Re: Board of Supervisors December 20, 2022 Meeting, Consent Agenda Item #7

At the December 20, 2022 Board Meeting, during discussion of Consent Agenda Item # 7, *Justice Services Old Pueblo Community Services, to Provide for the Pima County Housing First Program,* Supervisor Christy asked for clarification about the different types of housing initiatives targeting houseless justice-involved individuals.

Low-income individuals with a history of incarceration have among the greatest risk for homelessness. This is even higher for that subset of the population that is further challenged with behavioral health diagnoses and substance use disorder. For that reason, innovative efforts are under way by County staff to assess the effectiveness of novel strategies to address the unique needs of this population.

The attached table provides that side-by-side comparison of INVEST led by the Behavioral Health Department and the Housing First initiative led by the Justice Services Department. Both initiatives are substantially supported with federal Department of Justice resources and local funds.

Side-by-side comparison of INVEST and the Housing First initiative

Program Name	INVEST	Housing First
