Re: Indirect Expenditures from Anti-Racketeering Revolving Fund

I am submitting herewith, in compliance with Board of Supervisors Policy C 6.3, applications for indirect expenditures from my office's Anti-Racketeering Revolving Fund (ARRF) subaccount. Each application includes a detailed description of the proposed indirect expenditure sufficient to show that the proposed use of monies from the Fund is authorized by Arizona state law and Board Policy. Each application also includes a certification, signed by my Chief Civil Deputy, stating that the proposed indirect expenditure is for a use authorized by law and the Board Policy.

I request that you review these applications and submit them to the Clerk of the Board for placement on the Agenda for the next Board meeting to be held on May 19, 2020.

Please note that, with only one exception, the Board has previously approved ARRF expenditures for these organizations. The purposes of the previously approved expenditures have not changed from prior years. The only program that has not been previously funded is Flowing Wells Grad Night, which is requesting funds for the first time. I am pleased to support that program because it serves the same important law-enforcement objective as other previously approved grad nights, such as Project Graduation and UHS Graduation Night. <sup>1</sup>

Arizona law permits the use of anti-racketeering funds for purposes permitted under federal law, including community-based nonprofits "whose stated missions are supportive of and consistent with a law enforcement effort, policy, and/or initiative." United States Dept. of Justice / Dept. of Treasury, *Guide to Equitable Sharing for State, Local, and Tribal Law Enforcement Agencies*, § V(B)(1)(k) (2018); see also A.R.S. § 13-2314.03(F). Each of the programs for which I am requesting approval qualifies for ARRF funding, as reflected in prior Board approvals.

It has been my policy over the years to use anti-racketeering funds for programs that help reduce drug abuse and crime by providing assistance to victims of crime, drug treatment and substance abuse prevention, job-skills training, or youth programming and education. These efforts contribute to reduced drug abuse and crime, and therefore to reduced juvenile and adult incarceration.

I urge the Board to approve the attached indirect expenditure requests to further this work of service to crime victims, drug treatment, and drug-abuse and crime prevention.

<sup>1</sup>The Covid-19 pandemic obviously gives rise to uncertainty about when a gathering like a grad night will be able to occur. I request that funding be approved by the Board so that it can be available when these events can safely proceed. When I transmit the funds to those requesting organizations who are hosting grad nights, I will explain that, if the funds are not used this year because the event is canceled, they must be used for the same purpose next year, and the organization may not request funds again next year.

Describe the community-based program for which funds are being sought and how the program benefits the community:

UNIVERSITY HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATION NIGHT is a "shut in" celebration for graduating Seniors of University High School (TUSD, Tucson). This celebration has been held annually since 2012, and has been highly successful in maintaining nearly 100% attendance of graduating Seniors, with a 0% accident/injury record. The purpose of the activity/program is to provide graduating Seniors a safe, secure and alcohol/drug-free alternative to traditional, off-campus graduation parties. Unfortunately, graduation night is statistically one of the most hazardous for our high school students. The community benefits substantially from our program, which allows 250+ graduating Seniors to have a fun, well-planned and safe celebration to look forward to after Graduation Ceremonies are done. Dozens of people work all year to plan and present this event, which serves the community as one of the most successful "safe graduation" celebrations in Arizona. Our team invests literally hundreds of hours, representing substantial community service by our parents, students and teachers.

Specifically, what law enforcement effort, policy, and/or initiative of this agency does this program support in this community?

One of the stated goals of Tucson/Pima County law enforcement is protection of the community. Local agencies spend millions of dollars each year addressing DUI, drug and sex offense violations. Unfortunately, our high schools are not immune to these problems, especially on Graduation Night. UHS Graduation Night directly addresses these concerns by providing a safe environment for graduation Seniors to celebrate this special, once-in-a-lifetime event. We are proud of our 0% accident/injury record, which means that 100% of the Senior class at UHS has enjoyed graduation in a safe and fun way!

Describe in detail how this program is supportive of and consistent with this law enforcement agency's efforts, policies, and/or initiatives in the community. What elements of the program specifically enhance or extend the efforts of law enforcement in the community, and how does the program do this?

