He added that if approved by the Board the exemption waiver would be forwarded to the Assessor's Office to determine if the property was entitled to the exemptions.

Supervisor Miller stated that she disapproved of this item because the new owner was not an L.L.C. and they were requesting a refund of taxes assessed on the original property owner.

John Safer, Rusing Lopez & Lizardi, P.L.L.C., explained that the L.L.C. was a special purpose entity and the request was made on behalf of the bank that took a loss on the property. He stated that while Pasadera Behavioral Health Network remained in possession of the property, they were unable to file for the property tax exemption or take over the property prior to Pasadera's exit.

Upon the vote, the motion carried 4-1, Supervisor Miller voted "Nay."

P18RZ00002, ACM VENTURES, L.L.C. - E. SNYDER ROAD REZONING

Request of <u>ACM Ventures, L.L.C., represented by John Wesley Miller</u>, for a rezoning of approximately 7.20 acres from the SR (Suburban Ranch) and SR (BZ) (Suburban Ranch - Buffer Overlay) zones to the SR-2 (Suburban Ranch Estate) and SR-2 (BZ) (Suburban Ranch Estate - Buffer Overlay) zones, on property located at the southwest corner of the intersection of E. Snyder Road and N. Lason Lane. The proposed rezoning conforms to the Pima County Comprehensive Plan which designates the property for Low Intensity Urban 1.2. On motion, the Planning and Zoning Commission voted 7-0 (Commissioners Bain, Becker, and Hook were absent) to recommend APPROVAL SUBJECT TO STANDARD AND SPECIAL CONDITIONS. Staff recommends APPROVAL SUBJECT TO STANDARD AND SPECIAL CONDITIONS. (District 1)

Completion of the following requirements within five years from the date the rezoning request is approved by the Board of Supervisors:

- 1. The property owner shall not further lot split or subdivide the land without the written approval of the Board of Supervisors.
- 2. Adherence to the sketch plan as approved at public hearing.
- 3. Prior to ground modifying activities, an on-the-ground archaeological and historic sites survey shall be conducted on the subject property. A cultural resources mitigation plan for any identified archaeological and historic sites on the subject property shall be submitted at the time of, or prior to, the submittal of any tentative plan or development plan. All work shall be conducted by an archaeologist permitted by the Arizona State Museum, or a registered architect, as appropriate. Following rezoning approval, any subsequent development requiring a Type II grading permit will be reviewed for compliance with Pima County's cultural resources requirements under Chapter 18.81 of the Pima County Zoning Code.
- 4. Upon the effective date of the Ordinance, the owner(s)/developer(s) shall have a continuing responsibility to remove buffelgrass (*Pennisetum ciliare*) from the property. Acceptable methods of removal include chemical treatment, physical removal, or other known effective means of removal. This obligation also transfers to any future owners of property within the rezoning site; and Pima County may enforce this rezoning condition against the property owner.
- 5. Adherence to Chapter 18.67 Buffer Overlay Zone (BOZO) performance standards for the portion of the rezoning site within the BOZO. The applicable performance standards include provisions for building color and reflective finish, fences and walls, lighting, utilities, functional open space, and natural open space.
- 6. At the time of development the applicant will be required to commit to water conservation measures identified in the Site Analysis Requirements in effect at that time sufficient to obtain 15 points.
- 7. The property owner shall execute the following disclaimer regarding Proposition 207 rights: "Property Owner acknowledges that neither the rezoning of the Property nor the conditions of rezoning give Property Owner any rights, claims or causes of action under the Private Property Rights Protection Act (Arizona Revised Statutes Title 12, chapter 8, article 2.1). To the extent that the rezoning or conditions of rezoning may be construed to give Property Owner any rights or claims under the Private Property Rights Protection Act, Property Owner hereby waives any and all such rights and/or claims pursuant to A.R.S. § 12-1134.
- 8. In the event the subject property is annexed, the property owner shall adhere to all applicable rezoning conditions, including, but not limited to, development conditions which require financial contributions to, or construction of infrastructure, including without limitation, transportation, flood control, or sewer facilities.

