Re: Information Regarding Food and Pharmacy Supplies to the Vulnerable Older Population

At the last Emergency Meeting of the Board there was considerable discussion with regard to the issue of protecting the senior vulnerable population from COVID-19. I asked two staff to follow up with further research and questions and to provide more information on these issues.

I am enclosing a report from Diana Durazo, Special Projects Manager dated April 1, 2020 (Attachment A) on the subject of the various services that deliver meals and or groceries. I also asked her to work with our GIS staff to identify the geographical locations of our population by age and census track. This was done to identify all of the various homeowners associations with populations who are seventy or above. Our information is attached and is self-explanatory, we will continue to work with all parties to try and develop a more systematic and streamlined delivery of food and other essential supplies to the vulnerable population primarily though organized homeowners association. Our first organized groups of homeowners will be those coordinated through the Green Valley Council. We are providing the same GIS information to each City and Town also they may be able to work with their associations.

I also asked Patrick Cavanaugh, Deputy Director for Economic Development to inquire with the large retail outlets to determine what they might be able to do to lessen the early queuing of older individuals gaining access to their facilities (Attachment B). As you can tell from Mr. Cavanaugh's response we have had little assistance in contacting retailers to answer our questions.

Re: Information Request on Delivery of Food and Essentials to Vulnerable Older Population

At the March 26, 2020 Special Meeting, the Board expressed concerns over the inadvertent health exposure of our elderly and vulnerable residents in retailers' efforts to set aside certain times for their shopping, creating long lines with little to no crowding management. The question was asked whether the County can do something to assist in or expand grocery and essentials delivery systems.

The County provided a link on the website explaining existing delivery services in Tucson and fee structures. Below is a table briefly summarizing these services. Retailers who use one of the listed delivery providers below, such as Fry's partnering with SHIPT, were not listed separately.

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Fee structures are within range of each other, with free delivery conditions and memberships being almost equal. The variation comes in the markups some of these services impose on products ordered online, as opposed to in-store purchases. Safeway is currently exploring ways to reduce delivery costs in order to be able to offer competitive product pricing for online orders.

Delivery services for medication are problematic in that the above delivery providers do not deliver prescription medication. CVS and Walgreens do offer same or next day delivery services with their respective apps that offer prescription refills online and free delivery for eligible prescription medication.

The problem today is that many of these services are at capacity in trying to meet supply and delivery demands. The recent stay at home orders and the recent reports of Instacart, Amazon and Whole Foods employees contemplating strikes and walk outs due to fears of exposure, companies not doing more to protect employees and pay, will only exacerbate an already stressed system.

The delivery services described above are door-to-door services. The County reached out to a couple wholefood distributors to see what impacts they have experienced. Merit Foods in Tucson is a wholefood distributor that serves and delivers to local restaurants. Given the orders from the Mayor and the Governor, businesses such as Merit Foods are struggling with large inventory and declining business. In response to that, Merit Foods has begun selling to large families, residential HOAs, assisted living centers and groups that can order in bulk with one payment at wholesale pricing. The delivery costs are built into the bulk orders. Merit Foods does not do door-to-door delivery but will deliver bulk orders to particular locations. For example, they deliver to HOA front offices, assisted living center parking lots or other similar central locations, where the group can receive the bulk delivery and then redistribute into smaller food and essentials boxes. Merit can sometimes help with providing boxes as well and work with groups on where to deliver. While I was not able to speak directly with Sysco Foods representatives, it has been reported that they are working with food banks in the Phoenix area and also making deliveries in Tucson every day. This is a viable option where groups are well-organized and have staff or volunteers that can then redistribute food and essentials to their clients or residents following all COVID-19 guidelines.

Locating Vulnerable Populations

Our GIS staff developed a map showing population by age based on Census tracts. Map A (Attachment 1) shows the distribution of population aged 70 and above in unincorporated Pima County. Map B (Attachment 2) shows population over 70 with the known Homeowner's Associations (HOA) overlay. Included is the list of HOAs labeled 1 through 150 for reference on the map. The overall range of residents over 70 in these HOAs is 2 to 1,328 for the 150 HOAs listed (Attachment 3). There are 35 HOAs with over 100 residents age 70 and above, of which four have over 400. The difficulty lies in identifying populations that lie outside of an organized HOA or group.

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Ongoing Efforts

I spoke with Arnold Palacios and Daniel Tylutki on how Community Services, Employment and Training (CSET) might be able to assist in this effort. There is an extensive network of partner agencies that we can reach out to that provide similar delivery services to older residents. Their focus is to assist low-income and at-risk populations, but there is overlap where ideas and alternatives can be explored without duplication of efforts.

I also reached out to Mark Clark, with Pima Council on Aging (PCOA), to see what their response has been to COVID-19 and what issues are coming up. His concern, as well as ours, is about finding supplies to meet the growing demand. This includes personal hygiene and cleaning supplies. PCOA and partners have closed nutrition sites, as they too were a place where large numbers of seniors were gathering to eat; these have been turned into direct deliveries in order to continue providing meals. The various interfaith community services groups and Mobile Meals, among others, are continuing to provide food and essentials and working to acquire supplies where possible. Through Regional Transportation Authority (RTA) monies, volunteers are able to be reimbursed for mileage in cases. Mark said PCOA can work with the County on this effort if needed. It is my understanding that PCOA and other agencies and organizations were scheduling a call to discuss the large federal infusion of funds to see where these can be used best, including for this issue. CSET would also be involved.