UHS Graduation Night is a "shut in" celebration, held at the North Gym and surrounding campus areas on the campus of University/Rincon High School. Students are required to pre-register and provide backpacks containing any supplies/clothing they will require for the evening. The backpacks are inspected and secured on site before the students arrive from the Graduation Ceremony by bus at 9:30 p.m. Non-prescription drugs, alcohol, and weapons are not permitted. Students are required to personally sign in for entry. Intoxicated or inebriated students are not permitted to enter the facility. Food and non-alcoholic beverages are provided. Once at the facility, students may experience a huge range of activities (Carnival, Casino Games, LaserTag, Dancing, Cash Cab, Ping-Pong/Billiards/Air Hockey, Chair Massage, Movies etc.). If a student decides to leave the party, he/she may not return afterwards (a necessary precaution against possible importation of contraband). The party ends at 5:00 a.m. Adult supervision is provided for all activities at all times. Tucson Policy Officers are also hired to provide a LE presence during the celebration.

As specifically as possible, please indicate how the funds requested will be used by this program (that is, to purchase supplies, equipment, and/or services; covering costs of participants or attendees; etc. **Direct cash transfers or gifts are not permitted**)

Request funds will be used to pay vendors for entertainment activities (listed above), food and security personnel (TPD officers). Funds may also be used to purchase clerical supplies. Although the program does feature prizes/gifts for students, all such materials are donated by local Tucson businesses and parents. Our high attendance figures result from the meticulous planning efforts and high quality of our presentation. The budget for this event exceeds \$30,000.00 annually, a substantial portion of which comes from donations. Without this donation, and others like it, an event like this would not be possible. Our Seniors look forward to this celebration all year because we make it fun, safe and, most important, an event they don't want to miss!

To qualify, a program must specifically involve law enforcement personnel or otherwise include specific content which extends or enhances the efforts of law enforcement in the community, such as assisting victims of crime, preventing crime including by providing programs for at-risk youth, deterring crime, rehabilitation of offenders, emergency response by law enforcement, protecting people and property from crime, reducing the effects of crime, etc.

Describe the community-based program for which funds are being sought and how the program benefits the community:

The Southern Arizona Children's Advocacy Center is a child-friendly, neutral environment where children of physical/sexual abuse, neglect, and/or trauma and their non-offending parents receive care and services as they undergo the initial investigative process.

The Center employs forensic interviewers who are specially trained to conduct non-leading, neutral interviews of children that encourage the child to describe what happened in their own words.

Victim Advocates meet with non-offending family members, while the child is being interviewed, to assess the child's level of trauma to determine the best short and long-term counselling referrals to begin the healing process. Advocates also work with family members to explain victim's rights and compensation procedures and serve as a bridge between the family and law enforcement, remaining in contact until the family no longer needs them, or the case moves onto the Pima County Attorney's Office.

When a medical exam is needed, the Center employs two on-site pediatric SANE-P (Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner) nurses who specialize in pediatric sexual abuse cases and are able to immediately provide quality assessments and care to children who visit the Center. Our nurses are 2 of only 165 specially credentialed SANE-P nurses in the Unites States. In addition, we contract with Banner Health, and have an on-call pediatrician, Dr. Dale Woolridge, who serves as our medical director. All the medical staff have the ability to photograph, document, and collect evidence of the abuse and/or neglect, including providing initial and follow-up tests for sexually transmitted diseases and pregnancy. These services are available in our child-friendly facility so there is no need for families to travel to another location, deal with long waiting periods often associated with emergency rooms, and have medical services provided by someone who may not specialize in caring for child abuse victims. Having the child stay in one, child-friendly location for medical services, the forensic interview, and advocacy and support minimizes trauma to an already distressing situation, and ensures the child is getting the best care by professionals who are specifically trained to work with children who suffer from abuse and neglect.

In FY 2018/2019, the Center served 1,422 child victims, providing 1092 forensic interviews, 194 forensic medical exams, and 6,652 family advocate contacts.

