Additional Clarification, Annual Action Plan Amendment

Board of Supervisors Meeting Agenda August 17, 2020, Item 17

<u>Purpose</u>

To provide additional clarification re County COVID-19 funding priorities and CARES' CDBG-CV/ESG 1/H funding recommendations scheduled for Board of Supervisor consideration August 17, 2020. Regrettably, due to the overwhelming, in-office, demand for community resources during the pandemic. pre-occupied department staff missed the opportunity to schedule and brief respective Board offices regarding these funding recommendations, as is standard practice. In addition, descriptive titles of agency programs were inadvertently left out of the recommendation list arguably creating unintended confusion. Nonetheless, despite the uncharacteristic communication lapse, for which the Deputy Director takes full responsibility, the Department's process to recommend HUD CDBG and ESG funding allocations remains a consistent, transparent and collaborative effort in direct partnership with local community stakeholders, County departments and jurisdictions.

The intent of this memorandum is to provide needed information and address any concerns from nonprofit partners, in addition to. County policy and decision makers. In summary, the need to provide rental assistance, eviction prevention, and re-housing resources to COVID-19 impacted households has emerged as a top priority for CDBG-CV and ESG-I/II funds nationwide. Specifically, recommendations to initially allocate significant CDBG-CV and ESG II funding directly to the Pima County Community Action Agency (CAA): and, Community Investment Corporation, Inc. (CIC), a local non-profit that will serve as a lead entity—with five (5) to eight (8) other outside agency housing providers—and fiscal agent to directly assist landlords and tenants in the eviction process. Finally, for many of the CDBG-CV applicants, their application served double duty effectively serving as a CARES application for other stimulus resources, including US Treasury Coronavirus Relief Funds (CRF).

Background

On May 4, 2020, the Department made available CDBG-CV and ESG-CV I/II resources totaling \$4.938.289 to respondent agencies that best addressed the following COVID-19 related HUD priorities in response to the current public health crisis:

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CDBG-CV Funding Priorities

- 1. Increase food security resources in County communities outside the City of Tucson.
- 2. Internet and computer access for school aged children and families in low- to moderate-income communities outside the City of Tucson.
- 3. Increase access to childcare including increasing staff capacity and implementing health and safety measures.
- 4. Small business grants or loans.
- 5. Rental and utility assistance.

ESG-CV I / II Funding Priorities

- 1. Expand and renovate existing homeless shelters and facilities that assist special populations.
- 2. Re-housing recently homeless individuals and families currently residing in converted "isolation hotels" into safe and affordable rental housing.
- 3. Increase programmatic capacity and fiscal resources to deliver rental assistance.
- 4. Create an agency driven eviction prevention mitigation strategy to assist families negatively impacted by the pandemic.
- 5. Rapidly re-house recently evicted, pandemic impacted, families that are now newly homeless.


Discussion

The Department conducted an application and HUD CARES funding technical assistance workshop for interested applicants. Respective funding priorities were clarified with over 45 participants in attendance on the virtual meeting. During this presentation, staff also indicated that agency submitted applications would be considered for both of HUD's anticipated CARES CDBG-CV and ESG-CV funding "tranches" as anticipated for entitlement cities and counties including Pima County. In addition to CDBG-CV I and ESG-CV I, HUD has made available ESG-CV II likely in response to the national rent and eviction crisis. CDBG-CV II is still forthcoming. Pima County received a total of 52 applications and \$14,927,954 in requests.

CDBG-CV Funding Recommendations

As with traditional CDBG, County ultimately prioritized CDBG-CV funds for pandemic related programs and projects in unincorporated Pima County, City of South Tucson, and the Towns of Oro Valley, Marana, and Sahuarita. (The City of Tucson is also a HUD entitlement jurisdiction and received its own allocation of CDBG-CV and ESG-CV I/II resources it prioritizes within city limits.) The majority of County CDBG-CV submitted agency applications where to address food security issues. Fortunately, in consultation with Grants Management & Innovation (GMI), and with the approval of County Administration, it was deemed appropriate to utilize CARES CRF to fund 10 CDBG-CV applicants including rural food pantries and agencies addressing the digital, internet, divide and totaling \$1,923,455 (Attachment A). An exception was Sahuarita Food Bank, which proposed an eligible, shovel-ready, community facility expansion to address increased demand in the County, i.e., most appropriate for CDBG-CV as a traditional construction and capital improvement resource. Agencies that best met the County CDBG-CV priorities include:

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As previously noted, many CDBG-CV applicants have been awarded other CARES funds. Others did not fully meet County priorities or later, unselfishly, indicated to staff to program available CDBG-CV funds to other responsive agencies.

ESG-CVI/II Funding Recommendations

With respect to ESG-CV I/II funding recommendations, City of Tucson and Pima County homeless services and community development staff have been meeting weekly since March in a collaborative strategy to best deploy said resources and not duplicate efforts. In addition, HUD requires the local Continuum of Care, Tucson Planning Council for the Homeless, to be consulted regarding the allocation recommendations for ESG-CV I/II. At the onset of the pandemic, finding safe, temporary, housing conditions for homeless individuals was a priority. At that time, the City opted to use its allocation of various CARES funds, including ESG-CV I, to requisition hotels to house homeless individuals and families. The County, in turn, elected to utilize its ESG-CV I funds to contract with agencies to "Rapidly Rehouse" these households currently residing in the City funded "isolation hotels" into permanent rental housing. Through this collaborative process, Community Bridges Inc., and Our Family Services are recommended as the most responsive applicants to meet this need with County ESG-CV I funds. Additionally, Sister Jose's Women's Shelter is recommended for funding to expand services for that important, underserved, population. Finally, ESG-CV I funds will support CWD staff and the County's indirect cost recovery policy.

As previously noted, the need for rent and eviction resources for County landlords and renters is a priority. As such, significant ESG II funding is recommended to support the County Community Action Agency to provide multiple months of rental assistance to pandemic impacted households at 60% AMI. In concert, CIC is recommended ESG II funds to establish a non-profit partnership to directly assist families facing eviction; at risk of becoming, what is now termed, "newly homeless." CIC will serve as a fiscal agent effectively sub-contracting to known housing providers to assist newly homeless households with securing affordable rental housing including but not limited to: case management; temporary, "extended stay" lodging accommodations as necessary; security deposits; first and future month's rent; and, other eligible

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relocation costs. CIC has currently serves in this single fiscal agent capacity to process City of Tucson and Pima County HUD HOME Investment Partnership Funds for its joint down-payment assistance to first time-homebuyers program.

In late May, staff initiated a call for interest to all Outside Agencies working in the housing non-profit community to vet the "single fiscal agent" model and received positive feedback from nearly 30 agencies. These agencies include many of the applicants for ESG-CV funds, that expressed support for a "single fiscal agent model" strategy to get funds disbursed in a timely and efficient manner. Said agencies would potentially sub-contract with CIC to reimburse for staff time and effort to broker new leasing agreements keeping families off the streets. CIC has already begun sub-contract negotiations with housing providers, and pursuant to Board consideration and approval, will look to contract with five to eight of the following agencies that have expressed interest, including, but not limited to:

Compass Affordable Housing
Chicanos Por la Causa
Family Housing Resources
Old Pueblo Community Services/Help Tucson
Pima County Community Land Trust
Southern Arizona Legal Aid
Pima County Community Land Trust

Southwest Fair Housing Council Green Valley Assistance Services Step Up To Justice Interfaith Community Services Catholic Community Services Primavera Foundation Our Family Services

Conclusion

The effort to formulate and make available CDBG-CV and ESG-CV I/II funding recommendation for Board consideration continues to follow the same standard public and community process as traditional HUD entitlement funding. CWD staff continues to work collaboratively with its community partners to process and recommend programs in the best interest of County residents. As such, pursuant to Board approval, should any of the recommended internal or outside agencies not perform, funds will be recaptured and made available. Staff also anticipates issuing a new HUD CARES Community Planning Application for CDBG-CV II funds when available.
