They offered the following comments:

- Mom's Across America would support Pima County in efforts to take action against Monsanto.
- Monsanto would bring harm and escape local laws.
- Detoxification of humans was being conducted because of the effects of genetically modified foods and land would be taken by Monsanto because of cross pollination with other crops.
- Libertarian Party opposed all federal trade zones because they were immoral, special treatment was only given to some companies.
- Monsanto had a history of polluting and leaving.
- Urged the Board to oppose the Foreign Trade Zone Payment in Lieu of Taxes Agreement.
- Special tax breaks given by Pima County for corporations such as World View, Caterpillar and Raytheon would continue to fatten their pockets at the taxpayer's expense.
- The greenhouse deal would not promote a safe community, sustain natural resources or protect public health.
- Community did not want Monsanto as a neighbor and a vote should have been made on the issue.
- Military soldiers in Vietnam exposed to Agent Orange were told that it would not affect animals or humans, but many have died and suffered from illnesses caused by it.
- The Sonoran Desert Conservation Plan would be adversely and dangerously affected by Monsanto.
- Persons with an autoimmune disorder would remain sick if they ate genetically modified foods.
- The San Xavier Cooperative Association urged the Board to reject Monsanto's request and to support business that benefited the health, well-being and economy of the people in the County.
- Although Monsanto's bid for a tax break was off the table, the threat to the community remained real and opposition continued.
- GMO Free Arizona was concerned about the 148 acres of genetically engineered crops and the close proximity to a school.
- There was a loss of confidence in the political process and it seemed as if there was a morally, ethically corrupt situation and that a committee be created for representation of the community.
- Genetically modified grains have not been studied on a wide scale and was irreversible.
- The Sonoran Desert and the Saguaros needed to be protected.
- Monsanto deliberately manipulated an Eastern European local seed bank and urged the Board not to welcome Monsanto to the community.

Special Conditions

- 1. The new top height of the tower structure shall not be more than the requested eighty feet (80') and shall be camouflaged as a faux water tower of "old West" design and aesthetic.
- 2. The entire tower structure, including the supporting members the water tower "tank", shall be consistent in aesthetic with "old West" water tower design and aesthetic.
- 3. All associated cabling, etc. necessary to serve the antennae within the "tank" of the faux water tower shall be painted or otherwise treated so as to visually and aesthetically integrate into the faux water tower structure.

The Board of Supervisors will make the appointment of the Constable, JP 2 at their meeting on April 4, 2017.

The individual appointed will serve the portion of the term until the next General Election in November, 2018. The person elected will then serve the remainder of the unexpired term through 2018.

It was then moved by Supervisor Valadez, seconded by Supervisor Elías, to proceed with the selection process. No vote was taken at this time.

Chair Bronson questioned whether the Board wanted to conduct a public forum.

Supervisor Elías concurred to conducting a public forum.

Chair Bronson directed the Clerk of the Board to proceed with a public forum.

Upon the vote, it was unanimously carried by 5-0.

## 21. Visit Tucson Funding for Rillito Racetrack Advertising

Discussion and possible action related to Visit Tucson Funding for Rillito Racetrack Advertising. (District 1)

Supervisor Miller stated that while visiting the Visit Tucson's website there were no items on the calendar for Rillito Racing. She questioned whether the Board considered advertising for the racetrack on that website.

Supervisor Elías stated that Visit Tucson was not a wholly owned part of Pima County and that it was a privately owned non-profit with its own Board of Directors. He inquired whether Supervisor Miller had contacted Visit Tucson about this issue.

Supervisor Miller stated that she had no authority to bring it to the Visit Tucson Board and that Pima County contributed \$3.2 million to them.

Chair Bronson stated that the County has an annual contract with Visit Tucson which provides direction. She stated that Visit Tucson could provide the Board with information on what they do for Rillito Racetrack.

Supervisor Miller stated that she reviewed Visit Tucson's second quarter report from October through December of 2016, which showed the County gave Visit Tucson about 37 percent to their revenue and that it would be beneficial to maximize revenues of the racetrack.

Supervisor Valadez stated that the bed tax was statutorily set and that the County was partners with Visit Tucson. He stated that to ensure attractions are listed, an inventory should be kept and to continue to work with them on updating information.

Supervisor Christy stated that other assets within Pima County should also be considered for advertising.

Supervisor Elías concurred with Supervisor Valadez that Visit Tucson was a business partner and that it would be proper business practice to speak to the management regarding this information.

Supervisor Miller questioned if anyone sat on the Visit Tucson Board.

