1. REQUEST FOR AERIAL EASEMENT

Staff recommends approval of an aerial easement to Tucson Electric Power Company, for property located over a portion of the West Branch Santa Cruz Drainage Way, lying within Section 3, T15S, R13E, G&SRM, Pima County, Arizona, \$100.00 revenue and \$1,200.00 reimbursement for appraisal fee. (District 5)

It was moved by Supervisor Bronson, seconded by Chairman Elías and unanimously carried by a 5-0 vote, to approve the item.

2. **CONTRACT**

Supervisor Miller asked where the \$6 million had been spent and what was planned for the additional funding.

Chuck Huckelberry, County Administrator, responded that the initial \$4 million was for the purchase of the property. He stated that these funds would be used for erosion control and bank stabilization. He added that a minor portion of the funds would be utilized for two bridges that were part of the Loop System.

Upon the vote, the motion unanimously carried 5-0.

Town of Marana, Pima County Regional Flood Control District and Pima County, to provide for the shared use and development of existing and future trail and trailhead improvements on County and Flood Control District properties, no cost/20 year term (CTN-PW-19-46)

- Cooperation between departments and quantitative goals to measure progress were encouraged.
- Requested that public input be included during the plan's annual review.

Chris King spoke in opposition to Proposition 463, increased taxes and excessive spending.

Arlene Benavidez, Executive Director, Metropolitan Education Commission (MEC), presented the Board with MEC's education funding Resolution.

Brenda Wexler thanked the Board for reducing the community's fear by voting to decline Stonegarden funding.

- The community hoped that Golden Pin Lanes would continue to operate as a bowling alley.
- The bowling alley generated revenue for the neighborhood and the City of Tucson.

- The City of Tucson had touted the importance of Miracle Mile's historic buildings and signs, but was silent on the importance of Golden Pin Lanes.
- The bowling center was profitable and paid thousands of dollars in tax revenues.
- Constructing a new building on the vacant portions of the Golden Pin Lanes lot was more cost effective than renovating the historic structure.
- The bowling center was a safe haven for community members.
- If mechanical or structural failures occurred, the public's health and community services would be suspended.

Carol Kovalik thanked the Board for recently completed road projects.

9. CONVENE TO EXECUTIVE SESSION

It was moved by Supervisor Bronson, seconded by Chairman Elías and unanimously carried by a 5-0 vote, to convene to Executive Session at 10:30 a.m.

10. **RECONVENE**

The meeting reconvened at 10:46 a.m. All members were present.

EXECUTIVE SESSION

11. Pursuant to A.R.S. §38-431.03(A) (3) and (4), for legal advice and direction regarding a proposed settlement in Pima County v. Harbour et al., Pima County Superior Court Case No. C20180802.

Regina Nassen, Civil Deputy County Attorney, stated that the County Attorney's Office and Real Property Services recommended the Board authorize the settlement as discussed in Executive Session.

It was moved by Supervisor Bronson, seconded by Supervisor Miller and unanimously carried by a 5-0 vote, to approve the recommendation.

12. Pursuant to A.R.S. §38-431.03(A) (3) and (4), for legal advice and direction regarding a potential response on behalf of Pima County to the letter from the Arizona Attorney General's Office dated September 20, 2018, regarding an Open Meeting Law complaint.

Regina Nassen, Civil Deputy County Attorney, stated that the County Attorney's Office recommended proceeding as discussed in Executive Session.

It was moved by Supervisor Bronson, seconded by Chairman Elías and carried by a 4-1 vote, Supervisor Miller voted "Nay," to proceed as discussed in Executive Session.

COUNTY ADMINISTRATOR

13. **2018 Sustainable Action Plan for County Operations**

RESOLUTION NO. 2018 - <u>66</u>, of the Board of Supervisors, adopting the Sustainable Action Plan for Pima County Operations 2018-2025.

It was moved by Chairman Elías and seconded by Supervisor Bronson to adopt the Resolution. No vote was taken at this time.

Chairman Elías amended his motion to include the formation of a citizens committee. He indicated that the Committee would be responsible for reviewing the Sustainable Action Plan after its first year of implementation.

Supervisor Bronson accepted the amended motion, and recommended that experts be appointed to the Committee.

Chuck Huckelberry, County Administrator, recommended that the Plan also be reviewed by existing County boards, commissions or committees, that associated with aspects of the Plan.

Chairman Elías requested that the County Administrator provide the Board with a list of relevant boards, commissions or committees and that the Board be notified when it was appropriate to make appointments to the new citizen's committee.

Supervisor Miller expressed concerns with the costs that would be incurred by the County and taxpayers in order to comply with the Plan. She pointed out that monetary savings were referred to in the Plan, but no documentation was provided to support that claim. Supervisor Miller asked how the onerous regulations could affect the local economy.

