








Accessible Website

Large Print & Braille Ballots









Express Vote Machine

- Touchscreen or Joystick Ballot Marking Device
- Voter inserts narrow cardstock in device
- Device reads ballot to voter via headphones
- Large print options available
- · Device can be used with screen off
- Multiple languages are available
- Voter marks selections and can return to any race to make changes before a final review.
- Voter reviews selections and selections are printed on cardstock ballot
- Ballot is folded and placed in a ballot affidavit and signature is required

Team Voting


- Available to location bound voters
 - Hospitals
 - Rehabilitation Centers
 - Jail
 - Homes
- Due to limited resources, voters are vetted to ensure that team voting services are the voter's only options
- Two operators of opposite party visit the voter and provide them with a ballot on site.
- The ballot must be issued, voted and returned on site.
- Operators bring multiple ballots with them in case of a mistake and account for all ballots upon return.
- Voter registration services are also available during these visits.


