Report: Strategic Planning Taskforce for Digital Access in Pima County

Introduction

Many Pima County community members lack access to sustainable high-speed internet and the tools necessary to participate with technology as productive citizens. This is a nationwide issue, bringing to light the lack of infrastructure in rural areas, the difficulty in overcoming geographic barriers, insufficient relationships between government agencies and internet service providers, and low technology adoption rates among individuals and families who are priced out of participation by limited training resources, as well as high internet and device costs. Pima County has established a Strategic Planning Taskforce, co-chaired by Pima County Information Technology Department and Pima County Public Library, to address the issues associated with access and inequity in our communities.

Partnership: Pima County Information Technology Department and Pima County Public Library

Pima County Public Library (PCPL) has long been the largest provider of free access to the internet and electronic resources for thousands of urban and rural community members each year. This access includes the use of devices — PCs, laptops, and iPads, electronic resources — books, streaming content, databases, and online education, and wired/wireless internet in and around Library locations. COVID-19 changed the way community members interacted with the Library, leaving some without the ability to connect to critical resources such as education, job help, government documents, and health providers.

PCPL's partnership with Pima County Information Technology (PCITD) supported the Library's need to pivot, resulting in the provision of 400 hotspots with unlimited data to students in rural communities and implementing external access points at library locations to increase the reach of the wireless internet for individuals who relied on this connection, but who now had to remain outside. PCITD is instrumental to the strategic planning process, cultivating relationships with internet service providers and providing guidance on best practices for the county-wide implementation of a comprehensive broadband infrastructure effort.

Strategic Planning Taskforce: Vision, Mission, and Goals

The Strategic Planning Taskforce is comprised of individuals from multiple County department (*Attachment A*). The Taskforce is charged with developing the initial framework of the strategic plan, complete with time-bound goals and objectives. The inaugural meeting of this group happened on August 13, 2021. The group collaborates via MS Teams, gathering research, data, best practices, and creative ideas from the members. The Taskforce has a standing meeting every two weeks in an effort to complete the work assigned to the group in a timely manner.

The work of the Taskforce is guided by best practices identified by organizations such as the National Association of Counties¹, the American Library Association², and the National Digital Inclusion Alliance with its State Digital Equity Scorecard³ created in conjunction with Microsoft and the National Skills Coalition. The draft vision, mission, and goals created by the taskforce are detailed in *Attachment B*. Next steps include gathering input from stakeholders (October 22 meeting) to further inform the plan, identify the best way to garner input from underrepresented communities, and develop robust objectives for its implementation.

Federal, State, and Local Funding: Investing in Infrastructure

The Federal Government prioritized funding for broadband infrastructure projects, subsidies for internet access to low income individuals and families, digital literacy initiatives, and projects that provide devices or connectivity to homes and areas where people gather. Multiple federal government agencies have developed grant programs to fund these priorities. Some of this funding is accessible only by schools and libraries. The State of Arizona, through the Arizona Commerce Authority, is developing grant opportunities for broadband infrastructure projects using innovative technologies like cellular wireless and citizens band radio service. Additionally, Pima County continues to utilize the Library as a vehicle for providing access to the internet, devices, and training, a foundational value of public library service to the community.

Leveraging these funding opportunities, PCPL and PCITD engaged local internet service providers to develop *Hotspots around Town*, a project designed to use the restricted monies (schools and libraries only) available through the Emergency Connectivity Fund⁴. Cox Communications brought forth a robust plan to provide internet access, free of charge, to community members in locations where they already meet or congregate. As part of the project, wireless access points will be available in urban and rural areas of the County, including parks, Boys & Girls Clubs, and community centers. The proposed locations are detailed in *Attachment C*. The second window for Emergency Connectivity Fund applications will provide for the monies to complete the construction portion of the original proposal.

Vision, Mission, and Goals

VISION

All Pima County community members will have equitable access to affordable and reliable high speed broadband internet to successfully participate in our democratic society.

MISSION

Guide the development of broadband infrastructure, implementation of digital literacy initiatives, and increase access to devices and tools for connectivity throughout Pima County.

Development of broadband infrastructure

Short-term Goal

Increase the number of publicly accessible wireless hotspots by a minimum of 10 sites in each Pima County Board of Supervisors District by the first quarter of FY22/23.

Mid-term Goal

Increase the number of households served by affordable broadband by 10% in each Pima County Board of Supervisors District by the first quarter of FY24/25.

Long-term Goal

Implement "Dig Once" policies for all critical infrastructure construction projects managed by DOTs, DOE, utilities, and Public Safety agencies by the fourth quarter of FY25/26.

Implementation of digital literacy initiatives

Short-term Goal

Create a plan to address gaps in digital literacy initiatives and resources by the second quarter of FY22/23.

Mid-term Goal

Engage at least five community partners to implement digital literacy initiatives and provide resources as identified by the gap analysis by the first quarter of FY23/24.

Long-term Goal

Increase technology adoption rates by XX through the implementation of relevant digital literacy initiatives.

Increase access to devices and tools

Short-term Goal

Perform a community needs assessment and conduct a gap analysis by the second quarter of FY22/23.

Mid-term Goal

Increase access to devices and tools by 20% for households identified in the gap analysis by the second quarter of FY23/24.

Long-term Goal

Implement policies for sustainable funding for the provision of devices and tools as identified by the needs assessment by the fourth quarter of FY25/26.