Supervisor Christy stated he would not support the Resolution because of its political agenda and because it allowed the Paris Climate Agreement to dictate climate issues in Pima County.

Mr. Huckelberry referenced his October 12, 2018 memorandum which detailed the benefits and savings that were measurable in terms of economics.

Upon roll call vote, the motion carried 3-2, Supervisors Christy and Miller voted "Nay."

CLERK OF THE BOARD

14. Avra Valley Irrigation and Drainage District Annual Election Cancellation

Discussion/action regarding a request, pursuant to A.R.S. §16-410(A), to cancel the annual election of the Board of Directors of the Avra Valley Irrigation and Drainage District and appoint Craig Bratton as Director of Division III of the Avra Valley Irrigation and Drainage District.

It was moved by Chairman Elías, seconded by Supervisor Bronson and unanimously carried by a 5-0 vote, to approve the item.

15. Petition for Relief of Taxes

Pursuant to A.R.S. §42-11109, Arizona District Council of the Assemblies of God - Oasis Assembly of God has petitioned the Board of Supervisors for relief of taxes and associated interest/penalty for tax years 2014, 2015, 2016 and 2017, for Tax Parcel No. 138-28-042F.

It was moved by Supervisor Bronson, seconded by Supervisor Miller and unanimously carried by a 5-0 vote, to approve the item.

16. **Petition for Relief of Taxes**

Pursuant to A.R.S. §42-11109, Iglesia Centro De Sanidad has petitioned the Board of Supervisors for relief of taxes and associated interest/penalty for tax years 2014, 2015, 2016 and 2017, for Tax Parcel No. 303-10-332A.

It was moved by Supervisor Bronson and seconded by Chairman Elías to approve this item. No vote was taken at this time.

Supervisor Miller stated she would not approve this petition based on the information received from the Assessor's Office, that the petition would have been denied for 2014 due to ownership.

Upon the vote, the motion carried 4-1, Supervisor Miller voted "Nay."

17. Petition for Relief of Taxes

Pursuant to A.R.S. §42-11109, Ministerio Cristiano Nueva Esperanza has petitioned the Board of Supervisors for relief of taxes and associated interest/penalty for tax years 2015, 2016 and 2017, for Tax Parcel No. 303-47-1850.

It was moved by Supervisor Bronson, seconded by Supervisor Miller and unanimously carried by a 5-0 vote, to approve the item.

18. Petitions for Redemption of Property Tax Exemption Waiver

Staff recommends approval of the petitions for redemption of property tax exemption waivers.

It was moved by Supervisor Bronson and seconded by Supervisor Miller to approve this item. The Chairman noted that taxes due for the first half of 2018 were not eligible for refund or abatement. Upon the vote, the motion unanimously carried 5-0.

COMMUNITY SERVICES, EMPLOYMENT AND TRAINING

19. The Board of Supervisors on October 2, 2018, continued the following:

It was moved by Supervisor Bronson and seconded by Chairman Elías to approve this item. No vote was taken at this time.

Supervisor Miller indicated that this item was continued to allow staff the opportunity to provide additional information. She stated that the information provided was not responsive to her inquiry regarding the vendor's failure to meet the defined outcomes of the contract.

Jan Lesher, Chief Deputy County Administrator, responded that a memorandum from the County Administrator was provided which included background information and reports for the current and previous fiscal years. She noted that the amendment was not a contract renewal, but change in the vendor's name only.

Supervisor Miller stated that due to the outstanding corrective actions needed, she would not approve this contract amendment.

Supervisor Bronson noted that there were no costs associated with this amendment.

Upon roll call vote, the motion carried 4-1, Supervisor Miller voted "Nay."

It was moved by Supervisor Bronson, seconded by Supervisor Miller and unanimously carried by a 5-0 vote, to approve the item.

GRANT APPLICATION/ACCEPTANCE

22. The Board of Supervisors on October 2, 2018, continued the following:

State of Arizona, Department of Public Safety, to provide for the Gang Intelligence Immigration Team Enforcement Mission Program, \$350,000.00/\$116,666.67 General Fund Match (GTAW 19-20)

It was moved by Supervisor Christy and seconded by Supervisor Miller to approve this item. No vote was taken at this time.

Supervisor Bronson questioned what the County's General Fund match dollars were used for.

Edward Spinney, Lieutenant, Narcotics Special Investigations Unit, Pima County Sheriff's Department, responded that 75% of the grant provided for salaries, employee related expenses and overtime and the remaining 25% was the General Fund match.

Upon the vote, the motion unanimously carried 5-0.

It was moved by Chairman Elías, seconded by Supervisor Miller and unanimously carried by a 5-0 vote, to close the public hearing, approve the license and forward the recommendation to the Arizona Department of Liquor Licenses and Control.