Just as additional information, a recent article reported that the United Kingdom (UK) government's response to COVID-19 and the growing concern of services reaching their most vulnerable populations, involved giving supermarkets access to a database to help reprioritize food deliveries for the elderly and vulnerable customers. With delivery services overwhelmed, the UK is looking to ensure that food is reaching their most vulnerable. Supermarkets are now looking to partner with their local taxi companies and delivery services. They are also looking at using couriers. Supermarkets are going to cross-reference names on the database with their current online customers to prioritize delivery times. The government is also looking to partner food distributors with their local charities and volunteer base. The government has also ordered supermarkets to manage their customer lines and crowds.

Accessibility to food and essentials under current orders and limitations of vulnerable populations and identification and location of these residents is an incredibly difficult issue. Given the information and reports, some steps that might be taken or requested now can be for retailers to explore the option of prioritizing deliveries to elderly residents. Instead of setting aside times for elderly cueing in line, they can set aside times for deliveries to them. We can connect suppliers, such as food distributers, with demand via our website and other visible mediums to reach residents located outside of HOAs or groups that are difficult to identify and locate. Perhaps a group can be created through CSET (unless there is one already) to work with partner agencies that can assist in this effort and determine how and if federal and state funds can be used to address outreach and delivery to the most vulnerable residents without creating duplicate efforts. This can also include expanding or assisting the Food Bank's and

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
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Salvation Army's current food distribution network. These are just suggestions and would need to be run through CSET as they work with and understand ongoing discussions and efforts from our local organizations and agencies.






Total Population = ~62,230

Subject: Grocery Retailers Survey

In response to Board of Supervisor discussion of COVID 19 policies and issues at grocery stores that occurred at the Board's March 26, 2020 meeting, I have been attempting to contact local, regional and corporate management of grocery stores located in Pima County as an extension of my memo to you of March 23, 2020 ("Service, Capacity and Distribution Issues for Big Box Retailers in Pima County arising from the COVID 19 Pandemic"). My intent was to broaden the scope of my previous memo from big box retailers to include grocery chains such as Safeway, Fry's and Bashas' and pose a series of questions I developed from the Board of Supervisor's March 23, 2020 discussion. (Attachment 1)

Unfortunately, I am unable to contact management or management is unwilling to provide the information I am seeking. Calls to local stores are now referred to corporate management and corporate or regional management phone lines are either busy, routed to voicemail or request are made that email be used instead, which could result in a lengthy response time - or no response at all. In light of the COVID 19 pandemic, some of this may be attributable to the sheer volume of calls retailers are receiving, corporate staff telecommuting and a shift in corporate communication policy brought about by the continuing

bad publicity these corporations have received over the intensifying issues faced by consumers.

Additionally, two of the nine questions were related to a Board of Supervisors direction for a report for the April 2, 2020 meeting related to identification of Pima County neighborhoods that contained age groups and vulnerable populations at risk to COVID 19 exposure and an exploration of possible delivery methods of food and other critical staples to these neighborhood residents. Diana Durazo of your office is finalizing her report on this topic but please be aware that it will not contain responses from the grocery retailers to two questions that would have provided considerable insight for the Board of Supervisors.

After consultation with Economic Development Director Dr. John Moffatt, one solution I can envision would be to utilize a team composed of available Pima County employees to visit a measured sampling of each corporate retailer's stores in Pima County and attempt to answer the questions I have developed through a combination of observation and interviews with store employees. This could potentially require a week to complete and would also require Pima County employees to be in the stores during the current "stay at home" order issued by the Governor of Arizona. Alternatively, I could attempt to email the questions as a survey to the companies, but again, this would likely result in a lengthy response time – or no response at all.

Please let me know how you would like me to proceed.

My Name is (NAME) and I'm calling on behalf of the Pima County Office of Emergency Management located in Tucson Arizona. We are contacting all of the food and general merchandise retailors operating in Pima County to gather information on distribution issues and policies in relation to the COVID 19 Pandemic. May I ask you some quick questions? It will only take a minute:

Could have your name and title?

- (1) Are there any special policies in place at your stores in Pima County related to the COVID 19 Pandemic?
- (2) Pima County is concerned about the lack of social distancing occurring in long lines at certain retailers, particularly early morning hours and special hours for older and vulnerable populations.
 - Have your stores in Pima County experienced queuing of long lines?
 - What do you attribute this to and what you do to encourage social distance in the lines?
 - Does it occur at any particular time?
- (3) Overall, what limitations are your stores in Pima County experiencing when it comes to the delivery of essential products?
- (4) Would you attribute any product shortages at retail locations in Pima County to shortfalls at your distribution centers or to the product suppliers?
- (5) Are your stores considering options that would assist older or vulnerable shoppers by offering discounts or reduced prices for delivery services or have you already done so?
- (6) Are there any other special programs intended to assist elderly shoppers or other that are vulnerable to COVID 19 infection?
- (7) Are you receiving any support from the National Guard units that were activated to facilitate logistics from warehouse to retail locations?