Chair Bronson stated that she was a member on the Visit Tucson Board and would be happy to bring this to their attention.

Chuck Huckelberry, County Administrator, stated that he recently communicated with Brent DeRaad regarding adding Rillito Racetrack to Visit Tucson's Facebook page along with regularly advertised County attractions for the non-profit entities that operated on various County properties. He also stated that the bed tax is set by statute, 50 percent of the bed tax revenues came from hotels and motels in unincorporated Pima County.

Supervisor Miller stated that with offices in Hermosillo and Los Mochis horse racing activities should be add to their events calendar.

Supervisor Christy inquired what the appropriate method would be to find out how and when Visit Tucson would add the events to their website.

Chair Bronson explained that it could be discussed at their monthly Board meetings and that she could bring it to their attention. She stated that they could move forward with the direction given.

Chuck Huckelberry, County Administrator, explained there was no urgency and that the January 8th Memorial Foundation was in the process of pushing legislation appropriations at the Federal and State levels.

Upon the vote, the motion unanimously carried by 5-0.

## FINANCE AND RISK MANAGEMENT

## 23. **Revisions to Board of Supervisors Policy**

Staff requests approval of the proposed revisions to Board of Supervisors Policy No. D22.8, Operating Transfers.

Supervisor Elías questioned why this revision was needed.

Tom Burke, Deputy County Administrator, explained that the existing procedure restricted signatories for certain dollar amounts. He stated the revisions allowed the County Administrator to sign for anything under \$500,000.00 and increased the Finance Director's approval up to \$100,000.00.

Supervisor Elías questioned if there were any instances where the current policy was problematic.

Mr. Burke stated they haven't had any problems.

Supervisor Elías stated that he didn't understand the need since there were no identifiable issues with the current policy.

It was moved by Supervisor Miller, seconded by Supervisor Elías and unanimously carried by a 5-0 vote, to deny the item.

#### REAL PROPERTY

#### 24. Lot Split

Staff requests approval of a lot split for Pima County owned parcel into three new tax parcels, north of and adjacent to Aerospace Parkway, located within Section 31, T15S, R14E, G&SRM, Tax Parcel No. 140-52-001E, Pima County, Arizona. (District 2)

It was moved by Chair Bronson and seconded by Supervisor Valadez to approve the item. No vote was taken at this time.

Supervisor Miller questioned what the purpose was to split the World View lot and requested clarification for its use of existing leases and future surplus.

Chuck Huckelberry, County Administrator, explained that the Assessor required that once we divide property that is under lease or sale it must have a parcel number for future tax payers.

Supervisor Miller questioned if the lot split reduced the size of the lot that was originally leased to World View.

Mr. Huckelberry stated that it would divide the property between what the County retained and the property under lease purchase with World View.

Upon the vote, the motion unanimously carried by 5-0.

## TRANSPORTATION

## 25. Smart Growth America Complete Streets Workshop Initiatives

RESOLUTION NO. 2017 - <u>11</u>, of the Board of Supervisors, authorizing Pima County to support the Smart Growth America Complete Streets workshop initiatives.

It was moved by Chair Bronson and seconded by Supervisor Elías to adopt the Resolution. No vote was taken at this time.

Supervisor Miller questioned the fiscal impacts because personnel time would be associated with workshop classes and if there was a list of existing and completed bicycle projects with amounts.

Chuck Huckelberry, County Administrator, explained that the cost to the County was for staff of the Transportation Department assigned and whether or not it brought new projects to the County. He also stated that if it was a grant application it would be brought through the County or could go through Pima Association of Governments (PAG) or the Regional Transportation Authority (RTA) process.

Chair Bronson requested project information be distributed to the Board.

Upon the vote, the motion unanimously carried by 5-0.

It was moved by Chair Bronson and seconded by Supervisor Valadez to approve the item. No vote was taken at this time. Supervisor Miller questioned why the funding was not coming out of the Assessor's Department.

Chuck Huckelberry, County Administrator, explained the funding in the case was litigation associated with Open Meeting Law claims and those were paid from the contingency as opposed to the Assessor hiring separate legal counsel associated with those caseloads.

Supervisor Miller questioned which Open Meeting Law claims.

Mr. Huckelberry corrected that it was for Public Records Requests and not Open Meeting Law claims. He stated the Public Records Requests dealt with the structure associated with the Assessor's valuation models.

Supervisor Miller questioned whether the Assessor has complied.

Mr. Huckelberry stated that was the purpose of the litigation and didn't believe he complied.