The Chairman inquired whether anyone wished to address the Board. No one appeared. It was moved by Chairman Elías, seconded by Supervisor Miller and unanimously carried by a 5-0 vote, to close the public hearing, approve the license and forward the recommendation to the Arizona Department of Liquor Licenses and Control.

DEVELOPMENT SERVICES

28. Hearing - Comprehensive Plan Amendment

P18CA00002, LUMINEX, L.L.C. - E. OLD VAIL ROAD PLAN AMENDMENT

Request of <u>Luminex</u>, <u>L.L.C.</u>, represented by the <u>Planning Center</u>, to amend the Pima County Comprehensive Plan from Medium Intensity Rural (MIR) to Medium Low Intensity Urban (MLIU) land use designation for approximately 24.16 acres located northeast of E. Old Vail Road and west of the S. Freeman Road alignment, in Section 6, T16S, R16E, in the Central Planning Area. On motion, the Planning and Zoning Commission voted 8-0 (Commissioners Gungle and Hook were absent) to recommend APPROVAL SUBJECT TO REZONING POLICIES. Staff recommends APPROVAL SUBJECT TO REZONING POLICIES. (District 4)

Rezoning Policies:

- Flood Control Resource Areas including Pima County Regulated Riparian Habitat and developer- mapped floodplain shall be avoided.
- Residential density on the amendment site shall be 4.5 residences per acre (RAC), maximum, with a reduction of residential density along the DMAFB Approach-Departure Corrider-3 (ADC-3); a 20-foot buffer shall be provided between ADC-3 and residential lots; and, Avigation Easements shall be recorded and disclosed to homebuyers for all residences constructed in the proposed subdivision.

John Muha addressed the Board regarding the hydro study for the property not being completed, flooding worsening, and an unrestricted wildcat road that had been cleared by the Regional Wastewater Reclamation Department. Linda Morales, The Planning Center, stated that a hydrologist was commissioned and would be preparing a hydro study. She indicated that the wildcat road was a result of the installation of sewer lines that would serve the entire area and not only the proposed subdivision. She added that these concerns would be discussed and resolved during the site planning and rezoning processes.

Carmine DeBonis, Deputy County Administrator, explained that when wastewater lines are installed, maintaining access was necessary in order to allow for line repair and maintenance. He indicated that there were options available to control access and those issues, along with flooding concerns, could be resolved during the site planning and rezoning processes.

Chuck Huckelberry, County Administrator, indicated that the concerns involving the easement would be addressed and access would be restricted. He directed Mr. DeBonis to work with Mr. Muha on these matters.

It was moved by Supervisor Christy and seconded by Supervisor Miller to close the public hearing and approve P18CA00002, subject to rezoning policies. Upon roll call vote, the motion unanimously carried 5-0.

29. Hearing - Comprehensive Plan Amendment

P18CA00003, HARBOUR TRUST, ET AL. - N. LA CHOLLA BOULEVARD PLAN AMENDMENT

Request of Harbour Trust, Robert G. and Michelle K. Harbour Trust, Buck Family Revocable Trust and Linn Harbour, represented by Projects International, Inc., to amend the Pima County Comprehensive Plan from Low Intensity Urban 0.3 (LIU 0.3) to Medium Intensity Urban (MIU) land use designation for approximately 22.5 acres located at the northwest corner of the intersection of N. La Cholla Boulevard and W. Overton Road, in Section 21, T12S, R13E, in the Tortolita Planning Area. On motion, the Planning and Zoning Commission voted 8-0 (Commissioners Gungle and Hook were absent) to recommend APPROVAL SUBJECT TO REZONING POLICIES. Staff recommends APPROVAL SUBJECT TO REZONING POLICIES. (District 1)

Rezoning Policies:

- Post development Flood Control Resource Areas to be avoided, including developer mapped floodplains, shall be identified at the time of Rezoning.
- Developer mapped floodplains shall include habitat enhancements.

Jim Portner, Projects International, Inc., explained that the original Comprehensive Plan Amendment request from Low Intensity Urban 0.3 (LIU 0.3) to Medium Intensity Urban (MIU) land use was modified and amended from Low Intensity Urban 0.3 (LIU 0.3) to Medium Low Intensity Urban (MLIU) land use designation due to neighbor concerns. He indicated there were two separate comprehensive plan applications on the agenda that were interrelated but had different property owners. He stated that the two applications would be processed for rezoning as one comprehensive application for a single-family residential subdivision. He added that

this was in line with Pima County's Prosper policies that concentrated on density in established transportation corridors. He explained that he had originally recommended Medium Intensity Urban (MIU) in order to match the surrounding district. He added that after conversations with staff, the commission and public testimony, the designation was amended to Medium Low Intensity Urban (MLIU) designation.

