. 216-40-0500/0780, 216-40-1200/1280, 216-40-1320/1630 for tax years 2012 and 2013.

Without objection, this item was removed from the agenda.

10. Pursuant to A.R.S. §38-431.03(A) (3) and (4), for legal advice and direction regarding Hub Properties Trust v. Pima County, Arizona Tax Court Case No. TX2013-000002, Tax Parcel Nos.: 117-12-098A, 117-12-099A, and 117-12-103C for tax year 2013.

Chris Straub, Chief Deputy County Attorney, reported this case involved a challenge to a valuation of a 23 story high rise building of approximately 285,521 square feet located at 1 S. Church Avenue and two associated parcels; that the proposed settlement would reduce the full cash value of the largest parcel from \$25,800,000 to \$22,800,000, resulting in an estimated tax decrease of \$93,534.49 for the tax year 2013; that the values at issue would not roll over to 2014 nor would the legal classification and assessment ratio change. He stated the County Assessor and County Attorney's Office recommended approval of the proposed settlement.

It was moved by Supervisor Bronson, seconded by Supervisor Miller and unanimously carried by a 5-0 vote, to accept the recommendation.

COUNTY ADMINISTRATOR

Chuck Huckelberry, County Administrator, explained that increased financial support by the City and County was necessary due to the lack of a title sponsor. He also stated that the event route had been changed this year due to road conditions.

18. Waiver of Development Impact Fee

Pursuant to Pima County Code Section 19.03.070, James Fabins requests a waiver of the Roadway Development Impact Fee for the placement of a residential dwelling unit on property located at 6920 N. Trico Road, in the Silverbell-Tortolita Impact Fee Benefit Area. (District 3)

Priscilla Cornelio, Transportation Director, reported that the property owner had requested a waiver of the Roadway Development Impact Fee based upon the existence of prior residences that had not been permitted and for which he had gone to a lot of expense to remove. She stated that pursuant to the standard criteria for a waiver, staff had recommended denial.

James Fabins, property owner, stated that since his purchase of the property, tons of housing debris and three unearthed substandard septic systems had been removed. He explained that when he attempted to get a septic permit he was informed that no permits had ever been issued for the property. He said he had gone to great expense to bring this property up to code and requested his impact fee be reduced to the fee as existed in 2000.

Supervisor Miller questioned why these issues had not been uncovered during a title search for the purchase of the property.

Chuck Huckelberry, County Administrator, explained that it appeared the structures had been mobile homes that were considered personal property and would not have been listed by the Assessor relative to this specific property.

It was moved by Supervisor Bronson, seconded by Supervisor Carroll and unanimously carried by a 5-0 vote, to reduce the Roadway Development Impact Fee to \$2,000.00 as requested by Mr. Fabins.

John Bernal, Deputy County Administrator, clarified that the request by Mr. Fabins was the amount the fee would have been in the year 2000, which was \$1,550.00.

It was moved by Supervisor Bronson, seconded by Supervisor Miller and unanimously carried by a 5-0 vote, to reconsider the matter.

It was then moved by Supervisor Bronson, seconded by Supervisor Carroll and unanimously carried by a 5-0 vote, to reduce the Roadway Development Impact Fee to \$1,550.00 as requested.

30. Code Text Amendment

The Board of Supervisors on October 15, 2013, continued the following:

Co8-11-06, RENEWABLE ENERGY INCENTIVE DISTRICT (REID)

An ordinance of the Board of Supervisors of Pima County, Arizona; amending Section 14.04.010 REID Site Maps of Chapter 14.04 Maps of Title 14 Renewable Energy Incentive District (REID) of the Pima County Code to correct several Scrivener's mapping errors, replace the existing ordinance maps with more readable maps, and present the ordinance before the Board of Supervisors for an annual review. The Renewable Energy Incentive District (REID) ordinance designated specific sites where utility-scale solar facilities may be developed more expeditiously; specified REID site criteria; established performance

standards and an incentive plan for the facility development; and provided a process for amending REID site criteria and designating new REID sites.

- 1. The scrivener's mapping errors requested for correction are:
 - a) Removing the area designated "Important Riparian Area" according to the Pima County Comprehensive Plan's Maeveen Marie Behan Conservation Lands System as REID sites within Tax Code Parcels 303-09-0030 and 305-01-0030. Areas designated as "Important Riparian Areas" do not qualify as REID sites. The subject parcels are located on the west and east sides of Wilmot Road and two miles south of the Old Vail Connection Road. The Tax Code Parcel 303-09-0030 is within the Swan Southlands Specific Plan site and the other parcel is east of the specific plan site. Inclusion of the areas was an inadvertent error made during the development of the REID ordinance process; and
 - b) Correctly reflecting on the "Northwest" REID ordinance map, the Board of Supervisors decision on April 3, 2012 to remove Tax Code Parcels 208-41-036F, 208-41-036G, 208-41-046D, 208-41-060A, 208-41-060B, 208-41-036D, and 208-41-0510 as designated REID sites. The subject parcels are located near Manville Road and west of Sandario Road. The sites were inadvertently left on the REID ordinance map for that area and should have been removed.
- The proposed ordinance map replacements will be more readable than the current ordinance maps and will delineate Tier 1 REID sites from Tier 2 REID sites.
- 3. The ordinance shall also be presented to the Board of Supervisors for an annual review. Section 2 of Ordinance 2012-16 states: "This ordinance shall be reconsidered by the Board of Supervisors with respect amending the REID site and/or amending the criteria for designating REID sites approximately one year after its adoption date".