Supervisor Miller questioned how much longer the litigation would continue and how much it would cost the tax payers to prevent a citizen from obtaining assessment models.

Mr. Huckelberry stated that would need to be addressed by the Assessor.

Chair Bronson called the question. Upon the vote, the motion carried by 3-2, Supervisors Christy and Miller voted "Nay."

Supervisor Christy questioned whether this was a joint Arizona Department of Transportation (ADOT) and Regional Transportation Authority (RTA) Project.

Chuck Huckelberry, County Administrator, explained it was north of the ADOT project where Kinney Road through the intersection terminated and the County picked up past Bopp Road.

Priscilla Cornelio, Transportation Director, stated that Pima County Transportation obtained Federal Funds to make the improvements and needed to fast track the design to be able to use the funding by next fiscal year.

Supervisor Christy questioned if it would be a connection to the whole project.

Chair Bronson stated that this was part of the larger Highway 86 and Kinney Road project that involved Pima County, ADOT and RTA.

Upon the vote, the motion unanimously carried by 5-0.

33. To provide furniture products and services, General Fund, contract amount \$3,500,000.00 (MA-PO-17-163) Facilities Management, for the following:

Supervisor Miller questioned the contract amount for furniture.

Lisa Josker, Facilities Management Director, explained this was a master agreement for furniture services as-needed.

Chair Bronson commented that it was a contract that was needed for normal business on a periodic basis and these types of contracts were done as-needed.

Supervisor Miller questioned the graveyard furniture at Goodman's Warehouse, Herman Miller Furniture, and if the County utilized that furniture first.

Ms. Josker stated that they do try to utilize that furniture first.

Upon the vote, the motion carried by 4-1, Supervisor Miller voted "Nay."

 Durazo Construction Corporation, Lloyd Construction Company, Inc. and M. Anderson Construction Corp., to provide a job order master agreement for park development services, Various Funds, contract amount \$2,500,000.00 (MA-PO-17-178) Public Works

It was moved by Chair Bronson and seconded by Supervisor Valadez to approve the item. No vote was taken at this time.

Supervisor Christy questioned park development services, which park this affected and what would be done to develop a park.

Chuck Huckelberry, County Administrator, explained it was a master agreement to select two contractors through competitive procurement. He stated that if there were projects within County parks for improvements, modifications, ball fields or

rehabilitations, the scope of work would be developed and those contractors would provide a proposal and price. The contract would then be awarded by the Board to the lowest bidder.

Supervisor Christy stated that the contract did not specify when, where or how much.

Chair Bronson stated that a master contract was not project specific and would set the ceiling and as it became necessary, then it would be bid out or awarded and approved by the Board.

Supervisor Christy questioned if the Board would have input on the projects to be reviewed.

Chair Bronson stated it would be Natural Resources, Parks and Recreation's recommendation, with approval by the Board.

Supervisor Christy questioned if they would see a list of parks to be considered.

Chair Bronson stated when circumstances occurred.

Supervisor Elías elaborated that often times they have already been procured and seen by the Board which gave authority to fix things when broken and reduced liability in public parks.

Supervisor Miller questioned how the amount was figured.

Chair Bronson stated they know the total area, what had been seen historically and based on age of parks and other variables.

Supervisor Miller questioned if it would be used for new park projects.

Mr. Huckelberry stated they would not be used for new projects and most of the expenditures would be for Sports Park this year and for replacement of the splash pad at Brandi Fenton Park. He stated a new park would not be built, but only components of parks for repairs.

Supervisor Christy stated that he was concerned that constituents would question why some parks were picked for repair versus their own neighborhood's parks.

Chair Bronson stated that constituents could bring their concerns to the Supervisor and in turn, bring it to Parks' staff.

Upon the vote, the motion carried by 4-1, Supervisor Miller voted "Nay."

Supervisor Christy questioned if this was the issue of the property located on the northeast corner of Kolb Road and Valencia Road where the County removed itself from the lead jurisdiction and turned it over to the Regional Transportation Authority (RTA).

Priscilla Cornelio, Transportation Director, explained the County constructed Valencia Road from Alvernon Way to Wilmot Road and that this was for the close out of the agreement. She also stated that this was for termination of all the work allowing collection of the last few dollars from the RTA.

Supervisor Christy stated that the original amount was \$10.7 million and now it was up to \$25 million for a total of \$37 million and questioned what led to the result of the total amount.

Ms. Cornelio explained it was due to some of the design improvements, school districts, landscaping, noise walls and drainage.

Upon the vote, the motion unanimously carried by 5-0.