The Children's Advocacy Center's Community Outreach program provides prevention and education programs for Pima County children through school and community presentations. The Community Outreach program is provided at no cost to school-aged children (3-18) and their non-offending family members. Presentations range in topics, and are specific to the age and/or grade of the students. Each program encourages children to know that it is okay to tell someone if abuse is happening in their home, to ask for help immediately and strives to remove the stigma, shame, and secrecy that often surround children and their families experiencing abuse. As we move forward with our Outreach Program, we will be shifting to a *train the trainer* model whereby we will train teachers to train other teachers to provide child abuse prevention education to students. This model will allow us to reach even more children. In 2018/19, the Community Outreach Program presented to nearly 50 schools and organizations, reaching over 5000 children.

Specifically, what law enforcement effort, policy, and/or initiative of this agency does this program support in this community?

The Children's Advocacy Center is at the heart of the Pima County Protocols for the Multidisciplinary Investigation of Child Abuse. This protocol formalizes an agreement between law enforcement agencies in Pima County, Department of Child Safety, and the Pima County Attorney's office that recognizes the need for child abuse investigations to be conducted jointly and in a child sensitive environment to reduce trauma to the child victim.

Describe in detail how this program is supportive of and consistent with this law enforcement agency's efforts, policies, and/or initiatives in the community. What elements of the program specifically enhance or extend the efforts of law enforcement in the community, and how does the program do this?

The Children's Advocacy Center's work supports law enforcements' efforts to investigate child crimes in a manner that does not cause additional trauma to the child or family. By combining resources and partnering with the Center, law enforcement also reduces its cost to conduct these investigations by reducing the time and staff needed to effectively interview and examine child victims. Without the Center, child abuse interviews would be conducted by detectives and DCS investigators with minimal training and experience and would occur at police or DCS facilities instead of at a child-centered advocacy center. Medical exams and collection of evidence would happen at impersonal emergency rooms by physicians little expertise in identifying, documenting and collecting evidence of physical and sexual abuse. Non-offending family members would be left on their own to find appropriate counselling and other community services.

The Center's forensic interviewers are specially trained to conduct non-leading, neutral interviews of children that encourages the child to describe what happened in their own words. Interviews are recorded and court admissible under some circumstances. While the interview is taking place, law enforcement and case workers from the Department of Child Safety observe in a separate room. If needed, they can discretely direct the interviewer to ask additional questions or request information be clarified. Having these professionals co-located in the Center's building eliminates the need for multiple interviews by different agencies and shuffling the child from one location to another, which can further traumatize the child victim. With the collaboration of these multiple agencies, children and their non-offending family members can take their first steps to healing and self-sufficiency when they leave the Center.

The Children's Advocacy Center has two Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner's on staff and contracts with Banner Health for the services of a pediatric trauma specialist. This assures our community's children receive the best care possible 24/7, and child abuse investigators receive the best evidence possible.

By utilizing the Children's Advocacy Center, law enforcement and DCS can concentrate on their mission, knowing the child is safe and well cared for. Children receive a snack or meal, depending on the time of day, and enjoy age appropriate toys, games, and videos as the investigation unfolds. They receive crisis counselling through our partnership with Las Familias, and children that must go into foster or group home care are given a backpack with several changes of clothing, nightclothes, personal care items, books, and other comfort items to make the transition a little easier.

Through our association with state agencies such as Prevent Child Abuse Arizona, the Arizona Criminal Justice Commission and the Criminal Justice Act, the Center offers free and reduced rate training for Pima County law enforcement and prosecutors. Topics range from basic investigations to adolescent sex offenders to vicious trauma recognition and treatment. Additionally, all partners (law enforcement, DCS, prosecutors, mental health professionals) are invited to participate in monthly multi-disciplinary team meetings where the group conducts case reviews to identify strengths and weaknesses in our process, and to offer solutions to problem areas.

The Children's Advocacy Center is requesting \$10,000 to support our forensic medical services. Funds will be allocated to help cover such costs as salaries for the two SANE-P nurses, and medical director. A portion of the funds will be directed towards the cost of Malpractice Insurance purchased by the Center. We will also utilize awarded funds to purchase medical supplies used in exams, such as gloves, syringes, ear speculums, Foley catheters, band-aides, and speculums.