On motion, the Planning and Zoning Commission voted 7-0 (Commissioners Poulos, Membrila, and Holdridge were absent) to recommend APPROVAL. Staff recommends APPROVAL. (ALL DISTRICTS)

If approved, pass and adopt: ORDINANCE NO. 2013 - 46

Chris Poirier, Assistant Planning Director, provided the staff report, stated the Board had previously adopted the REID in early 2012 and explained the proposed amendment would correct mapping errors and provide the updated REID maps. He also informed the Board that there would be another amendment to the REID maps which would add additional land for the Swan Southland Specific Plan.

The Chairman inquired whether anyone wished to address the Board. No one appeared. It was moved by Supervisor Bronson, seconded by Supervisor Carroll and unanimously carried by a 5-0 vote, to close the public hearing, approve the Code Text Amendment and adopt the Ordinance.

31. **Rezoning**

Co9-13-11, AZ SQUARE #7, L.L.C. - NOGALES HWY

Request of <u>AZ Square #7, L.L.C., represented by Phil Williams</u>, for a rezoning of approximately .83 acres from the GR-1 (Rural Residential) zone to the CB-1 (Local Business) zone, on a portion of property at 9770 S. Nogales Highway located approximately two hundred feet south of Old Vail Connection Road, on the west side of Nogales Hwy. The proposed rezoning conforms to the Pima County Comprehensive Plan (Co7-00-20). On motion, the Planning and Zoning Commission voted 7-0 (Commissioners Poulos, Membrila, and Holdridge absent) to recommend APPROVAL WITH STANDARD AND SPECIAL CONDITIONS. Chris Poirier, Assistant Planning Director, provided the staff report and stated staff has received no public protest to date. He reported that there were still outstanding issues regarding access to the site but that the Planning and Zoning Commission and staff recommended approval pending resolution of the access location by the Department of Transportation.

Phil Williams, Project Engineer, presented the Board with the issues regarding access to the site. He stated there were competing requirements and access options from different County entities. Mr. Williams expressed support for the two driveway solution due to direct access from the street to the parking lot without necessitating an easement through another lot.

Priscilla Cornelio, Transportation Director, explained the department favored the one access entry point and that it was safer from a sight visibility standpoint to consolidate driveways.

It was moved by Chairman Valadez, seconded by Supervisor Bronson and unanimously carried by a 5-0 vote, to continue the item until such time as an agreement was reached or until December 3, 2013, with direction to the Transportation Department and the Project Engineer to meet and agree upon a practical solution that worked for everyone.

Chris Straub, Chief Deputy County Attorney, notified the Board that if the public hearing remained open, notice requirements would have to be met before the matter could again come before the Board. He suggested, if all testimony had been taken, that the public hearing be closed and the matter continued to the conditional date.

It was moved by Chairman Valadez, seconded by Supervisor Bronson and unanimously carried by a 5-0 vote, to reconsider the matter.

Chuck Huckelberry, County Administrator, explained this was an emergency action for short term relief to increase capacity at the Pima Animal Care Center (PACC) with a tent facility. He stated the long term solution would be to increase participation and funding through the Spay/Neuter Program with the participation of other jurisdictions. He advised this would require additional expenses that would need to be included in the Animal Care budget for next fiscal year.

It was moved by Supervisor Miller and seconded by Supervisor Bronson to approve the request. No vote was taken at this time.

Supervisor Miller commended staff and the volunteers at the Animal Care Center and added that outreach was needed to expand the Spay/Neuter Program. She questioned whether there was a long term plan.

Chuck Huckelberry responded that three options were being pursued. He said the first was to have a voluntary approach for participation in the program; another was to investigate whether the County had authority to impose an animal welfare fee on every license; and finally to consider the spay/neuter program as an operational expense in the Animal Care budget which would be apportioned back to the jurisdictions automatically.

Supervisor Carroll asked what other communities have done regarding mandatory spay/neuter and whether it had been successful.

Supervisor Bronson questioned whether a mandatory program would be imposed only on the unincorporated areas of the County.

Mr. Huckelberry responded that a 10 community survey of similar communities was currently being undertaken and the topic of mandatory spay/neuter could be added. He said that the legislature may need to provide authority to adopt this type of program.

Supervisor Elias stated this was an important step but not a satisfactory solution and that Animal Care should be part of a future bond project.

The following speakers addressed the Board in support of the expansion:

- Medical care, increased adoption, increased owner retention and the Spay/Neuter program were also part of resolving issues at PACC.
- A comprehensive No Kill model could address all shelter issues.
