RE: Co7-13-10 Pima County Comprehensive Plan Update, Pima Prospers

Dear Chair Bronson and Board Members:

The Coalition for Sonoran Desert Protection appreciates the opportunity to provide comments on Pima County's Comprehensive Land Use Plan update, *Pima Prospers*.

- The Coalition supports the emphasis in *Pima Prospers* on protecting biologically important lands, encouraging compact development, creating a connected open space preserve system, protecting our water resources, and recognizing the contribution of conservation to the "long-term viability of the region," outlined in Elements of Land Use, Open Space, Water Resources, and Economic Development.
- 2. We fully support the addition of an official policy addressing Conservation Land System Off-site Mitigation Guidelines (Environment Element, Policy 11 and Policy 12). We recognize that County staff has been unofficially implementing this policy for years, including County Administrator C.H. Huckelberry, and we support codifying this policy in *Pima Prospers*.
- 3. We reviewed drafts of maps and additional parcel-by-parcel analysis completed for *Pima Prospers*. We appreciate that, in 41 separate cases, County staff is recommending that the Comprehensive Plan reflect density changes or other changes from the current Plan. The Coalition agrees with these suggested changes, with the exception of the eight cases listed in Attachment A (multiple parcels in some cases). Six of these eight cases have been identified as a *Habitat Protection Priority* because of their high habitat values, and two are adjacent to large blocks of preserved habitat (Arthur Pack Park, Mason Audubon Center, Cortaro/Thornydale 60 acres). The best use for these parcels is full conservation, especially since finding like habitat near the area of impact for mitigation is challenging. The Coalition believes that the higher densities recommended by the staff are inappropriate on these parcels and therefore cannot support them. We understand that the property owners may come to the County in the future for rezoning, and would therefore be required to comply with the Conservation

Lands System. However, if that is the case, we believe that the proposal should go through a full vetting of the two-step process – a plan amendment in the annual Comprehensive Plan Amendment process followed by a Rezoning. At their April 8, 2015 meeting, the Pima County Planning and Zoning Commission supported this recommendation.

Thank you for considering our comments and recommendations on *Pima Prospers*. With the consideration of, and action on, the change outlined above in comment #3, the Coalition is prepared to support *Co7-13-10 Pima County Comprehensive Plan Update, Pima Prospers*.