Describe the community-based program for which funds are being sought and how the program benefits the community:

Homicide Survivors, Inc. (HSI) is the only 501c-3 non-profit organization in Southern Arizona dedicated solely to helping family and friends of homicide victims. HSI provides emotional support services, advocacy and financial assistance to survivors. This assistance helps survivors rebuild their lives in the aftermath of a tragic loss of loved ones due to violence. HSI was founded to provide advocacy to people who need help both during the immediate crisis as well as longer term as survivors work to find a new normal in their lives. HSI provides:

- Crisis and long-term emotional support for survivors;
- Multiple monthly support group meetings;
- Alternative support groups such as trauma-informed yoga and equine therapy;
- Annual remembrance events: Crime Victims' Rights Week Candlelight Vigil, National Day of Remembrance of Murder Victims, All Souls Procession;
- Annual holiday gathering and fundraising events: Thanksgiving Potluck and Angel Tree/Cookies with Santa;
- Personal advocacy for surviving family & friends to include navigating funeral logistics, media, law enforcement and the investigative process;
- Criminal justice system support which includes help and guidance navigating the complexities of the courts and trial, conviction, sentencing and post-conviction processes;
- Civil legal assistance;
- Referrals for long-term, one-on-one counseling services;
- Financial assistance beyond what is covered by the Victim Compensation Program when there is a need.

According to the Arizona Department of Public Safety, there were 331 murders in Arizona in 2018, with one murder occurring every 27 hours and one minute. These murders not only affect the immediate family of the victim, but also friends, coworkers, neighbors and the community at large. Homicide Survivors offers supportive services to a wide range of individuals impacted at no costs to the survivor.

In 2019, HSI has supported families of homicide victims by:

- Advocating on behalf of their victims' rights on over 90 criminal cases, prosecuted at the county and federal level;
- Providing emotional support and direct services to over 2,000 individual survivors through traditional support groups and hosting annual memorial events such as the National Day of Remembrance for Murder Victims and National Crime Victims Rights Week Candlelight Vigil;

- Offering alternative therapies, such as Trauma informed Yoga and Equine Therapy to promote healing;
- And providing over \$17,000 in direct emergency financial assistance for expenses such as rent and utilities, travel related expenses and lodging for families to attend court, as well as cemetery plot donations.

Homicide Survivors, Inc. is currently in a period of growth, adding three new full-time staff advocates and an in-house attorney to serve as a Survivors' Counsel to assist on civil legal matters. The Executive Director has been in his position for over two years and has focused expansion in areas that are truly not offered in any other capacity in our community. Specifically, HSI is seeking funding to sustain and expand new support group programs, such as trauma-informed yoga and equine therapy for survivors. Additionally, HSI is looking to expand its presence to rural communities to fill the gaps in services for under-resourced survivors.

Over the past year, the organization has begun to offer the following staff-led, peer support groups, in addition to the traditional support groups that have historically been offered at HSI: weekly trauma-informed yoga sessions, weekly "Walk & Talk" walking support groups at Reid Park, and alternative support group community events such as making terrariums at a local plant nursery. Additionally, through partnership with the Jewish Family & Community Services (JFCS), HSI is preparing to launch "Parenting through Trauma" support group for parents, guardians and caregivers who are supporting children as they grieve the murder of a loved one. The support groups allow many survivors to receive services at one time. These funds will be used to support the growing programming to continue to allow all survivors, regardless of their language, their age, or the dynamics of their victimization, to feel supported and understood.

Since January 2016, HSI has offered seasonal equine therapy to survivors who have had an especially difficult time in dealing with the murder of their loved one. These sessions have proven to be highly effective for survivors. It offers them a non-traditional way to seek help from a licensed therapist. Many survivors are not comfortable with "conventional therapy" (sitting in an office with a therapist and discussing problems in a formal and sometimes impersonal setting). Equine therapy takes place in a relaxed, outdoor environment on the northeast side of Tucson, where there are no distractions. It brings survivors together, letting them know that they are not alone, but the groups are small enough so that each survivor gets specialized attention. The interaction with horses creates a unique experience for survivors to be acutely aware of how they are feeling and regain a sense of trust in their lives. Horses help facilitate the process of transforming emotional discomfort and feelings of loneliness into connection with self and others. Funds will be utilized to allow additional survivors to experience equine therapy.

In June of 2018, HSI launched the "Healing through Yoga" program. These are weekly, one-hour trauma-informed yoga sessions facilitated by a certified trauma-informed yoga instructor.
