Writers In Residence at Libraries Mini-Grant 2019

### \*Purpose:

The Writers in Residence Mini-Grant program will provide funding for two (2) Writer's residenceis, each for a three-month period, one to begin in February and the other in May. Writers are asked to spend sixteen (16) hours a week working at a library with assigned time with library customers through individual consultations and targeted programs. In 2019 Pima County Public Library will host the Writers In Residence at Libraries project for the fourth year.

#### \*Procurement Method:

Not applicable to grant awards.

### \*Program Goals/Predicted Outcomes:

The goal of the project is to offer writing consultations and public programming that will support writing productivity, and will inspire connections and mentoring around the writing process.

### \*Public Benefit:

Community members will benefit as writers-in-residence create spaces for writers and authors to connect as collaborators, creators, and mentors. In 2019, along with the support of library resources and technologies, writers-in-residence will offer writing education and access to learning -- workshops, informal groups, and individualized assistance.

#### \*Metrics Available to Measure Performance:

Outcomes and impact will be measured through customer surveys and programs and during consultation times. Writer focus groups will center on program improvement

#### \*Retroactive:

The Pima County Public Library received the notice of award on 12/4/2018, with the same grant effective date -- 12/7/2018. Both of Pima County Public Library's writer(s)-in-residence were selected because of their varied and impressive experience, their ability to support a wide range of writing interests, and because they are embedded in the Southern Arizona writing community.

Alice Hatcher https://alice-hatcher.com/ is a freelance grant writer and novelist who has lived in Tucson for more than a decade. Before moving to Tucson, she worked for several years as a professor at the State University of New York – Stony Brook, teaching history. In Tucson, she has volunteered for a number of non-profits and worked as a grant writer and research coordinator at the University of Arizona. She has also done freelance grant writing and editing for the Community Food Bank and Kore Press. Alice Hatcher has turned her attention from footnotes to fiction, and has since published short stories, creative nonfiction and poetry. Lately, Alice completed the "3,475th draft" of her first novel The Wonder That Was Ours, which was the winner of the 2017 Dzanc Books Prize for Fiction. Hatcher is especially grateful for the writers groups and critique circles that make Tucson "the dusty SOHO of the Southwest." In addition to launching her first novel, she has presented workshops with the Arizona Mystery Writers, including, "Keeping it Fresh, Keeping Real: the Long Haul of Revisions," and topics related to plot development, working with a critique group, and preparing manuscripts for publishing. She has taught courses on Advanced Story Writing and Introduction to Fiction at Pima Community College.

J.M. Hayes http://www.jmhayes-author.com/ (Mike) became a prolific reader at the age of seven when he moved away from the small town of Hutchinson, Kansas to the family farm ten miles away. "Books and authors became Mike's best friends." Hayes hopes his Arizona WWII historical novel, The Grey Pilgrim, and his fictional Mad Dog & Englishman series have done the same for other readers. The Spirit and the Skull, which got a starred review in Booklist, combines his studies and extensive background in archaeology, anthropology and a field season spent in Alaska into a Paleolithic detective story that deals with themes of primitive religion, society and women's rights. Hayes has written numerous articles for journals and newspapers, and he has blogged, written, and reported on events and experiences from true crime, to breaking into the world of publishing, to Parks and Recreation. Hayes started Southwest

Crime Ink, a writers circle to focus on the "hard way," of publishing. There, he works with other writers through serious revisions and the promotional dance it takes to "sell enough copies of the books to keep publishers happy" and, with luck, avoid living in dumpsters during the golden years."

### Target Audience for Programming

Summer 2018 writer-in residence Logan Phillips, remarked on "the diversity of creativity" he found working with the community at Pima County Public Library (PCPL). Writers from different backgrounds and situations have sought support during the program. Writer(s)-in-residence (WIRLs) interact with a wide range of people here. Those people bring handwritten or typewritten words as well as ideas they have not yet written down. Experienced writers who have published successfully in the 1960s and 70s have sought guidance from WIRLs as they navigate the current world of publishing. Some writers who signed up for consultations have never touched a mouse or a keyboard, or they do not have access to the technology that is required to publish today. Other writers approached the WIRLs with finished novels wanting to know the secret to selling them. Our WIRLs have been happy to consult and help gain clarity on the process. "I hope that folks would leave a session with me motivated to continue to explore their own voice, whatever that may be," said Phillips.

Describe the programming the Writers in Residence will provide.

In addition to helping people find their voice, Philips said he focused on demystifying the work of the writer during his residency. PCPL's first WIRL Janni Lee Simner hoped she offered encouragement, answered questions, and connected writers with the resources they needed, "resources that include our own library system." As PCPL hosts this program for the fourth year, the goal is to create a space for writers to connect as collaborators, creators, and mentors. In 2019, along with the support of library resources and technologies, WIRLs will offer writing education and access to learning -- workshops, informal groups, and individualized assistance.

Spring WIRL 2019 Alice Hatcher will focus on making PCPL a part of her "dusty SOHO of the Southwest" with a series of educational opportunities related to editing and revisions, manuscript submission and promotion. Later in the spring, she will follow up with a write-in and supporting a PCPL critique circle. She will offer research and writing support, small group and individualized assistance, in the Idea + Space and at the new PCPL space at the Southern Arizona Community Foundation's campus for nonprofits. For summer 2019, J.M Hayes will present topics covering fiction and nonfiction for writers of the middle school age and above including: The Art of Writing - Exercises to expand participants' artistic writing talents; To Die Laughing - How to effectively combine humor with suspense; and Walking Mean Streets - Elements of the mystery novel (historic, modern, and future) for fiction and non-fiction.

Hayes and Hatcher will appear at the Tucson Festival of Books in PCPL sponsored spaces and events to promote the Writers In Residence at the Library (WIRL) project.

Explain why this programming was selected for your community.

Pima County Public Library's purpose is to bring about positive community benefit through the 2019 Writers in Residence at the Library (WIRL) project. All of our WIRLs have told us they are able to reach out to would-be writers in the library because the program is free and accessible. Both WIRLs bring with

them real-world experiences and the ability to mentor and connect the interests of writers in our community. They represent different talents and experiences in teaching, research, editing, grant writing, journalism, manuscript submittal and getting published.

Describe your community and any writing programs that currently run in your library, either operated by you or an outside party (e.g. Meetup group).

Current writing and authorship efforts at PCPL reach all ages and demographics of writers. Pima County Public Library's current events calendar lists almost 205 events related to creative expression and writing, including author and editor meet-ups, poetry circles and exhibits, and motivational and creative writing workshops.

Pima County Public Library serves every type of community from smaller towns to dense urban neighborhoods. Our libraries are busy from open to close and when school lets out many branches operate at standing room only. In any neighborhood, our libraries can be the place outside the home where a writer, can come frequently research and learn something new, to meet informal groups, to find recreation and companionship and to escape the other elements of life. As Phillips says, "I think my experience is similar to that of many writers—time and space are two of the most precious resources needed to produce work. In my case, I'm a parent to twin three year-olds, so quiet time in my home office is well, not so quiet!" In 2019, WIRLs will continue to support a purposeful, open, and transparent writing culture in library study rooms or in creative spaces including the Idea + Space, the 101 Space(s), or the Grow & Play Space. WIRLs will have access to parking as all branch library lots are open, and when they are working at the Main Library, they will receive a parking validation or pass. The WIRL will have designated space and access to staff areas so that their belongings and equipment are secure when not in use. In addition, WIRLs will receive travel or overnight accommodation support if they elect to provide services at the four branches outside the Tucson metropolitan area.