William Wilkening addressed the Board regarding the original MIU designation and reiterated that the MLIU amendment addressed neighborhood concerns. He expressed concern with the property being located in a Federal Emergency Management Agency designated flood zone and that the flooding that originates from the hills north of the property could affect the neighborhood. He stated that the neighbors were also concerned with sand and silt brought down from the flooding, clogging and overwhelming the drainage system installed on the property causing water to flow into the new development and surrounding properties.

Mr. Portner responded that the proposed construction, along with a planned roadway project, addressed flooding concerns. He added that culverts and capture structures would be installed and would eliminate the flood zone designation.

Chris Poirier, Deputy Director, Development Services, stated that the Flood Control District had indicated that the flood control areas would be avoided and would remain in a natural state.

John Lakey informed the Board that neighbors bordering the development were in opposition of the amendment.

Mr. Portner assured the Board that he was committed to working with the neighbors and their concerns in a civil and respectful manner.

Chairman Elías asked Mr. Portner to diligently address the neighbors' concerns and keep them apprised of accommodations if the amendment passed and proceeded to the next stage.

Supervisor Miller questioned whether the plan was for a residential area or if any commercial areas were intended.

Mr. Portner confirmed that the plan was for single family detached residential only.

It was moved by Supervisor Miller and seconded by Supervisor Christy to close the public hearing and approve P18CA00003, to amend the Pima County Comprehensive Plan from Low Intensity Urban (LIU) to Medium Low Intensity Urban (MLIU), subject to rezoning policies. Upon roll call vote, the motion unanimously carried 5-0.

30. Hearing - Comprehensive Plan Amendment

P18CA00004, QUEST LAND GROUP, L.L.C., ET AL., NORTHWEST BIBLE CHURCH - N. LA CHOLLA BOULEVARD PLAN AMENDMENT

Jim Portner, Projects International, Inc., explained that P18CA00004 and the previous item, P18CA00003, were related and planned as an integrated subdivision. He indicated that two thirds of the property would remain untouched as a contribution to the Conservation Lands System.

It was moved by Supervisor Miller, seconded by Supervisor Bronson and unanimously carried by a 5-0 vote, to close the public hearing and approve P18CA00004, subject to rezoning policies.

The Chairman inquired whether anyone wished to address the Board. No one appeared. It was moved by Supervisor Bronson, seconded by Supervisor Miller and unanimously carried by a 5-0 vote, to close the public hearing and adopt the Ordinance.

On motion, the Planning and Zoning Commission voted 6-0 (Commissioners Bain, Gungle, Hook and Matter were absent) to recommend APPROVAL. Staff recommends APPROVAL. (All Districts)

If approved, pass and adopt: ORDINANCE NO. 2018 - 30

Daniel Ice, Chief Building Official, Development Services, explained that the Joint Pima County/City of Tucson Building Code Committee/Board of Appeals held public meetings to gain building code uniformity across jurisdictions, regionally and nationally. He stated that the Building Code Committee and the Planning and Zoning Commission unanimously recommended the amended package that met the required building safety and efficiency standards.

Supervisor Bronson questioned how the proposed amendment package compared to the City's proposal.

Mr. Ice responded that the two codes differed in administrative processes.

Chairman Elías inquired about International Building and Construction Code Updates, Appendix T, Solar-Ready Provisions – Detached One- and Two-Family Dwellings and Townhouses.

Mr. Ice stated that based on the recommendations of the Building Code Committee and the Planning and Zoning Commission, Appendix T was not included in the County's proposed amendment package, but was adopted by the City of Tucson.

Shawn Cote, Southern Arizona Home Builders Association, addressed the Board and stated that this was the first code cycle that did not significantly increase costs. He also stated that Appendix T might not have been the solar facilitator it was thought it to be.

Chairman Elías asked Mr. Cote if he would work with Pima County, as he did with the City of Tucson, to amend Appendix T so there were no cost increases.

Mr. Cote agreed to work with the County.

Bruce Plenk read a statement from Robert Bulechek, member of the Tucson Commission on Climate, Energy and Sustainability, supporting adoption of the International Building and Construction Code Updates and Appendix T.

Bruce Plenk stated that adopting the codes and Appendix T were important and it encouraged the community to increase conservation and solar energy usage. He urged the Board to go further by requiring that new homes be equipped with energy and water savings measures.

It was moved by Chairman Elías and seconded by Supervisor Bronson to close the public hearing, adopt the Ordinance and direct staff to conduct the processes necessary to bring Appendix T of the 2018 International Conservation Code before the Board for consideration. Upon roll call vote, the motion unanimously carried 5-0.