Supervisor Miller inquired whether anyone wished to address the Board. No one appeared. It was then moved by Supervisor Miller, seconded by Supervisor Bronson and unanimously carried by a 5-0 vote, to close the public hearing and approve P18RZ00002, subject to standard and special conditions.

COUNTY ADMINISTRATOR

30. Senate Bill (SB) 1529 Tucson Unified School District Desegregation Tax Levy Transfer to the Secondary Property Tax Levy

Staff recommends:

A. The Board of Supervisors take the first option and direct staff to calculate the one-percent-limit credit, and resulting additional state aid, in compliance with the Constitution and §15-972, by including the ostensibly "secondary" property tax with the other taxes that are subject to the limit.

- B. The Board take this action at the Board of Supervisors meeting of June 12, 2018. The Tucson Unified School District (TUSD) Board may then choose to file a declaratory judgement against the County and the State asking the Court to either order Pima County to levy what we believe is an unconstitutional secondary property tax, or order the Department of Revenue to pay the additional-state-aid as they have for almost 40 years.
- C. The Board instruct staff to notify the TUSD Board and Superintendent that the County intends to include the Desegregation Tax in the one-percent calculation, rather than increase TUSD homeowners' secondary tax liability, and invite TUSD to request the Superior Court to determine whether SB 1529 effectively changed that methodology, and if so, whether that change is constitutional and direct the County and State accordingly.

It was moved by Supervisor Bronson and seconded by Supervisor Miller to approve recommendations A, B, and C as outlined above. No vote was taken at this time.

Supervisor Valadez noted that the Board's attempt to seek an opinion from the Attorney General on this matter had been unsuccessful and had resulted in today's action by the Board.

Supervisor Bronson commented that without an opinion from the Attorney General, the Board's choices were limited.

Chairman Elías verified for the record that all members of the Board understood the motion before them.

Upon the vote, the motion unanimously carried 5-0.

Supervisor Miller made a substitute motion to continue the item to the Board of Supervisors' Meeting of June 19, 2018. Supervisor Christy seconded the motion. No vote was taken at this time.

Mary Jo Furphy, Procurement Director, explained that these were long term contracts that had been transferred to a new system and the business process for taxes changed. She indicated that when the system was implemented it did not decrement master agreements by business sales tax. She added that when the system started decrementing master agreements by sales tax, it was discovered that there was not enough money to cover the taxes that needed to be paid. She stated that the not-to-exceed amount was \$1.8 million and \$2.4 million had been expended using the prior financial system, and when combined they totaled \$4.22 million stated in the contract.

Supervisor Miller inquired about the status of the current module and asked how appraisals were currently be processed.

Cathy Bohland, Director, Human Resources Department, responded that previously appraisals had been done on paper. She stated that this was for a pilot program, utilizing a new module, that allowed supervisors to perform appraisals online. She explained that the pilot program would start with one or two departments and if it was successful, it would be expanded to other County departments.

Tom Burke, Deputy County Administrator, explained that this was a module available through NeoGov. He indicated that currently NeoGov was being used for the job application and hiring process.

Supervisor Miller asked if data was extracted from the applicant tracking system.

Mr. Burke responded that the application tracking system was already in place; this was an amendment to add a new module for employee evaluations.

Supervisor Miller asked why CGI Technology wasn't being used for this purpose.

Chuck Huckelberry, County Administrator, stated that approximately 7,000 to 8,000 employee performance appraisals were completed each year. He indicated that it was difficult to get supervisors to complete the reviews as they were labor intensive and without performance reviews, a supervisor could not discipline an employee. He explained that this method would streamline the appraisal process and provide performance feedback to employees. He then stated that if the pilot program was successful, it would be rolled out to all County departments at no additional cost.
